TELEVISION COVERAGE

- The Raycom/ACC Network is televising the game.
- Steve Martin (play-by-play), Rick Walker (analyst) and Mike Hogewood (sidelines) have the call.

RADIO COVERAGE

- All Virginia games are broadcast on the Virginia Sports Network, originating at WINA/WWV in Charlottesville.
- Dave Koehn (play-by-play), Frank Quayle (color analysis) and Tim Sherman (sidelines) have the call.
- The Clemson game also will be broadcast on WTEM-AM 980 in the Washington, DC area.

THE SERIES VS. CLEMSON

- Overall, the series has been one-sided, with Clemson holding a 35-8-1 edge.
- The teams have not met since 2004, but UVa has won three of the last four.
- Clemson holds a 15-5 edge in Charlottesville, although Virginia has prevailed in three of the last four in Scott Stadium.
- The Tigers won the first 29 games in the series before UVa won in 1990. Since then, Virginia is 8-6-1 vs. Clemson.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Virginia and Clemson are meeting for the first time since 2004.
- No current Virginia players have ever seen game action against Clemson – only five were members of the last UVa team to face the Tigers.
- The Cavaliers' schedule is rated the toughest in the nation this week according to the Sagarin ratings.
- Clint Sintim ranks third nationally and leads the ACC in sacks. The national leader in sacks among linebackers, he needs one sack to reach the top 10 in ACC history.
- UVa is 11-1 all-time when Cedric Peerman gets 15 or more rushing attempts. The lone loss was Nov. 1 vs. Miami.

ACC INJURY POLICY

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Questionable
- Doubtful

NICE TO MEET YOU

- Because of the ACC's unbalanced schedule, this is the teams' first meeting since 2004.
- No current Virginia players have seen action against Clemson.
- Only five current Cavaliers were members of the 2004 team – Jon Copper, Scott Deke, Cedric Peerman, Clint Sintim, Zak Stair. All five redshirted the season.

STOP THE CLEMSON GROUND GAME

- Virginia's ability to contain the Clemson running game has been an important factor in its eight wins over the Tigers.
- Since 1990 Virginia has won eight of 10 games when holding Clemson under 200 yards on the ground.
- The Tigers rushed for just 45 yards in 2004 vs. UVA – the Tigers' lowest rushing output ever vs. Virginia.
- Virginia is 8-8 all-time against Clemson when the Tigers fail to rush for at least 200 yards, but six of the losses occurred prior to 1978 in the midst of UVA's 29-game losing streak to Clemson.

EXPECT AN AERIAL ATTACK

- The Virginia-Clemson game features the top two passing offenses in the ACC.
- Virginia ranks second in the ACC in passing offense at 220.1 yards per game. Only Clemson, at 229.1, averages more passing yards per game.

- Over the last five games, Virginia has averaged 243.3 passing yards per game.
- The game also features the ACC's two leaders in passing offense – CU's Cullen Harper (207.5) and UVA's Marc Verica (200.0).

2004: VIRGINIA 30, CLEMSON 10

- Alvin Pearman ran for 104 yards, including two fourth-quarter touchdowns, and Virginia shut down Clemson after the opening 15 minutes in a convincing 30-10 victory on Oct. 7, 2004, in the last meeting between the teams in Scott Stadium.
- Pearman scored on a 2-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter to make it 23-10, then clinched it with another 2-yarder with 5:14 remaining.
- The Tigers drove 80 yards in six plays on their opening drive, but had just seven first downs thereafter.
- Connor Hughes added field goals of 21, 43 and 50 yards for the Cavaliers.

VIRGINIA SCHEDULE RATED AMONG NATION'S BEST

- Regardless of which service you check, the UVa strength of schedule is one of the toughest in the country.
- Virginia currently has the toughest schedule in the FBS according to the latest Sagarin ratings.
- Virginia's opponents this year boast a combined winning percentage of .615, best in the ACC and fifth in the nation.
- Nine of UVA's 11 FBS opponents already are bowl eligible.

COMING OUT OF THE BYE WEEK

- Under head coach Al Groh, the Cavaliers have put extra preparation time to

- good use, going 9-4 after a bye week.
- UVA is 7-2 at home following a bye week under Groh.
- Several of the post-bye week wins under Groh have been close, featuring games won by two, three (two) and six points.

