- losses coming in 2000 (Clemson) and 2006 (Maryland).
- UVa has won six of seven ACC home openers under Al Groh, with the only loss coming in '06 to Maryland (28-26).

HOOS' NIGHT STREAK AT HOME ON THE LINE

- Virginia has won five straight home night games (games starting after 6 p.m.), dating back to a 19-14 loss to then-No. 7 Florida State on Oct. 18, 2003.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- The Cavaliers have won six of their seven home ACC openers under head coach Al Groh.
- Virginia has captured 12 of the last 16 meetings with Maryland, but the Terrapins hold a 41-29-2 overall series edge.
- Virginia has won seven of its last eight home games against Maryland dating to 1992. All but one of the wins were determined by double figures.
- Clint Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this season and also is the national leader in sacks among linebackers.
- Virginia has had 15 players make their first career starts this season after NT Nick Jenkins and S Corey Mosley earned their first starts last week vs. Duke.

ACC INJURY POLICY

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

MARYLAND-VIRGINIA SERIES

- Maryland owns a 41-29-2 record in the series and holds a 21-18 record in Charlottesville. The Terrapins own a 20-11-2 edge in College Park.
- Maryland rallied from a 20-0 halftime deficit to win 28-26 in Charlottesville in 2006, its last visit to Charlottesville.
- The Cavaliers and Terps have played every season since 1957, the second-longest current streak for a Virginia opponent behind North Carolina (1910).
- Virginia and Maryland have met 72 times on the gridiron, making the Terps the fourth-most played opponent in UVA history (Virginia has faced North Carolina a record 112 times).

COACHING TIES TO MARYLAND

- UVA defensive line coach Levern Belin was the defensive line coach on Ron Vanderlinden's staff at Maryland from 1999-2000.
- While coaching at Wake Forest, UVA head coach Al Groh led the Demon Deacons to a 27-21 win over the Terps in College Park in 1986. Groh went 1-5 vs. Maryland while at Wake.

FIRST QUARTER DROUGHT VS. MARYLAND

- Virginia used big first quarters to win in 1999 (17 points) and 2000 (21 points), but since then the Cavaliers have scored just 13 first-quarter points—10 in 2006 and three last year.
- Overall, Virginia has scored just 69 points combined in the first quarter of the last 16 meetings vs. the Terps.
- Virginia has scored 13 points in the opening quarter this year (3.25 avg.)

UVA GROUND GAME KEY TO VICTORY

- When the Cavaliers are able to run the ball, they increase their chances to win against Maryland.
- Virginia rushed for 191 yards last season in its win in College Park.
- In 2005, the Cavaliers rushed for 295 yards, their fourth-highest total ever against Maryland, to gain a 16-0 win.
- In the 2006 loss to Maryland, UVA rushed for 181 yards, ending a streak of 10 consecutive series wins with at least 150 yards.
- Overall UVA is 21-8 since 1937 when gaining at least 150 rushing yards.

- In contrast, when Virginia is unable to run the ball, Maryland typically comes out on top.
- Virginia has lost 15 consecutive games to Maryland when rushing for fewer than 100 yards, dating back to 1957.
- Since 1957 UVA has averaged 214.5 yards rushing in wins over the Terps and 119.8 yards in losses.
- Since 1937 the team with the most rushing yards is 54-5 and won all 38 meetings from 1937-86. The only years the loser had more occurred in 1987, 1990, 1998, 1999 and 2006.

VIRGINIA DEFENSE TOUGH VS. TERPS

- Another factor that has enabled the Cavaliers to win 12 of the last 16 meetings against Maryland is an ability to hold the Terrapin offense in check.
- Virginia has held Maryland under 380 yards of offense 15 times since 1988 and won 13 of those games.
- During UVA's nine-game winning streak (1992-2000), the Cavaliers allowed an average of 113.8 yards on the ground and 183.4 through the air to the Terps.
- Overall, Maryland has topped 200 yards rushing only four times since 1987 (1999, 2001, 2003, 2005). The Terps also have thrown 23 interceptions and allowed 33 quarterback sacks vs. UVA since 1992.

