GAMEDAY INFORMATION

TELEVISION COVERAGE

- ESPN is televising the game.
- Doug Bell (play-by-play) and Charles Arbuckle (color analysis) have the call.

RADIO COVERAGE

- All Virginia games are broadcast on the Virginia Sports Network, originating at WINA/WWV in Charlottesville.
- Dave Koehn (play-by-play), Frank Quayle (color analysis) and Tim Sherman (sidelines) have the call.

SERIES VS. THE YELLOW JACKETS

- Virginia holds a slim 15-14-1 edge in the 43-year-old series, but has won four of the last five games to take the series lead.
- Overall the home team has won 12 of the last 13 meetings.

- The home team won nine straight from 1995 until UVA's 30-10 victory in Atlanta in 2004.
- The Cavaliers are 6-12 in Atlanta but have a 9-2-1 edge at home and have won the last eight on their home turf.
- Four of the last five meetings have been decided by double digits.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Virginia has won four of the last five meetings with Georgia Tech.
- The home team has won 12 of the last 13 games in the series, dating to 1995. The lone aberration was UVA's win at Tech in 2004.
- Virginia has averaged 27.3 points and 377.3 total yards per game during its three-game winning streak. The Cavaliers averaged 9.0 points and 251.2 yards per game in starting the year 1-3.
- The game features the ACC leader in sacks (Georgia Tech) versus the ACC co-leader in fewest sacks allowed (Virginia).
- With 1.14 sacks per game this year, Clint Sintim ranks sixth nationally and leads the ACC in sacks. He also is the national leader in sacks among linebackers.

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

MORE ON THE UVA-GT SERIES

- Georgia Tech's last win in Charlottesville came in 1990 when the No. 16 Yellow Jackets knocked off the top-ranked Cavaliers 41-38 on a last-second field goal.
- All six meetings between 1996-2002 were decided by a touchdown or less.
- Since 1996 Virginia's seven victories have come by an average of 8.4 points, while Georgia Tech's five wins have come by an average of 13.8 points.
- The Yellow Jackets' average is skewed by a 35-0 win in 2000, the only blowout in the last decade.

TIGHT GAMES OR ROUTS

- Since the Yellow Jackets began playing an ACC schedule in 1983, the teams have met 25 times and 13 of the games have been decided by eight points or fewer.
- Since 1983, the series has featured one tie and other games decided by one point (two games), three points (3), four (2), five (1), six (1), seven (2) and eight points (1).

TURNOVERS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

- Since 1982, the Cavaliers are 9-1 vs. Georgia Tech when committing fewer turnovers. The lone loss occurred in 1991.
- Georgia Tech, on the other hand, is 6-4-1 when it commits fewer turnovers.
- There have been five games since 1982 ('82, '87, '98, '02, '05) where the teams had equal turnovers; UVA won only in 1987 and 2005.
- In the last six meetings, Virginia has recorded 12 takeaways and turned them into 50 points, including two takeaways for 14 points last year.
- Since Al Groh took over as Virginia's head coach in 2001, the Cavaliers have committed 10 turnovers in the seven games against Georgia Tech.
- Conversely, the Yellow Jackets have turned the ball over at least once in every game since 2001.

GEORGIA TECH USES FIELD GOALS TO SINK VIRGINIA ...

- Georgia Tech has kicked 22 field goals vs. Virginia since 1990 and has seen five games decided by those kicks.
- The Yellow Jackets won the 1990 and 1991 contests with last-second field goals by Scott Sisson.
- The Jackets connected on two field

goals to win the 1996 meeting by six points.

- Georgia Tech booted two field goals and won by three points in 1998.
- In 2004 the Yellow Jackets kicked three field goals in an eight-point win.

... BUT VIRGINIA TURNS IT AROUND OF LATE

- Connor Hughes tied the school record by booting a school-record tying five field goals in UVA's 29-17 win in 2003.
- The following season he made three field goals in a 30-10 win and in 2005 he connected on two more field goals.
- UVA has not hit a field goal in the last two meetings and has just 12 field goals in the last 13 contests with Tech.

