### GAMEDAY INFORMATION

#### TELEVISION COVERAGE

- ESPN is televising the game to a national audience.
- Dave Pasch (play-by-play) and Andre Ware (analyst) have the call.

#### RADIO COVERAGE

- All Virginia games are broadcast on the Virginia Sports Network, originating at WINA/WWV in Charlottesville.
- Dave Koehn (play-by-play), Frank Quayle (color analysis) and Tim Sherman (sidelines) have the call.

#### VIRGINIA-VIRGINIA TECH RIVALRY

- Virginia Tech leads the all-time series 47-37-5 in a rivalry that dates back two centuries and has won eight of the last nine meetings.
- The series began in 1895 with UVA gaining a 38-0 win in Charlottesville.
- Virginia's most recent victory was a 35-21 win at home in 2003.
- The Hokies hold a 29-19-2 advantage in Blacksburg, and have won the last four in Lane Stadium – UVA last won in Blacksburg in 1998 (36-32).
- Current UVA assistant head coach and defensive backs coach Steve Bernstein was the secondary coach at Virginia Tech from 1978-84.

### THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- This is the first time Virginia has squared off with an unranked Virginia Tech team since 1997 (34-20 UVA win).
- UVA is 5-0 this season when winning or tied in turnover margin.
- The Cavaliers' schedule is rated the toughest in the nation this week according to the Sagarin ratings – UVA's opponents have the second-best winning percentage in the country.
- Clint Sintim has 23 career tackles, including five sacks, in three career games against Virginia Tech.
- Sintim ranks fourth nationally in sacks this year. The national leader in sacks among linebackers, he needs one sack to reach the top 10 in ACC history.

**ACC INJURY POLICY**

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful

**32 IS VIRGINIA'S MAGIC NUMBER**

- Scoring a lot of points against the Hokies means good things for the Cavaliers.
- Virginia has scored at least 32 points in each of its last seven series wins dating back to 1989.

**RARE GAME AGAINST UNRANKED VIRGINIA TECH**

- Virginia Tech is unranked going into a game vs. Virginia for the first time since 1997 – a span of 10 games.
- Virginia won the 1997 game, 34-20.
- It also marks the first time UVA has faced off against an unranked Hokies team in Blacksburg since 1992 (41-38 UVA win).

**GROH FACES HOKIES AS PLAYER, COACH**

- Head coach Al Groh has a long history against Virginia Tech as both a player and coach.
- A Cavalier gridder during his undergraduate days in the 1960s, he was a member of the 1964 squad that posted UVA's only win over Tech between 1957-1970. Virginia defeated the Hokies 20-17 at home that season.
- As the head coach at Wake Forest, he led his Demon Deacons to wins over Tech in 1982 (13-10 in Blacksburg) and 1983 (13-6 in Blacksburg).

**VIRGINIA IN SEASON ENDERS**

- This game is the Cavaliers' final game of the regular season.
- UVA is 44-70-4 all-time in regular-season finales and has lost its last four.
- This is the third straight year and the 14th time in the last 18 seasons Virginia has closed the regular season against the Hokies.

**COMMONWEALTH CUP UP FOR GRABS**

- The winner of this game claims the Commonwealth Cup for the next year.
- After holding the trophy following wins in 1997 and 1998, the Cavaliers have taken it just once since then (2003) with the Hokies winning eight of the last nine meetings.
- The award was started for the 1996 game between the two state foes, with the Hokies receiving the trophy for the first time with a 26-9 win.

**2007: VIRGINIA TECH 33, VIRGINIA 21**

- Sean Glennon threw for 260 yards and the other half of Virginia Tech's quarterback rotation, Tyrod Taylor, ran for two touchdowns, as the No. 8 Hokies won, 33-21, in 2007. The Hokies also got 147 yards rushing from Branden Ore and six catches for 147 yards and a touchdown from Eddie Royal.
- No. 16 Virginia led late in the second quarter before an interception by Brandon Flowers with 40 seconds to go turned into a three-play, 65-yard touchdown drive that left the crowd of 61,711 stunned. The Hokies outscored UVA 10-0 in the fourth quarter for the final margin.
- Mikell Simpson rushed for 81 yards and a touchdown for UVA, while Jameel Sewell went 15-for-24 for 121 yards passing and also rushed for two touchdowns.

