THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Virginia has won 15 of its last 17 Homecoming games.
- UVa has averaged 26.5 points and 382.0 total yards per game during its four-game winning streak. The Cavaliers averaged 9.0 points and 251.2 yards per game in starting the year 1-3.
- The Cavaliers' schedule is rated the second-toughest nationally (tops in the ACC) this week in the Sagarin ratings. Their opponents boast a 42-24 record this year.
- Virginia has allowed the fewest sacks in the ACC (1.13/game). On the flip side, the defense has the second-most sacks in the ACC (2.88/game).
- With 1.19 sacks per game this year, Clint Sintim ranks fifth nationally and leads the ACC in sacks. He also is the national leader in sacks among linebackers.

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful

MORE ON THE UVA-MIAMI SERIES

- The first match-up occurred in the 1996 Carquest Bowl at Dolphin Stadium (then known as Joe Robbie Stadium).
- That game was the final collegiate action for several notable Cavaliers, including Tiki and Ronde Barber, James Farrior, Jon Harris and Jamie Sharper.
- In addition to this Cavalier quintet, the game featured a ridiculous number of future pros.
- Of the 44 starters in the game, 20 were drafted by the NFL (11 UVA, 9 Miami). The group of NFL draftees included nine first-round picks. As best as we can tell, 21 Cavaliers and 22 Hurricanes went on to play in the NFL.

CAVALIERS ON HOMECOMING

- Virginia has a 42-39-2 record all-time in Homecoming games dating back to 1923, but the Cavaliers have dominated of late.
- UVA has lost just twice on Homecoming since 1991, going 15-2 in that stretch and winning by an average of 20.1 points per game.
- The Cavaliers' lone losses since '91 were in 2000 (Clemson, 31-10) and 2006 (Western Michigan, 17-10).
- This is UVA's first-ever Homecoming game vs. Miami.
- It also is the latest Homecoming game since 1990 when then-No. 1 Virginia lost, 41-38, to No. 16 Georgia Tech on Nov. 3.

STREAKING!

- Virginia has won four straight games, tied for the longest current streak in the ACC with Florida State.
- The win streak is the ninth-longest current run in the country. Penn State and Texas Tech each have 10-game winning streaks to lead the nation.

2007: VIRGINIA 48, MIAMI 0

- No. 23 Virginia ended Miami's 70-year stay at the famed Orange Bowl in stunningly one-sided fashion, dealing the Hurricanes the biggest shutout loss in Orange Bowl history. Mikell Simpson

had a pair of 1-yard touchdown runs and quarterback Jameel Sewell scored twice.

- Virginia outgained Miami, 418-189.
- Chris Cook had a 44-yard fumble return for a score with 2:26 left, putting Virginia's effort into the Miami history books. It topped a 44-0 Notre Dame win over the Hurricanes at the Orange Bowl in 1973.
- It was Miami's first home shutout loss since Oct. 4, 1974, against Auburn, and the Hurricanes' worst defeat since losing 66-13 at Syracuse on Nov. 28, 1998.
- Sewell completed 20 of 25 passes and 288 yards for Virginia. Virginia did most of its damage with its trio of tight ends, who caught 10 passes for 154 yards.

CAVALIER STANDOUTS VS. MIAMI

- UVA has had several strong performances in the Miami series since the 'Canes entered the ACC in 2004.
- A look at how some of the current Cavaliers have fared vs. Miami:

VIRGINIA HAS SECOND TOUGHEST SCHEDULE

- Virginia currently has the second-toughest schedule in the FBS according to the latest Sagarin ratings.
- Virginia's opponents this year boast a 42-24 record (.636), tops among all ACC schools.
- Five of UVA's FBS opponents already are bowl eligible, while two more are one win shy.

UVA STRONG VS. RANKED TEAMS

- Virginia has earned wins over ranked teams in each of the last two weeks (No. 18 North Carolina, No. 21 Georgia Tech).
- This is the first time since 2002 Virginia

has defeated ranked teams in back-to-back weeks. UVA defeated No. 20 NC State and No. 18 Maryland that season.

- The Georgia Tech win was UVA's first on the road over a ranked team since winning at No. 19 Clemson in 2001.
- UVA last won two games against ranked teams in the same season in 2005.

CHILDS BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start at Georgia Tech, becoming the 18th Cavalier to make the first start of his career this season.
- There have been plenty of new starters on each side of the ball, with nine first-timers on offense and nine on defense.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN CRACK LINEUP

- PK Robert Randolph became the fifth true freshman to play for UVA this season after seeing action in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor, LB Cam Johnson and DB Rodney McLeod.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California. McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke and also played several plays from scrimmage.

PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start against Maryland.
- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS

- 22 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the six games this season after kickers Chris Hinkebein and Robert Randolph played vs. East Carolina.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and eight have followed suit in the last five games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.

TWO HOOS HAIL FROM FLORIDA

- Virginia has two players who originate from Florida:
 - Sophomore CB Mike Parker (Orlando/Edgewater)
 - Redshirt freshman G Dave Roberts (Sarasota/Riverview)
- Miami has one player from the state of Virginia, junior TE Dedrick Epps, who hails from Richmond (Huguenot H.S.).

CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST TEAM IN ACC

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL

- Virginia has played more football games than any other ACC school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,188 games in this, the 119th season of UVA football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 612-527-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,171 games played in 118 seasons. UVA is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.
- Penn (1,289) has played the most games overall.

VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVA has averaged just 45.0 penalty yards per game since 2001 and is averaging 46.6 penalty yards this year.

MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?

- UVA won its first close game this year vs. North Carolina after having a season full of them in 2007.
- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVA's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

TOUGH SLATE OUT OF CONFERENCE

- UVA's non-conference opponents (USC, Richmond, UConn, East Carolina) are a

combined 22-9 this year after earning 31 victories a year ago.

- USC is currently ranked No. 6 nationally, while Richmond was the FCS No. 1 squad prior to its upset loss to Villanova four weeks ago.
- East Carolina and Connecticut each were ranked earlier this season but have since dropped out of the polls.

LOTS OF NEW FACES

- UVA features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVA lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.
- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead line-backers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and are participating as graduate students this year.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

HOOS HOLDING ONTO THE BALL

- Marc Verica's fourth-quarter fumble Saturday at Georgia Tech broke Virginia's streak without a lost fumble at 274 offensive plays.
- Prior to that miscue, UVa last lost a fumble in the fourth quarter of the Duke game
- Overall, UVa has lost one fumble over its last 286 offensive plays, spanning 50 drives.
- The Cavaliers' defense has recovered six fumbles during that span.

SLOW STARTERS

- Virginia's offense has taken some time to get rolling throughout the year. UVa has scored on its opening drive just twice this year – both via field goals (Richmond, Georgia Tech).
- UVa has been outscored 55-30 in the opening quarter this year, but has rebounded to outscore opponents 42-27 in the second quarter.
- Slow starts have plagued the UVa defense as well, with the Cavaliers giving up points on the opening drive in five of eight games, including the last three.

- The Cavaliers have trailed in six of their eight games this year. The exceptions are their two shutouts (Richmond, Maryland).

O-LINE PREVENTING SACKS

- Virginia's offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just nine sacks in eight games (1.13 per game).
- The Cavaliers lead the ACC in fewest sacks allowed and rank 18th nationally.
- UVa has given up more than one sack on just one occasion – vs. Southern California (two) in the season opener.

- Last week, UVa allowed just one sack to Georgia Tech, which entered as the ACC leader in sacks.

RED-ZONE SUCCESS

- One of the keys to UVa's winning streak has been its ability to successfully finish off drives.
- Virginia is 13 for its last 14 in the red zone, with the lone hiccup coming on a missed field goal in the Maryland game.
- Over the last three games, UVa has scored on eight straight drives in the red zone, including six touchdowns.
- In its first four games, UVa was 6-for-10 in the red zone.

PASSING GAME RATCHETS UP A NOTCH

- Virginia ranks second in the ACC in passing offense at 210.25 yards per game.
- Only Clemson, at 210.86, averages more passing yards per game.
- Over the last four games, Virginia has averaged 235.25 passing yards per game.
- Virginia ranked 10th in the ACC in passing offense in 2007 (194.8).

PEERMAN BURSTS BACK ONTO SCENE

- After being limited in the first four games by an injury, Cedric Peerman has exploded in the last four games.
- Peerman has rushed for 100-plus yards in three of the last four games with 110 vs. Maryland, 173 against East Carolina and 118 at Georgia Tech (first to rush for 100+ vs. GT this year).
- He is averaging 5.7 yards per carry this season and ranks third in the ACC with 77.3 rushing yards per game.

A COMPLETE 180

- Virginia's four-game winning streak is no coincidence. After starting 1-3, the Cavaliers have turned it around in all phases of their game.
- A side-by-side comparison of the first four games versus the last four.