CAVALIERS FIND A WAY TO STEM THE TIDE

- Since losing five straight games during a stretch in 2001, Virginia has not recorded a losing skid of more than two games.
- Virginia has lost back-to-back games in 12 instances (counting the current streak) during a season under Al Groh.
- In all but two of the previous 11 occurrences, the Cavaliers won the following game to break the skid.
- The exceptions are UVA's two straight defeats to end the 2004 and 2007 seasons.

UVA STRONG VS. RANKED TEAMS

- Virginia earned wins over ranked teams in consecutive weeks Oct. 18 and 25 (No. 18 North Carolina, No. 21 Georgia Tech).
- It is the first time since 2002 Virginia defeated ranked teams in back-to-back weeks. UVA beat No. 20 NC State and No. 18 Maryland that season.
- The Georgia Tech win was UVA's first on the road over a ranked team since winning at then-No. 19 Clemson in 2001.
- UVA last won two games against ranked teams in the same season in 2005.
- Currently, four UVA opponents are ranked (USC, UMD, UNC, Miami).

CHILDS BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start at Georgia Tech, becoming the 18th Cavalier to make the first start of his career this season.
- There have been plenty of new starters on each side of the ball, with nine first-timers on offense and nine on defense.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN CRACK LINEUP

- PK Robert Randolph became the fifth true freshman to play for UVA this season after seeing action in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor, LB Cam Johnson and DB Rodney McLeod.

- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California. McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke and also played several plays from scrimmage.

PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start against Maryland.
- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS

- 22 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the six games this season after kickers Chris Hinkebein and Robert Randolph played vs. East Carolina.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and eight have followed suit in the last five games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.

THREE HOOS HAIL FROM SOUTH CAROLINA

- Virginia has three players who come from the Palmetto State: freshman P Jimmy Howell (Florence/West Florence), redshirt freshman T Landon Bradley (Conway/Conway) and sophomore WR Dontrelle Inman (Batesburg/Batesburg-Leesville).
- Clemson has two players who hail from Richmond, Va. – redshirt freshman DE Andre Branch (Varina) and junior LB Kavell Conner (Manchester).

AFCA HONORS UVA PROGRAM

- The American Football Coaches Association has recognized the University of Virginia among its honorees for graduation of its football players. This is the 23rd time the UVA program has been cited since 1981.

- The Cavalier program received the Academic Achievement Award for the highest graduation rate in 1985 and 1986 and has garnered honorable mention recognition a record 21 times.

CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST IN ACC

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL

- Virginia has played more football games than any other ACC school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,190 games in this, the 119th season of UVA football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 612-529-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,173 games played in 118 seasons. UVA is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.
- Penn (1,292) has played the most games overall.

VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- Although the Cavaliers had a season-high nine penalties in the last game at Wake Forest, UVA still is averaging 42.9 penalty yards this year – fifth fewest in the ACC.

MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?

- UVA won its first close game this year vs. North Carolina after having a season full of them in 2007.
- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVA's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

LOTS OF NEW FACES

- UVA features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.
- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead line-backers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and are participating as graduate students this year.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

SLOW STARTERS

- Virginia's offense has taken some time to get rolling throughout the year. UVa has scored on its opening drive just twice this year – both via field goals (Richmond, Georgia Tech).
- UVa has been outscored 76-40 in the opening quarter this year.
- Slow starts have plagued the UVa defense as well, with the Cavaliers giving up points on the opening drive in seven of 10 games, including each of the last five.
- The Cavaliers have trailed in eight of their 10 games this year. The exceptions are their two shutouts (Richmond, Maryland).

O-LINE PREVENTING SACKS

- Virginia's offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just 12 sacks in 10 games (1.2 per game).
- The Cavaliers rank second in the ACC in fewest sacks allowed and tied for 21st nationally.
- Boston College leads the ACC in fewest sacks allowed (1.1/game).
- UVa has given up more than one sack on just two occasions – vs. Southern California and at Wake Forest (two each).

RED-ZONE SUCCESS

- Virginia has been able to successfully finish off drives of late.
- Virginia is 18 for its last 20 in the red zone, with the lone failures coming on a missed field goal in the Maryland game and a turnover on downs against Wake Forest.
- The turnovers on downs vs. Wake ended a streak of 15 straight drives (10 TDs) in the red zone that ended in scores.
- In its first four games, UVa was just 6-for-10 in the red zone.

VERICA RUNS 200 STREAK TO SIX

- Quarterback Marc Verica threw for a career-high 279 yards at Wake Forest, the sixth game in a row he passed for at least 200 yards.