2007: VIRGINIA 28, GEORGIA TECH 23

- Jameel Sewell threw a 26-yard touchdown pass to Staton Jobe one play after a muffed punt recovery in the fourth quarter, and Virginia rallied after blowing an early lead and beat Georgia Tech, 28-23, in Charlottesville.
- The Cavaliers also got 138 rushing yards from Cedric Peerman and several big plays from defensive end Chris Long.
- Long batted several passes away, one turning into a 25-yard interception return, and sacked Taylor Bennett on fourth down at Virginia's 30 late in the game.
- Sewell finished 16-for-25 for 177 yards and the winning TD pass.

WAHOOS WIN ON THE ROAD WHEN SCORING FIRST

- Virginia has started slow on the road this year, going 0-2 after posting a 4-2 mark away from home last season.
- Since 1987, UVA has played 113 games at opponents' stadiums, winning 55.
- One of the keys in the 55 wins is UVA's ability to score first. The Wahoos are 40-15-1 (.723) in that span when they score first.
- Virginia has scored first in six of its last nine road wins dating back to 2004.

SOMETHING HAS TO GIVE

- The game this week features the ACC's leader in sacks against the leader in fewest sacks allowed.
- UVA is tied for first in the ACC in fewest sacks allowed (eight), while Georgia Tech leads the ACC in sacks (23). UVA is second

to the Yellow Jackets in sacks (19).

- UVA has allowed more than one sack just once (USC), while Georgia Tech has two or more sacks in five of seven games this year.

VIRGINIA VS. RANKED TEAMS

- Virginia is 1-1 vs. ranked teams this year with a win last week over then-No. 18 North Carolina and a loss in the season opener to then-No. 3 Southern California.
- Virginia is 11-17 against ranked teams since 2001 under head coach Al Groh.
- UVA has not faced ranked teams in consecutive weeks since 2005 when it played No. 24 Georgia Tech, No. 7 Virginia Tech and No. 10 Miami (Fla.) in succession from Nov. 12-26.
- The Cavaliers have not defeated a ranked team on the road since Sept. 22, 2001, at then-No. 19 Clemson (26-24).

VIRGINIA VS. RANKED GEORGIA TECH TEAMS

- UVA last faced a ranked Georgia Tech team in 2005, a 27-17 win at home over the No. 24 Yellow Jackets.
- Virginia is 4-5-1 all-time against ranked Georgia Tech teams, including an 0-4 mark in Atlanta.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN CRACK LINEUP

- PK Robert Randolph became the fifth true freshman to play for UVA this season after seeing action in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor, LB Cam Johnson and DB Rodney McLeod.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California. McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke and also played several plays from scrimmage.

PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start against Maryland.

- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

DEVLIN BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER

- Redshirt freshman TE Andrew Devlin started vs. East Carolina as part of UVa's two tight end set, becoming the 17th Cavalier to make the first start of his career this season.
- There have been plenty on each side of the ball, with nine first-timers on offense and eight on defense.

MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS

- 22 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the six games this season after kickers Chris Hinkebein and Robert Randolph played vs. East Carolina.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and eight have followed suit in the last five games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.
- On Defense: DE Nick Conrath, DL John-Kevin Dolce, LB Terence Fells-Danzer, NT Nick Jenkins, LB Cam Johnson, CB Dom Joseph, DB Rodney McLeod, CB Chase Minnifield, S Corey Mosley, DE Zane Parr.
- On Special Teams: P Jimmy Howell, PK Yannick Reyering, PK Chris Hinkebein, PK Robert Randolph.

TWO CAVALIERS FROM PEACH STATE

- Virginia has just two players who hail from Georgia, and both are true freshmen: WR Javaris Brown (Macon/Northeast) and DL Tory Allen (Fayetteville/Lovejoy).
- Neither has seen playing time this season and are expected to redshirt.
- Georgia Tech has no players from the state of Virginia.

CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST TEAM IN ACC

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.

- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVa has averaged just 45.0 penalty yards per game since 2001 and is averaging 46.6 penalty yards this year.

UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL

- Virginia has played more football games than any other ACC school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,187 games in this, the 119th season of UVa football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 611-527-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,170 games played in 118 seasons. UVa is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.
- Penn (1,288) has played the most games overall.

MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?

- UVa won its first close game Saturday after having a season full of them in 2007.

- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVa's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

TOUGH SLATE OUT OF CONFERENCE

- UVa's non-conference opponents (USC, Richmond, UConn, East Carolina) are a combined 19-9 this year after earning 31 victories a year ago.
- USC is currently ranked No. 6 nationally, while Richmond was the FCS No. 1 squad prior to its upset loss to Villanova four weeks ago.
- East Carolina and Connecticut each were ranked earlier this season but have since dropped out of the polls.

OVERALL SCHEDULE ALSO STRONG

- Four of Virginia's remaining five opponents are at .500 or better this year – only Clemson (3-4) is below .500.
- UVa's opponents combined to go 91-64 (.587) last year.
- UVa's opponents' 2007 winning percentage ranks 19th nationally.
- Eight of the 12 opponents had .500-plus records and played in bowls in 2007.
- UVa's schedule was ranked 10th toughest in the country recently by ESPN.com.

LOTS OF NEW FACES

- UVa features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).

- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.
- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead line-backers nationally.

- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and will participate as graduate students this season.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

HOOS HOLDING ONTO THE BALL

- Virginia has not lost a fumble in the last three games.
- UVa last lost a fumble in the fourth quarter of the Duke game – a span of 40 drives and 211 offensive plays.
- The Cavaliers' defense has recovered four fumbles during that span.

PEERMAN BURSTS BACK ONTO SCENE

- After being limited in the first four games by an injury, Cedric Peerman has exploded in the last three games.
- Peerman rushed for 100-plus yards in consecutive games with 110 vs. Maryland and 173 against East Carolina.
- He is averaging 6.0 yards per carry this season and ranks fifth in the ACC with 70.5 rushing yards per game.
- Peerman set career highs for receptions in two of the last three weeks with seven vs. Maryland and eight against East Carolina.
- He ranks seventh in the ACC this season with 4.17 receptions per game and leads ACC running backs in receptions.

PEERMAN PILES UP YARDAGE

- Cedric Peerman now has 1,398 career rushing yards -- 26th all time at Virginia.
- Next up on the rushing chart: Kevin Morgan (1985-88), who had 1,504 career rushing yards.
- Peerman is just the 36th player to go over 1,000 in a career at UVa.

A COMPLETE 180

- Virginia's three-game winning streak is no coincidence. After starting 1-3, the Cavaliers have turned it around in all phases of their game.

OGLETREE ECLIPSES 1,000 CAREER RECEIVING YARDS

- With his catch of 23 yards in the third quarter vs. North Carolina, Kevin Ogletree moved past the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yards.
- With 72 yards vs. UNC, he now has 1,064 career receiving yards.
- He ranks 24th in receiving yards in school history.

OGLETREE CRACKS CENTURY MARK AGAIN ...

- He leads the team with 37 receptions for 455 yards (65.0 yards per game).
- Ogletree ranks third in the ACC in receptions per game (5.29) and receiving yards per game (65.0).

- Virginia wide receivers have combined for 939 yards receiving this year and already eclipsed the wide receiver total from all of 2007.
- UVa wide receivers had 833 receiving yards in 13 games last season.
- UVa WRs have 82 receptions this year after catching 72 balls in 2007.

VERICA TURNS THINGS AROUND

- After a tough outing at Duke, Virginia quarterback Marc Verica has made three straight strong starts.
- Versus North Carolina, he led the Cavaliers on a game-tying drive in the final two minutes of regulation, then the winning drive in overtime.
- Against East Carolina, Verica had 14 straight completions to tie a school record for most consecutive completions in a game.
- Against Maryland, he set career highs

for completions (25), yards (226) and touchdowns (2) and also scrambled for his first rushing TD (five yards in the second quarter).

- Verica became the first UVa QB in nearly three years to complete 25 passes in a game (Marques Hagans vs. Minnesota, 2005 Music City Bowl), then matched it the following week vs. ECU.
- Verica also connected on his longest career pass, 51 yards, to Kevin Ogletree for a TD against Maryland.

