GAMEDAY INFORMATION

TV COVERAGE

- The Raycom/ACC Network is televising the game.
- Steve Martin (play-by-play), Rick Walker (analyst) and Mike Hogewood (sidelines) have the call.

- All Virginia games are broadcast on the Virginia Sports Network, originating at WINA/WWV in Charlottesville.

THE SERIES VS. THE PIRATES

- Virginia meets East Carolina for just the third time this week. ECU has won both of the previous meetings.

- Two years ago, Virginia suffered a 31-21 defeat in its first-ever visit to Greenville.
- The only other meeting was in 1975, a 61-10 Pirate victory in Charlottesville.

OFFENSE COMES ALIVE

- After struggling in its first four games, Virginia's offense had a breakout game Saturday vs. Maryland. UVa set season highs in several categories:
 - Points, 31
 - Total Offense, 427
 - Rushing Yards, 201
 - Passing Yards, 226
 - First Downs, 26
 - Time of Possession, 35:06
- Virginia also took care of the ball and did not turn it over for the first time since the game at Maryland last year (Oct. 20).

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- East Carolina and Virginia have met just twice previously – the Pirates won both times.
- Against Maryland, UVa bested its previous high for total offense by 123 yards (Duke, 304) and posted its highest offensive total since the 2007 Maryland game (439).
- Ras-I Dowling has three interceptions in the last two games. He already has more interceptions than any UVa player had in 2007.
- Clint Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this season and also is the national leader in sacks among linebackers.
- Virginia has had 16 players make their first career start this season while 20 have made their first college appearance.

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

MORE ON THE UVA-ECU SERIES

- In the 1975 contest, Sonny Randle returned to Charlottesville to take over the UVA program following a three-year run at East Carolina where he led the Pirates to a 22-10 record and two Southern Conference titles.
- ECU held a 6-3 lead heading into the second quarter, but they then erupted for 55 unanswered points.
- The Pirates rushed for 633 yards, scored nine touchdowns on the ground and rolled up 36 first downs (all ECU records and UVA opponent records). ECU's 690 yards of total offense are the second-most ever allowed by Virginia.

2006: EAST CAROLINA 31, VIRGINIA 21

- Brandon Fractious had 102 yards and one of East Carolina's four rushing touchdowns to lead the Pirates past Virginia in 2006 in Greenville, N.C.
- Brandon Simmons and James Pinkney also ran for scores for the Pirates. East Carolina finished with 432 total yards despite playing without starting wide receiver Aundrae Allison and running back Chris Johnson. The Pirates also got a 2-yard rushing score from punter Ryan Dougherty on a fake field goal with 2:17 left to seal the win.
- Jason Snelling ran for 103 yards and a touchdown for the Cavaliers.
- Pinkney ran for 42 yards and threw for 224.

ECU-UVA: TWO YEARS LATER

- Several key players in the 2008 ECU-UVA matchup also were factors in the 2006 contest in Greenville:

VIRGINIA VS. CONFERENCE USA

- This is just the second time Virginia has played a game against a Conference USA

opponent. The only other time was two years ago at East Carolina.

- Of the 12 current members of C-USA, the Cavaliers have only played two (East Carolina, Tulane) and, except for the 2006 ECU game, that was long before they became league members. In games against these two schools, Virginia is 2-5 overall.
- C-USA currently consists of East Carolina, Houston, Marshall, Memphis, Rice, SMU, Southern Miss, Tulane, Tulsa, UAB, UCF and UTEP.
- Of former C-USA members, Virginia played three (Army, Louisville, TCU) but they were not conference members at game time.
- Virginia has now played at least one game against a school from every Division I-A conference except the Sun Belt at some point in program history.

FRESHMAN FOURSOME CRACKS LINEUP

- DB Rodney McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke to become the fourth true freshman to see action for Virginia in 2008. McLeod also played several plays from scrimmage.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor and LB Cam Johnson.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California.

PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start Saturday at Maryland.
- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

PASZTOR ALSO BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER

- With Pasztor making his first start, 16 Cavaliers now have made the first start of their careers this season.
- There have been plenty on each side of the ball, with eight first-timers on offense and eight on defense.

MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS

- 20 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the first five games this season after Curt Orshoski saw time on the kickoff team last Saturday.

- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and six have followed suit in the last four games.

- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.
- On Defense: DE Nick Conrath, DL John-Kevin Dolce, LB Terence Fells-Danzer, NT Nick Jenkins, LB Cam Johnson, CB Dom Joseph, DB Rodney McLeod, CB Chase Minnifield, S Corey Mosley, DE Zane Parr.