- He is just the second QB in UVa history with six-consecutive 200-yard passing games – no player has ever produced more.
- Matt Schaub had six in a row in 2003.
- Verica leads the ACC with a 64.5 percent completion percentage this year.

FEED PEERMAN THE BALL

- Virginia is 11-1 all-time (4-1 in 2008) when Cedric Peerman gets 15 or more carries in a game.
- The loss to Miami marked the first time UVa has failed to win when Peerman got 15 or more rushing attempts in a game.

PEERMAN BURSTS BACK ONTO SCENE

- After being limited in the first four games by an injury, Cedric Peerman has been strong and healthy since.
- Peerman has rushed for 100-plus yards in three of the last six games with 110 vs. Maryland, 173 against East Carolina and 118 at Georgia Tech (first to rush for 100+ vs. GT this year).
- He is averaging 5.4 yards per carry this season and ranks fourth in the ACC with 73.6 rushing yards per game.

PEERMAN CATCHES THE ROCK TOO

- Cedric Peerman ranks eighth in the ACC this season with 4.0 receptions per game and leads ACC running backs in receptions.
- Peerman ranks among the leaders nationally in receptions per game among running backs – West Virginia's Jock Sanders (4.44) and Notre Dame's Armando Allen (4.2) each rank just ahead.
- Peerman set career highs for receptions twice this year with seven vs. Maryland and eight against East Carolina.
- He had a career-best 55 receiving yards vs. Georgia Tech.

ANOTHER 100-YARD RUSHING GAME FOR PEERMAN

- Cedric Peerman now has six career 100-yard games – three this year and three in 2007.
- He is the 10th player at Virginia to have two seasons with three or more 100-yard rushing games and the first since Wali Lundy in 2002, 2003 and 2004.
- Peerman is tied for 14th in career 100-yard rushing performances at UVa.

- With his catch of 23 yards in the third quarter vs. North Carolina, Kevin Ogletree moved past the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yards.
- With 95 yards at Wake Forest, he now has 1,249 career receiving yards.
- He ranks 15th in receiving yards in school history.
- He also has a career-high five receiving touchdowns this year.

OGLETREE CRACKS CENTURY MARK AGAIN ...

- Kevin Ogletree earned his third career 100-yard receiving day vs. Maryland with exactly 100 yards.
- He also had 103 yards receiving Sept. 6 vs. Richmond.
- Ironically, Ogletree's first 100-yard performance came two years ago in UVa's home game vs. Maryland (133 yards).

... IN CAREER RECEPTIONS TOO

- Kevin Ogletree has 109 career receptions and ranks ninth all-time in receptions at UVa.

OGLETREE CONTINUES STREAK OF MULTIPLE RECEPTIONS

- After his six-reception day Wake Forest, Kevin Ogletree now has at least two receptions in 22 straight games, dating to the start of 2006.
- It is the second-longest such streak behind Billy McMullen's 25-game run from 2000-02.
- It is tied as the sixth-longest streak with at least one reception with Germane Crowell (1996-97), Heath Miller (2002-04) and Alvin Pearman (2003-04). Patrick Jeffers (1993-95) holds the record of 31.
- Ogletree leads the team with 50 receptions for 640 yards (64.0 yards per game).
- He ranks second in the ACC in receiving yards per game and fifth in receptions per game (5.0).

OGLETREE GUNNING FOR THREE 100-YARD RECEIVING GAMES IN SEASON

- With two 100-yard games this year, Kevin Ogletree is in line to become the 10th player in UVa history to have three 100-yard receiving games in a season.

CAVALIER WIDE RECEIVERS EMERGE

- Virginia wide receivers have combined for 1,488 yards receiving this year and already easily eclipsed the wide receiver total from all of 2007.
- UVa wide receivers had 833 receiving yards in 13 games last season.
- UVa WRs have 125 receptions this year after catching 72 balls in 2007.

COVINGTON PROVIDES ANOTHER TARGET

- Senior WR Maurice Covington has at least three catches in each of the last six games, including three at Wake Forest.
- Against Georgia Tech, Covington set a career high for receptions (five) and tied his career high for receiving yards (76).
- He also had his first TD reception of the season in the third quarter vs. Tech.

KOCH COMES ALIVE

- Senior WR Cary Koch finished with 73 yards receiving, his most at Virginia, at Wake Forest. His career high is 102, set against Tulsa while he was at Tulane in 2005.
- His six catches are a career high. He had six receptions while at Tulane against Rice and Tulsa.
- In the last two games, Koch has 10 catches for 114 yards – he had 15 receptions for 140 yards in the first eight games.

