Miami Makes First-Ever Visit to Jefferson's Country

The Cavaliers attempt to move one step closer to an ACC championship in a Senior Day match-up against Miami Saturday afternoon. This is the Hurricanes' first-ever visit to Scott Stadium as they are playing their inaugural season in the ACC.

Virginia is ranked 10th in this week's Associated Press poll, its highest rank this late in the season since 1990.

Head coach Al Groh has said the goal all season has been to be "in the hunt" on Nov. 1 and his team remained in the hunt following last week's 16-0 win over Maryland. Now the goal, he says, is to be in the hunt come Nov. 7, which is the case.

The Cavaliers are 7-1 this season, including 4-1 in the ACC, and are tied with Virginia Tech atop the league standings. Virginia became bowl eligible for the third consecutive season following its 37-16 win over Duke two games ago, the first time

that's happened since 1998-2000.

Groh has called November a month where "you can play your way in or play your way out." Virginia is 7-6 in November (and one December regular season game) under Groh. The record is much better at home, however, as the Cavaliers have feasted on the opposition at Scott Stadium. Virginia is 20-5 at home under Groh, including a 7-2 mark in November/December. The Cavaliers, who have won 16 of their last 17 home games, have won six in a row at home in November/December going back to 2001.

One of the keys to Virginia's success this season has been a lack of turnovers and limiting big plays. The Cavaliers have committed just six turnovers, tied for third fewest in the country. Defensively Virginia has given up just five running plays of more than 20 yards and relinquished only 15 pass plays of more than 25 yards.

After opening the season with six straight wins, Miami comes into this weekend with two consecutive losses. The Hurricanes haven't lost three consecutive games since 1999. They were ranked as high as third this season, but are 18th this week.

CAVALIER SENIORS PLAY FINAL HOME GAME

Saturday's game marks the final Scott Stadium appearance for several Cavaliers, who will be recognized in a pregame ceremony. Those expected to be recognized include captains G Elton Brown, DE Chris Canty and S Jermaine Hardy, as well as starters LB Dennis Haley, NT Andrew Hoffman, WR Michael McGrew, TB Alvin Pearman, S Marquis Weeks and C Zac Yarbrough.

This group features four players (Brown, Patrick Estes, Hardy, Pearman) who stepped in as true freshmen during Al Groh's first year in 2001 and helped build the foundation for the ensuing years. It also includes three (Rich Bedesem, Hoffman, McGrew) who played as true freshmen in George Welsh's final season as coach in 2000.

This group has played in two bowl games (await a third bid this season), while compiling a 29-18 overall record, including a 20-5 mark at home.

The Series vs. the Hurricanes

This is just the second meeting between the two teams, however as both are paired in the new "Coastal" division of the ACC, they will meet annually from now on.

Miami won the only previous meeting 31-21 in the 1996 Carquest Bowl in Miami. Hurricane safety Tremain Mack was the star of the game. He returned a fumble 79 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter and took an interception back 42 yards in the second quarter for another score. UVa's all-time leading rusher, Thomas Jones, playing as a true freshman, was the game's leading rusher with 67 yards on 14 carries. New Orleans Saints starting quarterback Aaron Brooks led the Cavaliers in passing with 142 yards and one touchdown. Germane Crowell caught a game-high six passes for 98 yards and one score. Virginia held Miami to just 60 yards rushing, but was undone by the two turnovers that were returned for TDs.

The game was the final collegiate action for several notable Cavaliers, including Tiki and Ronde Barber, James Farris, Jon Harris and Jamie Sharper.

In addition to this Cavalier quintet, the game featured a ridiculous number of future pros. Of the 44 starters in the game, 20 were drafted by the NFL (11 UVa, 9 Miami). The group of NFL draftees included nine first-round picks. As best as we can tell, 21 Cavaliers and 22 Hurricanes went on to play in the NFL.

Hagans Leads ACC in Passing Efficiency

Junior quarterback Marques Hagans has directed the offense to several masterful performances as Virginia leads the ACC in total offense and scoring this season. He leads the ACC in passing efficiency (11th nationally) and is second in total offense (53rd in nation).