HOLD OPPONENTS TO FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING AND WIN

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 21 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including Richmond, Duke and Maryland this season.
- Virginia is 18-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke two weeks ago.

FOUR HOOS HAIL FROM NORTH CAROLINA

- Virginia has four players who hail from North Carolina, including two Durham natives, S Brandon Woods and WR Maurice Covington, who each went to Southern Durham High School.
- Chris Hinkebein (Providence) and Rico Bell (Vance) each are from Charlotte.

A BIG WIN OVER MARYLAND

- The win was UVA's most lopsided in the series since a 48-13 Cavalier win in Scott Stadium in 2002.
- It marked the first time Maryland has been shut out by UVA since a 16-0 loss in 2004.

CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST TEAM IN ACC

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVa has averaged just 45.3 penalty yards per game since 2001, although it is averaging 52.2 penalty yards through the first five games this year.

UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL

- Virginia has played more football games than any other Atlantic Coast Conference school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,185 games in this, the 119th season of UVa football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 610-527-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,164 games played in 118 seasons. UVa is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.
- Penn (1,285) has played the most games overall.

TOUGH SLATE OUT OF CONFERENCE

- UVa's first three opponents (USC, Richmond, UConn) are a combined 12-4 this year after earning 31 victories a year ago.
- USC is currently ranked No. 8 nationally

and UConn is receiving votes, while Richmond was the FCS No. 1 squad prior to its upset loss to Villanova two weeks ago.

- East Carolina, UVa's opponent this week, was nationally ranked after wins over Virginia Tech and West Virginia but dropped out of the polls last week.

OVERALL SCHEDULE ALSO STRONG

- Of Virginia remaining seven opponents, only one (Miami, 2-3) has a losing record.
- UVa's opponents combined to go 91-64 (.587) last year.
- UVa's opponents' 2007 winning percentage ranks 19th nationally.
- Eight of the 12 opponents had .500-plus records and played in bowls in 2007.
- UVa's schedule was ranked 10th toughest in the country recently by ESPN.com.

YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?

- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.

- UVa's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

LOTS OF NEW FACES

- UVa features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.
- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead linebackers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and will par-

ticipate as graduate students this season.

- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVA has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

PEERMAN BURSTS BACK ONTO SCENE

- After being limited in the first four games by an injury, Cedric Peerman had a big game vs. Maryland.
- Peerman notched 110 yards rushing for his fourth career 100-yard rushing day. It also was the most yards for a UVA back this season, bettering Peerman's 60-yard outing vs. Richmond.
- Peerman also racked up a career-best seven receptions.

PEERMAN PILES UP YARDAGE

- Cedric Peerman now has 1,181 career rushing yards -- 32nd all time at Virginia.
- He is just the 36th player to go over 1,000 in a career at UVA.

OGLETREE CRACKS CENTURY MARK AGAIN ...

- Kevin Ogletree earned his third career 100-yard receiving day Saturday vs. Maryland, with exactly 100 yards.
- He also had 103 yards receiving Sept. 6 vs. Richmond.
- Ironically, Ogletree's other 100-yard performance came two years ago in UVA's home game vs. Maryland (133 yards).

... AND INCHING TOWARD ANOTHER CENTURY MARK

- Kevin Ogletree also has 86 career receptions and is 19th all-time in receptions at UVA.
- He needs three to tie for 18th place all-time (John Pincavage, 1963-65) and four to reach 17th (Michael McGrew, 2001-04).
- He is looking to become just the 14th player in school history to catch 100 passes in a career.

OGLETREE CONTINUES STREAK OF MULTIPLE RECEPTIONS

- Kevin Ogletree had five receptions for 100 yards vs. Maryland and now has at least two receptions in 16 straight games, dating to the start of 2006.

- He leads the team with 27 receptions for 318 yards (63.6 yards per game).
- Ogletree ranks second in the ACC in receptions per game (5.4) and fifth in yards per game.

OGLETREE GUNNING FOR THREE 100-YARD RECEIVING GAMES IN SEASON

- With two 100-yard games already this year, Kevin Ogletree is in line to become just the seventh player in UVA history to have three 100-yard receiving games in a season.
- No UVA player has had three 100-yard receiving games in a season since Billy McMullen recorded four in 2001.

CAVALIER WIDE RECEIVERS EMERGE

- Virginia wide receivers have combined for 649 yards receiving this year and are already approaching the wide receiver total from all of 2007.
- UVA wide receivers had 833 receiving yards in 13 games last season.
- UVA WRs have 61 receptions this year after catching 72 balls all of last year.