MONROE, SINTIM ON KIPER'S BIG BOARD

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 10 and LB Clint Sintim No. 22 on ESPN's Mel Kiper's 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects.
- Monroe also has been named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim is on the Nagurski Award watch list.
- Monroe received honorable mention All-ACC recognition in '07 and joined Sintim on several preseason All-ACC squads this year.
- Sintim, a preseason Nagurski Award candidate, leads the ACC in sacks this season and had a stretch of 10 sacks in five games earlier this year.

PHILLIPS PILES ON CATCHES

- John Phillips had four receptions for 43 yards at Wake Forest and has at least two catches in every game this season.
- He had a career-best seven catches vs. Miami.
- Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (4.6; 46 receipts, 379 yards) and is sixth in the ACC in receptions per game this year.
- Phillips also ranks seventh nationally among tight ends in receptions per game.
- With 46 receptions this year, Phillips has the 10th-most receptions by a tight end in a single season in ACC history and has the second most by a UVa tight end (Heath Miller, 70 - 2004).

NOTING UVA ATHLETICS

UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVa coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

TIGHT END U

- UVa TEs have caught 458 passes for 5,057 yards and 39 TDs since Al Groh arrived in 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span (nearly double).

SACK ATTACK

- The Cavaliers are tied for second in the ACC and 14th in the FBS with 2.8 sacks per game (28 total). Florida State leads the ACC with 2.9 sacks per game (29 total).
- TCU leads the FBS with 3.64 sacks per game.

HAVING A FIELD DAY

- Senior DE Alex Field had his first multiple-sack day with two sacks vs. Miami.
- It gave him a career-high five sacks

this year. He had three in his first three seasons combined.

- Field is tied for ninth in the ACC in sacks (0.45/game).

SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY

- After racking up another sack at Wake Forest, Clint Sintim now has 29 career sacks and has been in on nine solo and four assisted sacks this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- The next closest linebacker is Texas' Sergio Kindle, who ranks 27th nationally with .73 sacks per game.
- Sintim ranks third among all players in sacks (1.1/game). Only TCU's Jerry Hughes (1.27) and Arkansas State's Alex Carrington (1.17) average more sacks per game.
- His career sacks total (25 solo, four assist) is the most for any current linebacker in the country and is third among all players nationally, behind Northern Illinois' Larry English and Houston's Phillip Hunt (33 each).

SINTIM HOLDS UVA RECORD FOR SACKS BY LINEBACKER

- Clint Sintim has been in on 29 career sacks and passed Darryl Blackstock (27) for the most sacks ever by a UVa LB.
- He is second in sacks for any UVa player (Chris Slade, 40).
- He needs one sack to tie Clemson's Michael Dean Perry (1984-87) and Gaines Adams (2003-06) for 10th in ACC history.
- Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this season (1.1/game).
- Sintim had his streak of five straight games with a sack snapped vs. Miami.
- The last UVa player to have sacks in five straight games was Chris Long (2007). It is the longest streak by a UVa LB since Darryl Blackstock's five-game run in 2002.

SINTIM ALSO MOVING UP TFL LEDGER

- Clint Sintim has 45 career tackles for loss, which is tied for third in school history.
- He is tied with Darryl Blackstock for most career TFL by a UVa linebacker.
- He also is tied with former UVa teammate Chris Long.
- Sintim ranks 16th nationally among current players in career tackles for loss.
- He needs five TFL to tie Mike Frederick (1991-94) for second in the UVa annals.

OPPONENTS OFTEN GET FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 22 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including four this year.
- Virginia is 19-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke this year.
- Virginia has held Richmond (19), Duke (84), Maryland (79) and East Carolina (89) to fewer than 100 yards rushing this season

APPLEBY BACK WITH A VENGEANCE

- After missing one game and seeing limited action vs. Miami because of an injury, senior LB Antonio Appleby returned to his starting spot and had a career day vs. Wake Forest.
- Appleby racked up a career-best 13 tackles – 12 solo. He had 1.5 tackles for loss.
- He had started 34-consecutive games before missing the Miami game.

HALL FORCES THE ISSUE

- CB Vic Hall is tied for seventh nationally in forced fumbles with 0.4 per game. He also leads the ACC in that category.
- Hall has forced four fumbles this year.
- The UVa record is five, set by Stuart Anderson (1979), Tony Blount (1979) and Merrill Robertson (2002).

CHILDS BECOMES NEXT MAN UP

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start vs. Georgia Tech in place of the injured Antonio Appleby. He had five tackles.