He is battling Miami's Brock Berlin for the conference lead in total offense as he attempts to become the first first-time starter to lead the ACC in total offense since Florida State's Danny Kanell led the league in 1994. (We'll quibble about UNC's Darian Durant, the 2002 leader. He was UNC's passing and total offense leader in 2001, but wasn't technically listed as a starter.)

Virginia fans have gotten spoiled recently due to the remarkable accuracy of Matt Schaub, and Hagans is doing his best to keep UVa's recent run of QB success going. He is completing an ACC-leading 66.5 percent of his passes, eighth in the country.

In the opener against Temple he was coolly efficient completing 17 of 22 (.773) passes for 211 yards and a touchdown.

He was even more outstanding against North Carolina in his first start in front of his home crowd. He connected on 10 of 12 throws (.833) for 209 yards.

Hagans earned ACC Offensive Back of the Week honors after a near flawless performance in guiding UVa to a 31-10 win over Syracuse. He completed 11 of 12 passes (91.7 percent) for 202 yards and a touchdown as UVa improved to 4-0. His completion percentage that day is the third-highest in school history.

Not only did Hagans make an impact with his arm—he also used his feet to propel the team to the win. He broke free from pressure to race 59 yards for UVa's first touchdown on the way to leading the team with a career-high 81 yards and two scores on the ground. Overall his 283 yards of total offense are a career best.

Despite a season-low 53.8 completion percentage (14-26) in the win over Clemson, Hagans threw for a career-high 225 yards and one score.

Experienced O-Line Tops Century Mark

All-American candidate G Elton Brown headlines a very experienced offensive line rated the third-best in the nation by *The Sporting News* and features a returning starter at every spot.

Brown, a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award, received the Jacobs Blocking Trophy last season as the ACC's best blocker according to the league's head coaches. A dominating presence at 6-6, 338, he excels in getting out on the edge and clearing a path for Wali Lundy, Alvin Pearman and the rest of the Cavalier backs. His 35 career starts share the team lead.

Senior Zac Yarbrough is in his third year as a starter at center and is called one of the team's most unheralded players by head coach Al Groh. Groh cites his ability to get out and run as being one of his greatest strengths. He has 30 starts under his belt and owns a remarkable resume of success. He has yet to allow a sack in his career as UVa has compiled a 23-7 record when he starts.

Joining Brown and Yarbrough as three-year starters is LT D'Brickshaw Ferguson. He shares the team lead with 35 career starts, which is made all the more remarkable because he won't turn 21 until after the regular season is over. Ferguson is just now growing into his body and has grown from 265 to 295 pounds since last season. Somewhat of a "Renaissance Man" who plays the sax and is a black belt in karate, his string of 35 consecutive starts is the longest by a UVa left tackle since Ray Roberts started 37 in a row from 1989-91.

Ferguson's classmate Brad Butler has started the last 22 games at right tackle, including two consecutive bowl wins. He and Ferguson were the only linemen to start every game a year ago. Like Ferguson, he is just now catching up physically and didn't celebrate his 21st birthday until mid-September.

Junior Brian Barthelmes is the starter at left guard, where he started seven games a year ago. "Bart," as he's called by his teammates and coaches, is one of the most versatile linemen on the roster. In addition to seven starts at left guard, he saw time last fall at right guard (one start) and right tackle.

Last season the Cavaliers allowed the fewest sacks in the ACC (12) and they have given up a league-low 10 sacks this season.

No Close Games this Season

Virginia has had the curious situation of playing no close games so far this fall. All eight games have been decided by at least 16 points, including seven decided by 20 points or more. The Cavaliers are outscoring the opposition by an average of 33.5-13.8.

Last week's 16-0 win over Maryland is the closest game the Cavaliers have played this season and even in that game UVa left quite a few points on the field.

Last season Virginia played five "close" games that we'll loosely define as those decided by 10 points or less. In fact UVa has had at least three "close" games every year since 1978 except one (1984).

The last time Virginia went this deep into a season without any close games was 1968 when the Cavaliers didn't have a close game until the 10th game of the season.

Under Al Groh, Virginia has played 19 close games with an 11-8 record.