UM-UVA FOURTH-QUARTER THEATRICALS

- Each of the last three games between the teams has been decided by a fourth-quarter rally.
- Last season, Virginia scored the winning TD with 16 seconds remaining to claim an 18-17 win.
- In 2006, Maryland rallied from a 20-0 halftime deficit and earned a 28-26 win in Scott Stadium.
- In 2005, the Terrapins trailed 26-24 entering the fourth quarter, then scored three touchdowns in a 45-33 win.

- Reserve running back Mikell Simpson capped an amazing all-around performance by scoring the winning touchdown with 16 seconds left as Virginia beat Maryland 18-17 in College Park.
- Simpson scored on a 1-yard plunge to finish a frantic 90-yard drive that consumed more than seven minutes. Simpson touched the on each of the last 14 plays during the final 15-play drive.
- Simpson ran 16 times for 119 yards and two touchdowns. He also caught 13 passes for 152 yards. Simpson, listed third on the depth chart, had only two carries and four catches before the game.
- The Terrapins had not lost to Virginia at home since 1999.

VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVA has averaged just 45.3 penalty yards per game since 2001, although it is averaging 54 penalty yards through the first four games this year.
- Since 2001, Maryland is third in the ACC with 49 penalty yards per game.

UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL

- Virginia has played more football games than any other Atlantic Coast Conference school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,184 games in this, the 119th season of UVA football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 609-527-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC

schools with 1,163 games played in 118 seasons. UVa is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.

- Penn (1,284) has played the most games overall.

HOLD OPPONENTS TO FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING AND WIN

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 20 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including Richmond and Duke this season.
- Virginia is 17-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke last week.

FRESHMAN FOURSOME CRACKS LINEUP

- DB Rodney McLeod played on the opening kickoff last week vs. Duke to become the fourth true freshman to play for Virginia in 2008. McLeod also played several plays from scrimmage.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor and LB Cam Johnson.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California.

JENKINS, MOSLEY BECOME LATEST TO EARN FIRST CAREER STARTS

- Fifteen Cavaliers have made the first start of their careers this season – seven on offense and eight on defense.
- NT Nick Jenkins and S Corey Mosley were the latest, making their first career start Saturday at Duke.

MORE FIRST-TIMERS

- 19 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the first four games this season.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and six have followed suit in the last three games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica.
- On Defense: DE Nick Conrath, DL John-Kevin Dolce, LB Terence Fells-Danzer, NT Nick Jenkins, LB Cam Johnson, CB Dom Joseph, DB Rodney McLeod, CB Chase Minnifield, S Corey Mosley, DE Zane Parr.

CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST TEAM IN ACC

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

ROAD TRIP A FIRST FOR 15 CAVALIERS

- Fifteen Cavaliers made their first regular season road trip at Connecticut:
- Senior Yannick Reyerling and sophomore Marc Verica
- Redshirt freshmen Landon Bradley, Kris Burd, Anthony Mihota, Lamar Milstead, Chase Minnifield and Zane Parr
- True freshmen Steve Greer, Jimmy Howell, Cam Johnson, Rodney McLeod, Austin Pasztor, Robert Randolph and Ausar Walcott.

TOUGH SLATE OUT OF CONFERENCE

- UVa's first three opponents (USC, Richmond, UConn) are a combined 10-3 this year after earning 31 victories a year ago.
- USC is currently ranked No. 9 nationally and UConn is No. 24, while Richmond was

the FCS No. 1 squad prior to its upset loss to Villanova last week.

- East Carolina, UVa's opponent next week, was nationally ranked after wins over Virginia Tech and West Virginia but dropped out of the polls this week.