VERICA TURNS THINGS AROUND

- After a tough outing at Duke, Virginia quarterback Marc Verica made his first home start a memorable one, completing 25-of-34 passes for 226 yards and two TDs.
- He set career highs for completions, yards and touchdowns and also scrambled for his first rushing TD (five yards in the second quarter).
- Verica became the first UVA QB in nearly three years to complete 25 passes in a game (Marques Hagans vs. Minnesota, 2005 Music City Bowl).
- Verica also connected on his longest career pass, 51 yards, to Kevin Ogletree for a TD.

CAVALIERS SHOW BIG-PLAY POTENTIAL

- Marc Verica's 51-yard touchdown pass to Kevin Ogletree in the first quarter Saturday was significant in several ways:
 - It was UVA's first passing TD of the season.
 - It marked UVA's longest offensive play of the season.
 - It was Verica's longest career pass.
 - It equaled Ogletree's long career reception. He had a 51-yard reception (non-scoring) vs. Maryland in 2006.
 - It was UVA's longest reception in a game since Ogletree's catch in 2006 (24 games).

MONROE, SINTIM ON KIPER'S BIG BOARD

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 1 on ESPN's Mel Kiper's 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects. Senior LB Clint Sintim is slotted No. 25.
- Monroe also has been named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim is on the Nagurski Award watch list.
- Monroe started 11 games at left tackle last season and did not allow a sack all season.
- Monroe received honorable mention All-ACC recognition last season and joined Sintim on several preseason All-ACC squads this year.

TIGHT END U

- UVA TEs have caught 429 passes for 4,848 yards and 37 TDs since Al Groh arrived in 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span (nearly double).
- Senior John Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (19 receipts, 186 yards) and is second on the team in receiving yards this year.
- Redshirt freshman TE Andrew Devlin made his first career catch Saturday vs. Maryland.

KOCH STEPPING UP AT WR

- UVa WR Cary Koch is third on the team with 113 receiving yards.
- A senior transfer from Tulane, he finished the USC game with three catches for 40 yards – all in the first half.
- His 21-yard catch was a career best as a Cavalier. He had a 38-yard catch as a freshman at Tulane in 2005.

SIMPSON A DUAL-THREAT BACK

- Mikell Simpson tied for third in the ACC in rushing touchdowns (eight) in 2007.
- He also was ninth in the country (second in the ACC) in receptions by a running back with 43.
- His 43 receptions led the team.
- He had 119 yards rushing, 152 receiving in a breakout performance at Maryland when he touched the ball on UVa's final 14 plays, including a one-yard leap for the go-ahead score with 16 seconds left.
- Simpson's 96-yard TD run in the Gator Bowl was the longest in UVa history, second-longest in NCAA bowl history and the longest by an FBS player in 2007.

HOWELL THIRD NATIONALLY AMONG TRUE FRESHMAN PUNTERS

- Jimmy Howell ranks third nationally in punt average among true freshman (ninth nationally among all freshmen).
- He is averaging 38.26 yards per punt.
- Howell had a career-long 54-yard punt two weeks ago at Duke.

DEFENSE RECORDS ANOTHER SHUTOUT

- UVa's shutout Saturday vs. Maryland was the program's ninth since 2003 and second this season.
- The Cavaliers' last three wins have come by shutout, 16-0 Sept. 6 vs. Richmond and 48-0 at Miami on Nov. 10, 2007.
- It marks the first time since the start of the 1952 season that three straight UVa wins have come via shutouts.
- UVa has recorded at least one shutout every season since 2003.

UVA SECOND IN SHUTOUTS SINCE 2001

- Virginia is second in the ACC in shutouts since 2001, Al Groh's first year at UVa.
- The Cavaliers have nine shutouts, second only to Virginia Tech, which has 13 since 2001.
- Boston College (six) and Miami (five) are the only other schools with more than four shutouts in the last eight seasons.

DEFENSE SHOWS ITS TEETH

- The defense held Maryland to just 13 first downs, a season low for a UVa opponent.
- The Cavaliers forced two turnovers and allowed the Terps to complete just 4 of 13 attempts on third down.

SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY

- With a career-high tying three sacks at Duke, Clint Sintim now has 22 career sacks and five this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- His 22 career sacks are the most for any current linebacker in the country (no LB has more than 14).
- It also is tied for eighth for all players nationally and ranks eighth in UVa history.
- He has the second-most sacks ever by a UVa linebacker (Darryl Blackstock leads with 27).
- Sintim also leads the ACC in sacks this season.