UVa Running Game Much Improved This Season

With an outstanding line leading the way and a stable of experienced and talented backs, it's not surprising that Virginia has put together seven dominating performances on the ground. The Cavaliers have rushed for at least 225 yards in seven of eight games this season, including an ACC-high 348 yards against Duke two games ago. Last season UVa rushed for more than 200 yards just three times in 13 games. In fact, three of the ACC's top-five games this fall have been compiled by UVa.

The top-six rushing totals (and seven of the top-nine) under fourth-year head coach Al Groh have occurred this season.

The Cavaliers' 286 yards in the opener vs. Temple was their best output since piling up 288 yards vs. Georgia Tech in 1998.

That superlative effort lasted just one week until the North Carolina game when they rolled up 299 yards vs. the Tar Heels in a 56-24 win.

Once again that top performance lasted just seven days. Led by the 100-yard tandem of Wali Lundy (142) and Michael Johnson (102), the Cavaliers piled up 326 yards in a 51-0 win over Akron. That represents UVa's best output since a 446-yard game against San Jose State in '98.

Virginia fell off a bit with "just" 225 yards against Syracuse, but the Wahoos bulled for 239 yards in a Thursday night win over Clemson.

Following a season-low 20-yard effort against Florida State, the Cavaliers erupted for 348 yards against Duke in the next game to register the best one-game improvement in school history (328).

Last week Virginia piled up 295 yards against a Maryland defense that was allowing an average of 111.4 yards per game coming in.

Last season UVa averaged 130.23 rushing yards per game, but has seen the average nearly double to 254.75 ypg this season. The Cavaliers are ranked sixth in the nation in rushing offense (tops in ACC) and are tied for sixth in the nation with 26 TDs on the ground. Virginia is also eighth nationally in average per carry (5.21).

Virginia has rushed for at least 200 yards 13 times under Groh, with seven coming this season. The Cavaliers rushed for 200+ yards for the first time under Groh in a loss to Colorado State to open the 2002 season. Since then UVa has won 12 straight games when rushing for 200+ yards.

UVa's increase of 124.52 yards per game this season is currently the third-best improvement in the country. (Virginia needed just seven game to rush for more yards than last season.) Army leads with an increase of 135.96 ypg. If the Cavaliers don't fall back during the rest of the season their improvement would be the best in ACC history as shown by the chart below.

Eliminating Mistakes Makes Winning Easier

While forcing turnovers is one of the keys to success, you don't want to squander those opportunities with turnovers of your own. Virginia has committed just six turnovers this season, tied for the third fewest in the country. Ball State and Bowling Green lead the way with five turnovers.

Virginia committed two turnovers (fumble, interception) in the first quarter of last week's win over Maryland but was not hurt by the miscues in the 16-0 win. Nonetheless it was the first time the Cavaliers had more than one turnover in a game since last season's game vs. N.C. State, a span of 12 games. (Virginia hasn't had 2+ turnovers in back-to-back games since the Clemson and Florida State games last year. UVa lost both.)

In the last 14 games, UVa has lost only four fumbles (and only fumbled 13 times overall). The team's eight-game streak without losing a fumble—by far the longest such streak in school history—ended against Clemson.

Under Al Groh Virginia is 10-1 when playing error-free football. The Cavaliers are also 19-5 in Groh's four years when committing fewer turnovers and have won 17 of their last 18 since 2002 when having fewer TOs.

Lundy, Pearman are 2000-Yard Duo

Junior Wali Lundy is fourth in the ACC in rushing with an average of 88.1 ygp, while senior Alvin Pearman is seventh at 81.1 ygp.

Pearman has started the last two games at tailback and justified his insertion into the starting line-up. Against Duke two games ago, he rushed for a career-high 223 yards on 38 carries, both figures that are one off the school record. He followed that with a magnificent performance last Saturday against Maryland. Against the Terps he dashed for 170 yards on 31 carries to run his two-game total to 393 yards, UVa's best two-game total since Thomas Jones in 1999.

In the process, Pearman became the 16th player in school history with at least 2000 yards, joining Lundy who entered the exclusive club earlier in the season. They mark just the fourth pair of players with 2000 yards in school history and the first since 1995 when Tiki Barber and Kevin Brooks were on the roster.

Virginia is just one of three teams in the country with two 2000-yard rushers. Auburn and Minnesota join UVa in this rare occurrence.