PEERMAN CATCHES THE ROCK TOO

- Cedric Peerman ranks seventh in the ACC this season with 4.29 receptions per game and leads ACC running backs in receptions.
- Peerman ranks third nationally in receptions per game among running backs – only West Virginia's Jock Sanders (4.57) and Texas A&M's Mike Goodson (4.43) have more receptions per game.

MINNIFIELD FLASHES BRILLIANCE IN KICK RETURNS

- Redshirt freshman Chase Minnifield has been strong in the kick return game.
- He is averaging 25.2 yards per return – fifth in the ACC and 32nd nationally.
- His longest return was 56 yards at Connecticut.

MONROE ON KIPER'S BIG BOARD

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 4 on ESPN's Mel Kiper's 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects.
- Monroe also has been named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim is on the Nagurski Award watch list.
- Monroe graded out at 91 percent vs. North Carolina – the highest mark this season for any offensive lineman.
- Monroe received honorable mention All-ACC recognition in '07 and was on several preseason All-ACC squads this year.

TIGHT END U

- UVa TEs have caught 447 passes for 4,978 yards and 38 TDs since Al Groh arrived in 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span (nearly double).
- Senior John Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (35 receipts, 300 yards) and is sixth in the ACC in receptions per game this year.
- Phillips also ranks ninth nationally among tight ends in receptions per game.
- Redshirt freshman TE Andrew Devlin also has made his first three career catches this year and started two games.

NOTING UVA ATHLETICS

UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVa coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

NOTING PEERMAN'S BIG DAY

- Cedric Peerman rushed for a season-best 173 yards vs. East Carolina. It was just 13 yards off his career high of 186, set last year at North Carolina.
- Peerman's 79-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was the longest rush of his career.
- It also tied for the seventh-longest rushing play in UVa history, the fifth-longest rush for a TD in UVa history and the third-longest UVa run for a TD in Scott Stadium history.
- He became just the second player in UVa history to post two runs of 60 or more yards (79, 60). The other was John Papit vs. Washington & Lee in 1948 (63, 60).
- The last UVa player to have two runs of 50+ yards in a game was Barry Word vs. Georgia Tech in 1985 (79-TD, 52).

TRICKY, TRICKY

- Scott Deke hit John Phillips on a 12-yard TD toss on a fake field goal in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.

- It was UVa's first pass out of a field goal formation since Matt Schaub threw a 10-yard pass to Heath Miller for a first down against Virginia Tech in 2003.
- It also was Deke's first career TD pass.

SACK ATTACK

- The Cavaliers are second in the ACC and 15th in the FBS with 2.88 sacks per game (23 total). Florida State leads the ACC with 3.14 sacks per game (22 total).
- TCU leads the FBS with 3.89 sacks per game, while Texas (3.63) is second and Oklahoma third (3.5).

SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY

- After being in on three sacks (one solo, two assist) at Georgia Tech, Clint Sintim now has 28 career sacks and has been in on eight solo and four assisted sacks this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- His 28 career sacks are the most for any current linebacker in the country (no LB has more than 15.5) and are fourth nationally among all players nationally.

SINTIM NOW HOLDS UVA RECORD FOR SACKS BY LINEBACKER

- After being in on three sacks at Georgia Tech, Clint Sintim has been in on 28 career sacks and passed Darryl Blackstock (27) for the most sacks ever by a UVa LB.
- He is second in sacks for any UVa player (Chris Slade, 40).
- Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this season and has sacks in each of the last five games (10 sacks in that time).
- The last UVa player to have sacks in five straight games was Chris Long (2007). It is the longest streak by a UVa LB since Darryl Blackstock's five-game run in 2002.

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 22 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including three straight this year.
- Virginia is 19-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke this year.
- Virginia has held half of its eight opponents – Richmond (19), Duke (84), Maryland (79) and East Carolina (89) – to fewer than 100 yards rushing this season

CHILDS BECOMES NEXT MAN UP

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start vs. Georgia Tech in place of the injured Antonio Appleby. He had five tackles.
- Against UNC, Childs had a career-high 10 tackles and recorded a tackle for loss.
- Coming into the UNC game, Childs had just three career tackles.

SENIOR LINEBACKERS SHINING FOR CAVALIERS

- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters, and the trio leads all UVa tacklers.
- Copper leads the team with 67 tackles, followed by Sintim (49) and Appleby (46).
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 45, Appleby - 34, Copper - 33).
- Copper has 267 career tackles, while Sintim has 224 and Appleby 201.

TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER

- ILB Jon Copper had a career-best 16 tackles two weeks ago vs. North Carolina. It topped his previous high of 12.
- Copper's 16 sacks were the most by any UVa player since Angelo Crowell had 16 vs. Penn State in 2002.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 29 of his 33 games.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-84.
- Copper leads the team with 67 tackles, including five games of nine or more. He ranks seventh in the ACC in tackles.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.

- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

- With his 11-tackle performance vs. East Carolina, Antonio Appleby took over the team lead in tackles with 46.
- Prior to being injured early in the UNC game, he led the team in tackles in each of the previous two games.
- He also had six or more tackles in the first six games this season.
- Appleby missed the Georgia Tech game, breaking his streak of consecutive starts at 34.

DOWLING RETURNS TO LINEUP WITH A BANG

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling had a career-best two interceptions at Duke to double his career INT total.
- He made his first start of 2008 and added a career-high eight tackles.
- Dowling had been hampered by an injury early this season and did not play in the opener vs. Southern California.
- He saw limited action vs. Richmond, then had three tackles at Connecticut.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.

MORE ON DOWLING

- After his interception vs. Maryland, Dowling has three interceptions this season – more than any UVa player had all of last season and most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Despite his limited play time, Dowling still ranks fourth in the ACC in interceptions and second with nine passes defended.
- He also is tied for 24th nationally in interceptions.

GLASPY CONTINUES TO LEAD SECONDARY

- Byron Glaspy's 36 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim's 45.
- He ranks fourth on the team with 38 tackles in 2008 and has two PBU.
- He is averging 4.7 tackles per game – tops on the team among DBs.
- Glaspy joined the team as a walk-on picked out of the student body three years ago and quickly worked his way up the depth chart.

CONRATH NAMED TO MIDSEASON FROSH ALL-AMERICA TEAM

- Redshirt freshman DE Matt Conrath was named to the Rivals.com Midseason Freshman All-America Team.
- Conrath has 18 tackles (11 solo), including six for loss (three sacks), this season.
- He also has three passes broken up and a blocked kick.
- Conrath also was named to College Football News' 2008 Redshirt Freshman All-America Team prior to the season.

SINTIM A CANDIDATE FOR NAGURSKI TROPHY

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.
- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the nation's best defensive player.
- He has started all 45 games in his career – currently tied for the 11th most consecutive starts in the FBS.

DO-IT-ALL HALL

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 35, tops among the team's corners.
- Last week, Hall had a diving, game-clinching interception in the fourth quarter at Georgia Tech. It was his third career INT and his second this year.
- Hall had an INT earlier this year vs. Richmond and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown.
- He also ranks fifth in the ACC in punt returns this season (6.4 average). He had had 230 punt return yards in 2007 – most by a Cavalier since 2004.

DEFENSE RECORDS ANOTHER SHUTOUT

- UVa's shutout vs. Maryland was the program's ninth since 2003 and second this season.
- At the time, UVa's last three wins had come by shutout (16-0 Sept. 6 vs. Richmond, 48-0 at Miami on Nov. 10, 2007).
- It marked the first time since the start of the 1952 season that three straight UVa wins had come via shutouts.
- UVa has recorded at least one shutout every season since 2003.

UVA SECOND IN SHUTOUTS SINCE '01

- Virginia is second in the ACC in shutouts since 2001, Al Groh's first year at UVa.
- The Cavaliers have nine shutouts, second only to Virginia Tech, which has 13 since 2001.
- Boston College (six) and Miami (five) are the only other schools with more than four shutouts in the last eight seasons.

PRUETT DEBUTS AS D-COORDINATOR

- UVa's defense is guided by first-year defensive coordinator Bob Pruett.
- A longtime friend of Al Groh, Pruett has 40 years of coaching experience.
- Pruett won the 1996 I-AA National Championship and five conference titles as head coach at Marshall (1996-2004).

WALK-ON SUCCESS

- Four players who originally joined the program as walk-ons are have or are vying for starting positions:
 - ILB Jon Copper
 - S Byron Glaspy
 - WR Staton Jobe
 - WR Cary Koch
- All four have earned scholarships during their time at UVa.