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 1 on ESPN’s Mel Kiper’s 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects.
- Monroe also has been named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim is on the Nagurski Award watch list.
- Monroe graded out at 91 percent last week vs. North Carolina – the highest

NOTING PEERMAN'S BIG DAY

- Cedric Peerman rushed for a season-best 173 yards two weeks ago vs. East Carolina. It was just 13 yards off his career high of 186, set last year at North Carolina.
- Peerman's 79-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the longest rush of his career.
- It also tied for the seventh-longest rushing play in UVa history, the fifth-longest rush for a TD in UVa history and the third-longest UVa run for a TD in Scott Stadium history.
- He became just the second player in UVa history to post two runs of 60 or more yards (79, 60). The other was John Papit vs. Washington & Lee in 1948 (63, 60).
- The last UVa player to have two runs of 50+ yards in a game was Barry Word vs. Georgia Tech in 1985 (79-TD, 52).

TRICKY, TRICKY

- Scott Deke hit John Phillips on a 12-yard TD toss on a fake field goal in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- It was UVa's first pass out of a field goal formation since Matt Schaub threw a 10-yard pass to Heath Miller for a first down against Virginia Tech in 2003.
- It also was Deke's first career TD pass.

NOTING UVA ATHLETICS

UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVa coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

SACK ATTACK

- The Cavaliers are second in the ACC and 21st in the FBS with 2.71 sacks per game (19 total).
- TCU leads the FBS with 4.13 sacks per game, while Oklahoma is second (3.71) and San Jose State third (3.57).
- Georgia Tech, UVA's opponent this week, leads the ACC with 2.86 sacks per game.

OPPONENTS OFTEN GET FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 22 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including three straight this year.
- Virginia is 19-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke this year.
- Virginia has held three of its last four opponents – Duke (84), Maryland (79) and East Carolina (89) – to fewer than 100 yards rushing. UVA also held Richmond to 19 yards rushing earlier this season.

SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY

- With a sack vs. North Carolina, Clint Sintim now has 25 career sacks and has been in on seven solo and two assisted sacks this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- His 25 career sacks are the most for any current linebacker in the country (no LB has more than 15.5).
- It also is tied for sixth nationally among all players nationally.
- He is fourth in UVA history and needs one to match Mike Frederick (1991-94) for third.
- He has the second-most sacks ever by a UVA linebacker (Darryl Blackstock, 27).
- Sintim also leads the ACC in sacks this season and has seven in the last four weeks.
- The last UVA player to have sacks in five straight games was Chris Long last year.

- Copper leads the team with 60 tackles, followed by Appleby (46) and Sintim (45).
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 44, Appleby - 34, Copper - 32).
- Copper has 260 career tackles, while Sintim has 220 and Appleby 201.

TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER

- ILB Jon Copper had a career-best 16 tackles last week vs. North Carolina. It topped his previous high of 12.
- Copper's 16 sacks were the most by any UVa player since Angelo Crowell had 16 vs. Penn State in 2002.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 28 of his 32 games.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-85.
- Copper leads the team with 60 tackles, including five games of nine or more.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.
- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

APPLEBY ON THE ATTACK

- With his 11-tackle performance vs. East Carolina, Antonio Appleby took over the team lead in tackles with 46.
- Prior to being injured early in the UNC game, he led the team in tackles in each of the previous two games.
- He also has had six or more tackles in the first six games this season.

DOWLING RETURNS TO LINEUP WITH A BANG

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling had a career-best two interceptions at Duke to double his career INT total.
- He made his first start of 2008 and added a career-high eight tackles.
- Dowling had been hampered by an injury early this season and did not play in the opener vs. Southern California.
- He saw limited action vs. Richmond, then had three tackles at Connecticut.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.

MORE ON DOWLING

- After his interception vs. Maryland, Dowling has three interceptions this season – more than any UVa player had all of last season and most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Despite his limited play time, Dowling still ranks fourth in the ACC in interceptions and with eight passes defended.
- He also is tied for 14th nationally in interceptions.