- Against UNC, Childs had a career-high 10 tackles and recorded a tackle for loss.
- Coming into the UNC game, Childs had just three career tackles.

SENIOR LINEBACKERS SHINING FOR CAVALIERS

- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters, and the trio leads all UVa tacklers.
- The three pace UVa in tackles – Copper leads the team with 85 tackles, followed by Appleby (60) and Sintim (56).
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 47, Appleby - 35, Copper - 35).
- Copper has 285 career tackles, while Sintim has 230 and Appleby 215.

TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER

- ILB Jon Copper had 10 tackles at Wake Forest and now has 285 tackles. He needs eight tackles to reach the top 15 in UVa history.
- Sean Scott (1984-87) and Jerton Evans (1999-2002) are tied for 15th.
- Copper had a career-high 16 tackles vs. UNC – the most by any UVa player since Angelo Crowell had 16 vs. Penn State in 2002.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 31 of his 35 games.
- Copper leads the team with 85 tackles this year, including six games of nine or more. He ranks sixth in the ACC in tackles.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-84.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.
- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

DOWLING A FORCE IN SECONDARY

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling has three interceptions this season – more than any UVa player had last season and most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Dowling had a career-best two INTs at Duke to double his career INT total.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.
- Despite missing significant time with injuries, Dowling still ranks third in the ACC with 11 passes defended.
- He also is tied for 51st nationally in interceptions.

GLASPY CONTINUES TO LEAD SECONDARY

- Safety Byron Glaspy's 38 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim's 47.
- He ranks fourth on the team with 50 tackles in 2008 and has four PBU.
- He is averging 5.0 tackles per game – tops on the team among DBs.
- Glaspy joined the team as a walk-on picked out of the student body three years ago and quickly worked his way up the depth chart.

CONRATH NAMED TO MIDSEASON FROSH ALL-AMERICA TEAM

- Redshirt freshman DE Matt Conrath was named to the Rivals.com Midseason Freshman All-America Team.
- Conrath has 28 tackles (19 solo), including six for loss (three sacks), this season.
- He also has three passes broken up and a blocked kick.
- Conrath also was named to College Football News' 2008 Redshirt Freshman All-America Team prior to the season.

SINTIM A CANDIDATE FOR NAGURSKI TROPHY

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.
- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the nation's best defensive player.
- He has started all 47 games in his career – currently tied for the 11th most consecutive starts in the FBS.

DO-IT-ALL HALL

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 49, tops among the team's corners.
- Against Georgia Tech, Hall had a diving, game-clinching interception in the fourth quarter. It was his third career INT and his second this year.
- Hall had an INT earlier this year vs. Richmond and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown.
- He also ranks sixth in the ACC in punt returns this season (6.2 average).

DEFENSE RECORDS ANOTHER SHUTOUT

- UVa's shutout vs. Maryland was the program's ninth since 2003 and second this season.
- At the time, UVa's last three wins had come by shutout (16-0 Sept. 6 vs. Richmond, 48-0 at Miami on Nov. 10, 2007).
- It marked the first time since the start of the 1952 season that three straight UVa wins had come via shutouts.
- UVa has recorded at least one shutout every season since 2003.

UVA SECOND IN SHUTOUTS SINCE '01

- Virginia is second in the ACC in shutouts since 2001, Al Groh's first year at UVa.
- The Cavaliers have nine shutouts, second only to Virginia Tech, which has 13 since 2001.
- Boston College (seven) and Miami (five) are the only other schools with more than four shutouts in the last eight seasons.

PRUETT DEBUTS AS D-COORDINATOR

- UVa's defense is guided by first-year defensive coordinator Bob Pruett.
- A longtime friend of Al Groh, Pruett has 40 years of coaching experience.
- Pruett won the 1996 I-AA National Championship and five conference titles as head coach at Marshall (1996-2004).

REYERING MAKES FOOTBALL DEBUT

- Yannick Reyering became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 6-for-11 in field goals and has kicked 16 PATs this season.
- The USC contest marked the first time

- Reyering ever played in a football game.
- Reyering was a first-team All-ACC pick in 2007 (13 goals, four game-winning goals).
- He is a three-time All-ACC honoree; he led UVa in scoring all three years.
- He netted 39 goals and 10 assists during his decorated career before suffering season-ending knee injury prior to 2007 ACC Tournament.
- He led UVa to College Cup (final four of men's soccer) in 2006.

WALK-ON SUCCESS