OVERALL SCHEDULE ALSO STRONG

- UVa's opponents combined to go 91-64 (.587) last year.
- UVa's opponents' 2007 winning percentage ranks 19th nationally.
- Eight of the 12 opponents had .500-plus records and played in bowls in 2007.
- UVa's schedule was ranked 10th toughest in the country recently by ESPN.com.

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?

- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVa's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).

- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

LOTS OF NEW FACES

- UVa features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.
- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead linebackers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and will participate as graduate students this season.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB

Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).

- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

HOWELL THIRD NATIONALLY AMONG TRUE FRESHMAN PUNTERS

- Jimmy Howell ranks third nationally in punt average among true freshman (ninth nationally among all freshmen).
- He is averaging 38.96 yards per punt.
- Howell had a career-long 54-yard punt Saturday at Duke.

JACKSON GIVES RUN GAME A BOOST

- Rashawn Jackson rushed for 43 yards, including a 22-yarder, on eight carries Saturday at Duke (5.4 avg./rush).
- It was the second-most rushing yards for a UVa back this season (Peerman, 60 vs. Richmond).
- He stepped into a key rushing role in place of the injured Cedric Peerman.

OGLETREE CONTINUES STREAK OF MULTIPLE RECEPTIONS

- Kevin Ogletree had three receptions for 36 yards at Duke and now has at least two receptions in 15 straight games, dating to the start of 2006.
- He leads the team with 22 receptions for 218 yards (54.5 yards per game).

CAVALIER WIDE RECEIVERS EMERGE

- Virginia wide receivers have combined for 503 yards receiving through three games – more than half of the wide receiver total from all of 2007.
- UVa wide receivers had 833 receiving yards in 13 games last season.
- UVa WRs have 50 receptions this year after catching 72 balls all of last year.

VERICA MOVES INTO STARTING SLOT

- Virginia quarterback Marc Verica made the first start of his career Sept. 13 at Connecticut. He completed 22 of 30 passes for 158 yards and one interception.
- His 22 completions were third most in school history in a first start. Mike Groh

holds the record with 26 completions in his first start against Navy in 1994 and Aaron Brooks is second with 25 completions against Auburn in 1997.

- Verica's 158 yards passing were the most by a UVa QB in a first start since David Rivers threw for 228 yards against Georgia Tech in 1999 in the only start of his UVa career.

TIGHT END U

- UVa can easily be called "Tight End U" under head coach Al Groh.
- UVa TEs have caught 425 passes for 4,804 yards and 37 TDs since 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span (nearly double).
- Senior John Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (16 receipts, 148 yards) and is second on the team in receiving yards this year.

SIMPSON A DUAL-THREAT BACK

- Mikell Simpson tied for third in the ACC in rushing touchdowns (eight) in 2007.
- He also was ninth in the country (second in the ACC) in receptions by a running back with 43.
- His 43 receptions led the team.
- He had 119 yards rushing, 152 receiving in a breakout performance at Maryland when he touched the ball on UVa's final 14 plays, including a one-yard leap for the go-ahead score with 16 seconds left.
- Simpson's 96-yard TD run in the Gator Bowl was the longest in UVa history, second-longest in NCAA bowl history and the longest by an FBS player in 2007.

SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY

- With a career-high tying three sacks at Duke, Clint Sintim now has 21 career sacks and four this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- His 21 career sacks are the most for any current linebacker in the country (no LB has more than 14).
- It also is tied for eighth for all players nationally and ranks eighth in UVa history with Sean Scott (1984-87).
- He has the second-most sacks ever by a UVa linebacker (Darryl Blackstock leads with 27).
- Sintim also leads the ACC in sacks this season.

DOWLING RETURNS TO LINEUP WITH A BANG

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling had a career-best two interceptions Saturday at Duke to double his career INT total.
- He made his first start of 2008 and added a career-high eight tackles.
- Dowling had been hampered by an injury early this season and did not play in the opener vs. Southern California.
- He saw limited action vs. Richmond, then had three tackles at Connecticut.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.

TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER

- ILB Jon Copper tied a career high with 12 tackles last Saturday at Duke.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 26 of his

29 games.

- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-85.
- Copper has gotten off to a good start with a team-high 34 tackles (18 solo), including three games of nine or more.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.
- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

- Byron Glaspy's 32 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim's 41.
- He ranks third on the team with 25 tackles in 2008 and has two PBU.
- He ranks fifth among ACC DBs in tackling this season (6.2 per game).
- Glaspy joined the team as a walk-on picked out of the student body three years ago and quickly worked his way up the depth chart.

DEFENSE PREVENTING SACKS

- Virginia's young offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just five sacks in four games.
- The Cavaliers are tied with Florida State for the second-fewest sacks allowed in the ACC, behind only Boston College (four).
- UVa ranks 14th nationally in fewest sacks allowed.

CONRATH OFF TO BIG START

- Redshirt freshman DE Nick Conrath has started his college career strong, with 12 tackles (six solo), including a team-high five for loss (two sacks), this season.

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.
- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the nation's best defensive player.
- He has started all 41 games in his career.
- His nine sacks last year led the nation's linebackers.

DO-IT-ALL HALL

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 17, tops among the team's corners.
- Hall had his second career interception and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown against Richmond.
- He also is an electrifying punt returner who was fifth in ACC last season with 10.0-yard punt return average and had 230 punt return yards – most by a Cavalier since 2004.

SPOTLIGHT ON LINEBACKERS

- Linebacker is a strong spot on defense for Virginia.
- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters.
- The trio comprises three of the top four returning Virginia tacklers.
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 41, Appleby - 31, Copper - 29).
- Copper has 234 career tackles, while Sintim has 198 and Appleby 182.

PRUETT DEBUTS AS D-COORDINATOR

- UVa's defense is guided by first-year defensive coordinator Bob Pruett.
- A longtime friend of Al Groh, Pruett has 40 years of coaching experience.
- Pruett won the 1996 I-AA National Championship and five conference titles as head coach at Marshall (1996-2004).

NOTING UVA ATHLETICS

UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVA coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

WALK-ON SUCCESS

- Four players who originally joined the program as walk-ons are have or are vying for starting positions:
 - ILB Jon Copper
 - S Byron Glaspy
 - WR Staton Jobe

- All four have earned scholarships during their time at UVa.

THORNTON LIVING ON THE LAWN

- Punter John Thornton will live on The Lawn in 2008. This is one of the most prestigious honors at UVa. He is living in Room No. 4, matching his uniform number.
- Just over 100 students are selected based on academic and service merit. Thornton is one of two UVa student-athletes living on The Lawn this year, joining baseball pitcher Andrew Carraway.

REYERING MAKES FOOTBALL DEBUT

- Yannick Reyerer became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 3-for-4 in field goals and has kicked three PATs this season.
- Reyerer also has handled kickoff duties.
- The USC contest marked the first time Reyerer ever played in a football game.
- Gaffney, the only player to have his UVa soccer number retired, led the team with 53 points (17-17 XP, 12-16 FG) in 1986.

- Reyerer was first-team All-ACC pick in 2007 (13 goals, four game-winning goals).
- He is a three-time All-ACC honoree; he led UVa in scoring all three years.
- He netted 39 goals and 10 assists during his decorated career before suffering season-ending knee injury prior to 2007 ACC Tournament.
- He led UVa to College Cup (final four of men's soccer) in 2006.

NEW LOOK TO KICKING GAME

- Virginia is breaking in new kickers and punters this season.
- It is the first time since 2002 that UVa has had a new kicker and punter in the same year.
- In 2002, Tom Hagan took over as punter and Kurt Smith as kicker, although Connor Hughes took over as PK midway through season.

“We’ve got two guys that we consider starters. This is one of the few times we’ve been in this situation where both guys really are equal. They have different styles, but if you look at their stats from last year, they compare.