**UVA PLAYERS VS. VIRGINIA TECH**

- Several of Virginia's players – particularly on defense – have seen substantial game action against Virginia Tech.
- In three games, LB Clint Sintim has 23 tackles (five for loss) and four sacks against the Hokies. He had three sacks and 10 tackles last year vs. Virginia Tech.
- Senior S Byron Glaspy also has started three games vs. Virginia Tech and has racked up 22 tackles.
- Interestingly, TB Cedric Peerman has never had a rush against Virginia Tech, although he has returned several kicks.

**TURNOVERS CREATE HEADACHES**

- Virginia is 5-1 when winning or being tied in the turnover margin this season, but 0-5 when losing it.
- UVA's only loss when winning the turnover margin was the OT defeat to Miami.
- Virginia is +5 in turnover margin in its wins, and -12 in its losses.
- Turnovers have been the root of UVA's current losing streak – UVA has 10 turnovers to its opponents' five.
- The eight turnovers in the last two games have led to 27 points.

**VIRGINIA SCHEDULE RATED AMONG NATION'S BEST**

- Regardless of which service you check, the UVA strength of schedule is one of the toughest in the country.
- Virginia currently has the toughest schedule in the FBS according to the latest Sagarin ratings.
- Virginia's opponents this year boast a combined winning percentage of .650, best in the ACC and second in the nation behind only Georgia.
- Nine of UVA's 11 FBS opponents are bowl eligible.

**UVA STRONG VS. RANKED TEAMS**

- Virginia earned wins over ranked teams in consecutive weeks Oct. 18 and 25 (No. 18 North Carolina, No. 21 Georgia Tech).
- It is the first time since 2002 Virginia defeated ranked teams in back-to-back weeks. UVA beat No. 20 NC State and No. 18 Maryland that season.
- The Georgia Tech win was UVA's first on the road over a ranked team since winning at then-No. 19 Clemson in 2001.
- UVA last won two games against ranked teams in the same season in 2005.

**CHILDS BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER**

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start at Georgia Tech, becoming the 18th Cavalier to make the first start of his career this season.
- There have been plenty of new starters on each side of the ball, with nine first-timers on offense and nine on defense.

**FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN CRACK LINEUP**

- PK Robert Randolph became the fifth true freshman to play for UVa this season after seeing action in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor, LB Cam Johnson and DB Rodney McLeod.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California. McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke and also played several plays from scrimmage.

**PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN**

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start against Maryland.
- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

**MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS**

- 22 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the six games this season after kickers Chris Hinkebein and Robert Randolph played vs. East Carolina.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and eight have followed suit in the last five games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.
- On Defense: DE Nick Conrath, DL John-Kevin Dolce, LB Terence Fells-Danzer, NT Nick Jenkins, LB Cam Johnson, CB Dom Joseph, DB Rodney McLeod, CB Chase Minnifield, S Corey Mosley, DE Zane Parr.

**AFCA HONORS UVA PROGRAM**

- The American Football Coaches Association has recognized the University of Virginia among its honorees for graduation of its football players. This is the 23rd time the UVa program has been cited since 1981.
- The Cavalier program received the Academic Achievement Award for the highest graduation rate in 1985 and 1986 and has garnered honorable mention recognition a record 21 times.

**CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST IN ACC**

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.
- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

**MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT**

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

**VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01**

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVa still is averaging 42.6 penalty yards this year – fifth fewest in the ACC.

**UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL**

- Virginia has played more football games than any other ACC school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,191 games in this, the 119th season of UVa football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 612-530-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,174 games played in 118 seasons. UVa is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.

- Penn (1,293) has played the most games overall.

**MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?**

- UVa won its first close game this year vs. North Carolina after having a season full of them in 2007.
- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVa's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

**LOTS OF NEW FACES**

- UVa features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

**WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS**

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

**CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR**

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB

Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.

- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead line-backers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

**THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS**

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and are participating as graduate students this year.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

**YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)**

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

**SLOW STARTERS**

- Virginia's offense has taken some time to get rolling throughout the year. UVa

has scored on its opening drive just twice this year – both via field goals (Richmond, Georgia Tech).