GLASPY CONTINUES TO LEAD SECONDARY

- Byron Glaspy's 35 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim's 44.
- He ranks fourth on the team with 33 tackles in 2008 and has two PBU.
- He is averaging 4.7 tackles per game – tops on the team among DBs.
- Glaspy joined the team as a walk-on picked out of the student body three years ago and quickly worked his way up the depth chart.

DEFENSE PREVENTING SACKS

- Virginia's offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just eight sacks in seven games.
- The Cavaliers are tied for the ACC lead with Boston College and Florida State for the fewest sacks allowed in the ACC.
- UVa ranks 24th nationally in fewest sacks allowed.

CONRATH NAMED TO MIDSEASON FROSH ALL-AMERICA TEAM

- Redshirt freshman DE Matt Conrath was named to the Rivals.com Midseason Freshman All-America Team.
- Conrath has 16 tackles (nine solo), including six for loss (three sacks), this season.
- Conrath ranks ninth in the ACC in sacks.
- He also has three passes broken up and a blocked kick.
- Conrath also was named to College Football News' 2008 Redshirt Freshman All-America Team prior to the season.

SINTIM A CANDIDATE FOR NAGURSKI TROPHY

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.
- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the na-

tion's best defensive player.

- He has started all 44 games in his career – currently tied for the 11th most consecutive starts in the FBS.

DO-IT-ALL HALL

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 31, tops among the team's corners.
- Hall had his second career interception and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown against Richmond.
- He also is an adept punt returner who ranks seventh in the ACC this season (6.1 average). He had had 230 punt return yards in 2007 – most by a Cavalier since 2004.

DEFENSE RECORDS ANOTHER SHUTOUT

- UVa's shutout vs. Maryland was the program's ninth since 2003 and second this season.
- The Cavaliers' last three wins have come by shutout, 16-0 Sept. 6 vs. Richmond and 48-0 at Miami on Nov. 10, 2007.
- It marks the first time since the start of the 1952 season that three straight UVa wins have come via shutouts.
- UVa has recorded at least one shutout every season since 2003.

UVa SECOND IN SHUTOUTS SINCE 2001

- Virginia is second in the ACC in shutouts since 2001, Al Groh's first year at UVa.
- The Cavaliers have nine shutouts, second only to Virginia Tech, which has 13 since 2001.
- Boston College (six) and Miami (five) are the only other schools with more than four shutouts in the last eight seasons.

PRUETT DEBUTS AS D-COORDINATOR

- UVa's defense is guided by first-year defensive coordinator Bob Pruett.
- A longtime friend of Al Groh, Pruett has 40 years of coaching experience.
- Pruett won the 1996 I-AA National Championship and five conference titles as head coach at Marshall (1996-2004).

- Punter John Thornton is living on The Lawn this year. This is one of the most prestigious honors at UVa. He is living in Room No. 4, matching his uniform number.
- Just over 100 students are selected based on academic and service merit. Thornton is one of two UVa student-athletes living on The Lawn this year, joining baseball pitcher Andrew Carraway.

REYERING MAKES FOOTBALL DEBUT

- Yannick Reyerer became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 4-for-7 in field goals and has kicked 11 PATs this season.
- Reyerer also has handled kickoff duties.
- The USC contest marked the first time Reyerer ever played in a football game.
- Gaffney, the only player to have his UVa soccer number retired, led the team with 53 points (17-17 XP, 12-16 FG) in 1986.
- Reyerer was first-team All-ACC pick in 2007 (13 goals, four game-winning goals).
- He is a three-time All-ACC honoree; he led UVa in scoring all three years.
- He netted 39 goals and 10 assists during his decorated career before suffering season-ending knee injury prior to 2007

ACC Tournament.

- He led UVa to College Cup (final four of men's soccer) in 2006.

NEW LOOK TO KICKING GAME

- Virginia is breaking in new kickers and punters this season.
- It is the first time since 2002 that UVa has had a new kicker and punter in the same year.
- In 2002, Tom Hagan took over as punter and Kurt Smith as kicker, although Connor Hughes took over as PK midway through season.