OTHER UVA WALK-ONS

- Virginia has had remarkable success with walk-ons through the years.
- Al Groh, a walk-on himself at UVa, says his philosophy is to play the players who give the team the best chance to win.
- Notable former UVa walk-ons include:
 - All-time leading scorer PK Connor Hughes
 - NFL Pro Bowl DE Patrick Kerney
 - NFL 1,000-yard WR Patrick Jeffers
 - Academic All-America DB Stephen Phelan
 - Two-year starting FB Kase Luzar

REYERING MAKES FOOTBALL DEBUT

- Yannick Reyering became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 5-for-8 in field goals and has kicked 14 PATs this season.
- The USC contest marked the first time Reyering ever played in a football game.
- Gaffney, the only player to have his UVa soccer number retired, led the team with 53 points (17-17 XP, 12-16 FG) in 1986.
- Reyering was first-team All-ACC pick in 2007 (13 goals, four game-winning goals).
- He is a three-time All-ACC honoree; he led UVa in scoring all three years.
- He netted 39 goals and 10 assists during his decorated career before suffering season-ending knee injury prior to 2007 ACC Tournament.
- He led UVa to College Cup (final four of men's soccer) in 2006.

THORNTON LIVING ON THE LAWN

- Punter John Thornton is living on The Lawn this year. This is one of the most prestigious honors at UVa. He is living in Room No. 4, matching his uniform number.
- Just over 100 students are selected based on academic and service merit. Thornton is one of two UVa student-athletes living on The Lawn this year, joining baseball pitcher Andrew Carraway.

1. Since 2001 (the arrival of Al Groh), Virginia is behind only Maryland (39) for the most home wins among ACC teams.
2. Virginia boasts seven College Football Hall of Famers and three Pro Football Hall of Famers.
3. More than 50 Cavaliers have gone on to the NFL under Al Groh.
4. Fourteen former Cavaliers have played in the Pro Bowl.
5. Between 1913 and 1932, eight Virginia football players received the prestigious Rhodes Scholarship
6. Virginia has been honored 22 times by the American Football Coaches Association for its outstanding graduation rates.
7. UVa has produced 27 First-Team All-Americans.
8. Under Al Groh, Virginia has been ranked 32 times and reached No. 6 in 2004.
9. Since 1984, Virginia has participated in 17 bowl games, fourth-most among ACC schools.
10. Hall of Fame Coach Don Shula made his first coaching stop at UVa and was an assistant coach on the 1958 team which went 1-9. He was in charge of the backfield.

1. The University of Virginia is the only campus in the country that is also a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the university was founded in 1819 by Thomas Jefferson.
2. The New York Times described Virginia's Grounds as "the greatest campus plan in the history of American architecture."
3. The Albert and Shirley Small Special Collections library holds 12 million manuscripts, 300,000 rare books and 4,000 maps as well as the University's 3.6 million archival items, including a copy of the first printing of the Declaration of Independence.
4. Edgar Allan Poe attended the University from February to December 1826. He dropped out after a year, having lost his tuition because of chronic gambling.
5. Virginia is the only ACC school to have a former player in the Baseball Hall of Fame (Eppa Rixey).
6. UVA was ranked the No. 2 best public university in the 2008 edition of the U.S. News and World Report rankings.
7. For the 13th year in a row, UVA has the highest graduation rate for African American students of any public university in the country.

“We’ve got two guys that we consider starters. This is one of the few times we’ve been in this situation where both guys really are equal. They have different styles, but if you look at their stats from last year, they compare. “That’s part of growing up as a quarterback. You can’t run for the hills when things are tough. You’ve got to stand out there. Other players have some tough circumstances and we don’t run out there and bail them out. It’s easy to be the quarterback when you throw for five touchdowns and 35 points. This is what separates some guys sometimes, when everybody in the world knows that it didn’t go the way you wanted it. Some guys really respond to that and it elevates their games and some guys go downhill with that. - This is UVa's first win over a ranked team on the road since winning at No. 19 Clemson in 2001.
- Virginia's scored on its opening drive (FG) for only the second time this season. The Cavaliers also kicked a field goal on their opening possession against Richmond.
- LB Darren Childs made the first start of his career in place of an injured Antonio Appleby. Nate Collins started at nose tackle in place of an injured Nick Jenkins.
- Kevin Ogletree's TD catch in the second quarter is his fourth of the year, tying his career high set two years ago. It also is the most by a Cavalier since Ogletree's in 2006.
- Meanwhile, Maurice Covington extended his streak to four games with at least three receptions. He also had his first TD reception of the season in the third quarter.
- Covington set a career high for receptions (5) and tied his career high for receiving yards (76).
- Marc Verica threw for a career-high 270 yards. His previous high was 226 yards vs. Maryland three weeks ago.
- Clint Sintim was in on three sacks, the fifth game in a row he's been in on at least one sack. His 5-game streak is the longest by a UVa linebacker since Darryl Blackstock had a 5-game run back in 2002.
- Rodney McLeod had his first sack of his career for a loss of 16 yards. It is also the first sack by a UVa defensive back this year.