Miller Leading Candidate for Mackey Award

Heath Miller, a preseason All-American and the leading candidate for the Mackey Award given annually to the best tight end in the country, led the nation's tight ends with 70 catches for 835 yards last season. Both figures are ACC records by a tight end.

In three seasons, Miller has caught 129 passes for 19 touchdowns, school records by a tight end, while his 1520 yards are second among UVa TEs behind Bruce McGonnigal (1556).

The junior from Swords Creek, Va., is currently tied for 11th in touchdown receptions among active I-A players (top TE). His 19 TDs are an ACC record for a tight end.

Miller won't catch 70 passes again this season for a variety of reasons, including the fact that the team has one less regular season game than a year ago. Virginia also features an experienced backfield with three game-breaking tailbacks, who get opportunities to make plays that went to Miller previously.

After seeing his 22-game reception streak end vs. North Carolina, Miller led the team in receiving in the rout of Akron. He caught six passes for 54 yards and two touchdowns. He was also outstanding in the blocking phase of the game, helping Virginia rush for 326 yards in its best outing in six years.

He also had a big game against Clemson with four catches for 55 yards and a touchdown. In addition to his TD grab, two other catches went for first downs.

"Big Money" as he is called by his teammates was one of the Cavaliers' few bright spots in the loss to Florida State with his best receiving performance of the season. He hauled in nine passes for 110 yards, the third 100-yard game of his career.

Miller is ninth in the nation in yards (358) and tied for seventh in TDs (4) by a tight end this season.

Scoreboard Operators Kept Busy

Virginia has scored at least 30 points in six of eight games this season and is 19th in the country in scoring with an average of 33.5 points per game.

The Cavaliers' 56-point eruption vs. North Carolina in the second game is their most since they scored 59 points against Western Michigan last season. Virginia followed that with a 51-0 win over Akron the next week for its biggest win in 12 years.

The Cavaliers have been absolutely dominant in the first quarter this season outscoring the opposition 61-22. The scoring margin is even greater in the second quarter as Virginia owns a 104-27 advantage. Curiously, Virginia's worst quarter (47 points in the third) is greater than the opponents' best (38 in fourth).

Hoffman, Schmidt are Three-Year Starters

Even with the loss of three-year starter Chris Canty, the Cavaliers' defensive line still features a pair of three-year starters in nose tackle Andrew Hoffman and end Brennan Schmidt.

With Canty, the UVa defensive line was listed as the ninth-best d-line in the country according to *The Sporting News*. The magazine listed Canty as the nation's 10th-best end.

Junior Kwakou Robinson moved into the spot opened due to the loss of Canty and was tied for second on the team with a season-high five tackles against Clemson in his first start of the year. He started five games as a freshman two years ago while Canty was out while recovering from a broken leg. Last year he was the top reserve at end and made 24 tackles. Redshirt freshman Chris Johnson has also seen his turns increase with Canty's loss.

Schmidt has started every game of his career and shares the team lead with 35 starts, tops among the team's defensive players. He is averaging 4.1 tackles per game this season and has picked things up lately with at least five tackles in four of the last six games. He has finished second in the ACC in tackling by a lineman behind Canty the last two years, making 87 tackles each season. His 207 career tackles are eighth by a UVa lineman.

Hoffman doesn't get the attention of Canty and Schmidt, but he quietly goes about his business plugging the middle. Like Schmidt, he has been remarkably consistent, making 56 tackles each of the previous two seasons.

This season he has been outstanding and is averaging a career-high 4.9 stops per game. Hoffman has had at least five tackles in five of the last six contests and led the team in tackling for the first time this season with six stops against Maryland last Saturday. He leads ACC defensive/nose tackles in tackling.

Special Teams Make Big Plays, Coverage Units Tested

Head coach Al Groh places a premium on special teams play and the attention to that phase of the game has paid off in several ways this season.

In the season opener Alvin Pearman returned a punt 70 yards for a touchdown to help UVa build a 24-0 bulge on the way to a 44-14 win over Temple.

The following week vs. North Carolina Marquis Weeks returned a kickoff 100 yards for a score, while a short time later Pearman took one back 93 yards to set up his own one-yard touchdown run on the next play.