DOWLING RETURNS TO LINEUP WITH A BANG

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling had a career-best two interceptions at Duke to double his career INT total.
- He made his first start of 2008 and added a career-high eight tackles.
- Dowling had been hampered by an injury early this season and did not play in the opener vs. Southern California.
- He saw limited action vs. Richmond, then had three tackles at Connecticut.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.

MORE ON DOWLING

- After his interception vs. Maryland, Dowling has three interceptions this season in four games – more than any UVa player had all of last season and most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Despite his limited play time, Dowling still ranks second in the ACC in interceptions and with six passes defensed.

TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER

- ILB Jon Copper tied a career high with 12 tackles two weeks ago at Duke.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 26 of his 30 games.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-85.
- Copper has gotten off to a good start with a team-high 35 tackles (19 solo), including three games of nine or more.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.
- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

GLASPY CONTINUES TO LEAD SECONDARY

- Byron Glaspy's 33 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim's 42.
- He ranks third on the team with 25 tackles in 2008 and has two PBU.
- He ranks fifth among ACC DBs in tackling this season (6.2 per game).
- Glaspy joined the team as a walk-on picked out of the student body three years ago and quickly worked his way up the depth chart.

NOTING UVA ATHLETICS

UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVa coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

DEFENSE PREVENTING SACKS

- Virginia's young offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just six sacks in five games.
- The Cavaliers are third behind Florida State and Boston College (five) for the fewest sacks allowed in the ACC.
- UVA ranks 30th nationally in fewest sacks allowed.

CONRATH OFF TO BIG START

- Redshirt freshman DE Nick Conrath has started his college career strong, with 13 tackles (eight solo), including five for loss (two sacks), this season.
- He also has two passes broken up and a blocked kick.
- Conrath was named to College Football News' 2008 Redshirt Freshman All-America Team prior to the season.

SINTIM A CANDIDATE FOR NAGURSKI TROPHY

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.

- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the nation's best defensive player.
- He has started all 42 games in his career – currently tied for the 11th most consecutive starts in the FBS.
- His nine sacks last year led the nation's linebackers.

DO-IT-ALL HALL

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 23, tops among the team's corners.
- Hall had his second career interception and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown against Richmond.
- He also is an electrifying punt returner who was fifth in ACC last season with 10.0-yard punt return average and had 230 punt return yards – most by a Cavalier since 2004.

SPOTLIGHT ON LINEBACKERS

- Linebacker is a strong spot on defense

for Virginia.

- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters.
- The trio comprises three of the top four returning Virginia tacklers.
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 42, Appleby - 32, Copper - 30).
- Copper has 235 career tackles, while Sintim has 205 and Appleby 190.

PRUETT DEBUTS AS D-COORDINATOR

- UVA's defense is guided by first-year defensive coordinator Bob Pruett.
- A longtime friend of Al Groh, Pruett has 40 years of coaching experience.
- Pruett won the 1996 I-AA National Championship and five conference titles as head coach at Marshall (1996-2004).

WALK-ON SUCCESS

- Four players who originally joined the program as walk-ons are have or are vying for starting positions:
 - ILB Jon Copper
 - S Byron Glaspy
 - WR Staton Jobe
 - WR Cary Koch
- All four have earned scholarships during their time at UVA.

OTHER UVA WALK-ONS

- Virginia has had remarkable success with walk-ons through the years.
- Al Groh, a walk-on himself at UVA, says his philosophy is to play the players who give the team the best chance to win.
- Notable former UVA walk-ons include:

 - NFL Pro Bowl DE Patrick Kerney
 - NFL 1,000-yard WR Patrick Jeffers

THORNTON LIVING ON THE LAWN

- Punter John Thornton will live on The Lawn in 2008. This is one of the most prestigious honors at UVA. He is living in Room No. 4, matching his uniform number.
- Just over 100 students are selected based on academic and service merit. Thornton is one of two UVA student-athletes living on The Lawn this year, joining baseball pitcher Andrew Carraway.

- Yannick Reyerer became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 4-for-6 in field goals and has kicked seven PATs this season.
- Reyerer also has handled kickoff duties.
- The USC contest marked the first time Reyerer ever played in a football game.
- Gaffney, the only player to have his UVa soccer number retired, led the team with 53 points (17-17 XP, 12-16 FG) in 1986.

They have different styles, but if you look at their stats from last year, they compare.