The Cavaliers held Clemson's electric return man, Justin Miller, in check and gained a 20-point win over the Tigers last month. Miller came into the game averaging 12.7 yards per punt return and 36.4 yards per kickoff return. Against Virginia he failed to return a punt and averaged 25.3 yards on three kickoffs.

Miami features one of the nation's most dangerous kick returners in Devin Hester. Hester, who has returned four kicks for touchdowns this season, is ranked in the top 10 in the country in both punt returns (third, 22.77) and kickoff returns (10th, 28.80) and will surely test the Cavaliers' coverage units. Virginia allows an average of 21.9 yards per kickoff return to rank 80th nationally. UVa's punt coverage group is ranked 86th in the country with an average of 11.7 yards per return.

Virginia ranks last nationally in net punting and Sean Johnson averages just 35.2 yards per punt. But UVa has allowed just 11 punts to be returned, tied for third-fewest in the country.

One factor that might come into play in the punt game and could hold Hester in check is that 14 of UVa's 27 punts have come from inside the opponents' territory, which limits returns. Johnson has placed nine punts inside the 20.

**HEAD COACH
AL GROH**

In four short years Al Groh has ushered in a new era of gridiron excellence at his alma mater.

He traded in a high-profile NFL head coaching job with the New York Jets to take over the reins of the Cavaliers in 2001.

To say that Groh and his exciting brand of pro-style football have already made a significant impact on the UVa program would be an understatement. Virginia finished 8-5 last season and celebrated another win in the Continental Tire Bowl, just the second time in history the Cavaliers won a bowl game in consecutive seasons.

He masterfully guided the Cavaliers to a second-place finish in the ACC in just his second season at the helm in 2002. Making believers out of one of the youngest teams in the nation, the Cavaliers confounded the prognosticators who picked them to finish eighth. Playing one of the toughest schedules in the nation, the Cavaliers defeated four ranked teams and posted four second-half comeback wins. They capped a remarkable season with a 48-22 thrashing of West Virginia in the Continental Tire Bowl and were ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll.

Virginia finished 5-7 during Groh's first season as he tied George Blackburn for the most wins by a first-year UVa head coach.

Groh returned to UVa with over 30 years of professional and collegiate coaching experience, including 13 seasons in the NFL, where he was a member of Bill Parcells' staffs with the New York Giants, New England Patriots and New York Jets.

He was linebacker coach in 1990 as the Giants won Super Bowl XXV and defensive coordinator with the Patriots' 1996 squad that played in Super Bowl XXXI.

Groh was named head coach of the Jets before the start of the 2000 season, and led them to a 9-7 record in one year at the helm.

Before making a name for himself in the NFL, Groh was the head coach at Wake Forest from 1981-86. He compiled a six-year 26-40 record, establishing himself as the second-winningest coach in school history at the time.

A 1967 graduate of UVa's McIntire School of Commerce, Groh was a member of the varsity football team from 1963-65, playing under Bill Elias and Blackburn. He also lettered as a defenseman on UVa's lacrosse team.

Nation's Top LB Unit Calls Charlottesville Home

Virginia features the nation's top linebacking unit according to *The Sporting News*. Led by a trio of players who are among the best at the position—Darryl Blackstock, Ahmad Brooks and Kai Parham—as well as first-time starter, senior Dennis Haley, the group is athletic and deep.

Blackstock, a junior, was known as a pass rusher as a freshman after leading the nation's rookies with 10 sacks two years ago. His numbers were down last season as he concentrated on becoming a more complete linebacker. He finished with 85 tackles, but nearly 20 percent (16) came behind the line. That percentage has increased this season. He's made 29 tackles so far, but eight have occurred in the backfield, as teams generally run away from his side.

Blackstock had a tremendous game against Maryland on Saturday, finishing with a season-high five tackles. He had two of UVa's three sacks for his second multi-sack game of the season.

He passed former UNC standout Lawrence Taylor to move into fifth place in ACC history in sacks by a linebacker with 22. Next on the list are two players tied for third with 23 sacks—Georgia Tech's Pat Swilling and Clemson's Keith Adams.

Brooks, one of 12 semifinalists for the Butkus Award, earned Freshman All-American honors last fall. He helped contain an explosive North Carolina offense, finishing with a game-high 10 tackles. He reached double digits with a team-leading 12 tackles against Syracuse, including two sacks. He turned in his third double-digit game of the season with 11 tackles in the loss to Florida State.

The sophomore from Woodbridge, Va., shared the team lead with six tackles against Maryland and had two acrobatic interceptions, the first of his career.

Brooks is eighth in the ACC in tackling with an average of 7.8 tackles per game. He is also sixth in the league in sacks with an average of 0.69/g.

Haley gained the orange jersey as a starter in spring minicamp, replacing Raymond Mann at the other outside spot opposite Blackstock. He had a very productive season in 2003, finishing with 36 tackles, tops by a non-starter. He led the team in tackling for the second time in his career—first this season—with a career-high nine tackles against Clemson last month. Haley is fourth on the team in tackling with an average of 5.1 stops per game.

Parham moved into the starting line-up early last season and averaged 7.9 tackles per start, reaching double figures three times. His ratio of a tackle every 6.8 plays was the best rate on the team. He had a season-high nine tackles vs. North Carolina, including three behind the line of scrimmage, and made nine stops vs. Florida State. He is averaging 5.0 tackles per game, third among the linebackers.

Lundy Finds the End Zone

Junior tailback Wali Lundy has shown a remarkable propensity for finding the end zone during his career. Even though the season is not barely two-thirds over, Lundy has found paydirt 14 times (all on the ground) and is tied for fourth in the country in rushing TDs. He is also tied for fourth nationally in total TDs.

He scored three touchdowns in the first three games of the season to become the first player in school history to score three touchdowns in three straight games. He has scored an amazing 19 touchdowns in the last 10 games going back to last season.

Lundy has eight 3-touchdown games in his career, by far the most of any play-

er in UVa history. Bill Dudley, Frank Quayle, Terry Kirby and Tiki Barber are next with three 3-touchdown games.

In 34 career games, Lundy has scored 38 touchdowns. He is second in UVa history in total touchdowns and third with 30 rushing TDs. Among active I-A players Lundy is tied for eighth in total touchdowns and tied for 12th in rushing TDs.

As best as we can tell Quayle (35 TDs in 30 games) is the only player in the modern history of the program to average a touchdown per game.

Lundy is also fourth in school history with 228 points.

The lists of UVa's leading touchdown scorers in the "modern era" (since 1937) are shown below. Gene Mayer, who played from 1912-15, is listed as UVa's all-time touchdown (46) and scoring leader (293).

RUSHING TDs

All-Purpose Pearman Leads ACC

Senior tailback Alvin Pearman recovered from offseason knee surgery to have a tremendous all-around season last year. Like Wali Lundy in 2002, he was the only player ranked in the ACC's top 10 in rushing (eighth) and receiving (seventh) last season. He scampered for a career-high 643 yards (since broken), while pulling in 63 receptions, second in the nation for a running back.

Perhaps the most versatile player on the team, Pearman leads the ACC (and is 12th nationally) in all-purpose yardage with an average of 160.1 ypg.

He got this season off to an electrifying start against Temple by taking a punt back 70 yards, breaking at least half a dozen tackles along the way. He averaged 29.3 yards on three punt returns. In addition, he gained 38 yards on the ground and caught two passes for 20 more yards.

He had a spectacular weaving 93-yard kickoff return in the win over North Carolina, the longest non-scoring return in school history. Admitting he was out of gas near the end, he was dragged down at the 1-yard line. Head coach Al Groh allowed Pearman to benefit from his long return as he called his number for the TD plunge on the next play to close out UVa's scoring. Against his home state Tar Heels, the Charlotte native compiled 194 all-purpose yards, a career-high at the time.

In the Thursday night win over Clemson, Pearman rushed for a game-high 104 yards (all but two in the second half), caught three passes for 48 yards and returned two punts for 15 yards.

Pearman had a "One for the Books" type of game against Duke two games ago. He rushed for a career-high 223 yards (one off the school record), while compiling a career-high 267 all-purpose yards.

A workhorse against the Blue Devils, he had one stretch in the first quarter when he carried 10 straight times and another in the third quarter with seven consecutive rushes. He also caught a team-leading three passes for 44 yards.

His outstanding running was on display against a tough Maryland defense last week when he rushed for 170 yards, the second-highest total of his career. Pearman added 27 yards on punt returns and 13 yards receiving for 210 all-purpose yards, the second-highest mark of his career.

The 100-yard game is his third of the season, all in the last four games. In that span, he has rushed for 509 yards, an average of 127.3 ypg.

In addition to leading the ACC in all-purpose yards, he is also fourth in the league in punt returns (13.6 avg) and seventh in rushing (81.1 ypg).

Pearman is ranked fifth in the UVa record book (23rd in ACC history) with 4312 all-purpose yards. He is currently eighth among active I-A players, tops among ACC players. He is also ranked fourth in school history in receptions (126), 14th in receiving yards (1246) and 16th in rushing (2006).

Dangerous as a rusher or receiver, he joins Frank Quayale and Terry Kirby as the only players in Virginia history to have at least 1000 yards both rushing and receiving. He is one of 34 players in I-A history (three are active) to record 1000 yards in each category.

Nine Rookies Make Debut

Head coach Al Groh and his staff have fashioned some of the nation's best recruiting classes the last few years. Groh has said he doesn't recruit players to stand on the sideline and will play whoever he needs to to gain a win.

In his first four years, Groh has shown a propensity to play true freshmen, even in the season opener.

In this season's first game vs. Temple, four true freshmen played—cornerback Philip Brown, safety Nate Lyles, defensive end Chris Long and tight end Tom Santi. In addition, 12 redshirt freshmen made their collegiate debuts.

Jamaal Jackson became the fifth true freshman to see action this season against Akron in mid-September.

Three more true freshmen made their college debuts against Duke. Fullback Kevin Bradley saw action on the kickoff coverage team, while Bud Davis was in for several plays at wide receiver and cornerback Chris Gorham did the same on the defensive side of the ball. Santi, normally a tight end, opened the game at fullback and became the first true freshman to start this season for UVa.

Walk-on running back Josh Zidenberg made his debut on the punt return team against Maryland on Saturday to become the ninth true freshman to play this fall.

Canty to Miss Remainder of Season

Senior defensive end Chris Canty will miss the remainder of the season after injuring his knee midway through the fourth quarter of Virginia's win over Syracuse on Sept. 25. Canty, the team's second-leading tackler at the time of his injury, was listed as the 11th-best prospect for next year's NFL draft according to Mel Kiper.

He led ACC defensive linemen in tackling the previous two seasons and was leading again when he was injured with an average of 7.5 tackles per game. In addition to being the leading tackler among ACC d-linemen, Canty was third in the conference with seven tackles for loss. He finishes his career with 243 tackles, fourth among linemen in UVa history.

He underwent surgery the Thursday following the injury and is expected to be ready for NFL training camp next season according to head coach Al Groh.

Cavaliers vs. Ranked Teams

This is the third year in a row the Cavaliers have played a ranked team on "Senior Day."

Last year the Cavaliers gained a rousing 35-21 win over #21 Virginia Tech in the final home game, while two years ago the Cavaliers closed their home schedule with a 48-13 win over #18 Maryland.

The Cavaliers come into this game ranked 10th in this week's Associated Press poll, while Miami is ranked 18th.

Curiously this is the second time this season Virginia has played a lower ranked Florida team. The first time wasn't very pleasant as the Wahoos dropped their only game of the season by a 36-3 count to Florida State last month.

Under Al Groh, Virginia is 7-9 against ranked teams, but 5-3 at home.

Virginia Gridders Excel in Classroom

This year's squad features six members who are participating as graduate students, bringing the total to 90 players who have participated as grad students over the past 15 seasons.

This year's grad students include: defensive end Chris Canty, linebacker Dennis Haley, fullback Brandon Isaiah, wide receiver Michael McGrew, linebacker Jon Thompson and safety Marquis Weeks.

Isaiah and Weeks received their degrees in sociology, while Canty received his in African-American Studies, Haley in anthropology, McGrew in urban and environmental planning and Thompson in religious studies.

In addition, according to the NCAA, Virginia was second in the ACC in graduation rates for football players who entered between 1993-97 and earned degrees within six years. UVa graduated 76 percent of its football players, topped only by Duke (83 percent).