- UVa has been outscored 83-40 in the opening quarter this year.
- Slow starts have plagued the UVa defense as well, with the UVa giving up points in seven of 11 opening drives.
- UVa held Clemson scoreless on its opening drive last week, ending a streak of five straight games where the opponent scored on its opening drive.
- The Cavaliers have trailed at some point in nine of their 11 games this year. The exceptions are their two shutouts (Richmond, Maryland).

**O-LINE PREVENTING SACKS**

- Virginia's offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just 14 sacks in 11 games (1.3 per game).
- The Cavaliers lead the ACC in fewest sacks allowed and tied for 23rd nationally.
- Boston College ranks second in the ACC in fewest sacks allowed (1.4/game).
- UVa has given up more than one sack on just three occasions – vs. Southern California, at Wake Forest and vs. Clemson (two each).

**RED-ZONE SUCCESS**

- Virginia has been able to successfully finish off drives when getting into the red zone recently.
- Virginia is 19 for its last 21 in the red zone, with the lone failures coming on a missed field goal in the Maryland game and a turnover on downs against Wake Forest.
- The turnovers on downs vs. Wake ended a streak of 15 straight drives (10 TDs) in the red zone that ended in scores.
- In its first four games, UVa was just 6-for-10 in the red zone.

**VERICA'S 200 STREAK ENDS AT SIX**

- After throwing for 160 yards vs. Clemson, QB Marc Verica saw his streak of consecutive 200-yard games end at six.
- He is just the second QB in UVa history with six-consecutive 200-yard passing games – no player has ever produced more.
- Matt Schaub also had six in a row in '03.
- Verica leads the ACC with a 64.1 percent completion percentage this year.

**FEED PEERMAN THE BALL**

- Virginia is 11-2 all-time (4-2 in 2008) when Cedric Peerman gets 15 or more carries in a game.
- The recent losses to Miami and Clemson marked the only times UVa has failed to win when Peerman got 15 or more rushing attempts in a game.

**PEERMAN AMONG ACC LEADERS IN RUSHING**

- Cedric Peerman is averaging 5.0 yards per carry this season and ranks fourth in the ACC with 70.7 rushing yards per game.
- Peerman was limited in the first four games because of an injury, but has since rushed three times for 100-plus yards – 110 vs. Maryland, 173 against East Carolina and 118 at Georgia Tech (first to rush for 100+ vs. GT this year).

**PEERMAN CATCHES THE ROCK TOO**

- Cedric Peerman leads the nation in receptions for a running back. He averages 4.2 receptions per game.
- Overall, Peerman ranks ninth in the ACC and 98th among all players nationally.
- Peerman set career highs for receptions twice this year with seven vs. Maryland and eight against East Carolina.
- He had a career-best 55 receiving yards vs. Georgia Tech.

**PEERMAN PILES UP YARDAGE**

- Cedric Peerman has 1,682 career rushing yards – 20th all time at Virginia.
- He also has racked up a career-best 707 yards rushing this year.
- Peerman is just the 36th player to go over 1,000 yards rushing a career at UVa.
- Next up on the rushing chart: No. 19 Antonio Rice (1982-86 - 1,726) and No. 18 Gary Helman (1969-71 - 1,832).

**PEERMAN MOVES UP ALL-PURPOSE CHARTS**

- With 3,272 career all-purpose yards (1,682 rush, 334 rec., 1256 KOR), Cedric Peerman needs two yards to reach the top 10 at Virginia.
- Jerrod Washington (1990-93) stands 10th at 3,274 career all-purpose yards.
- Bill Dudley (1939-41) is ninth with 3,396 career all-purpose yards.

- Kevin Ogletree has a career-best 57 receptions this year and has notched his second 50-catch season.

- It is the fifth-longest streak with at least one reception in school history. Patrick Jeffers (1993-95) holds the record of 31.

**COVINGTON PROVIDES ANOTHER TARGET**

- Senior WR Maurice Covington has at least three catches in each of the last seven games, including four vs. Clemson.
- Against Georgia Tech, Covington set a career high for receptions (five) and tied his career high for receiving yards (76).
- He also had his first TD reception of the season in the third quarter vs. Tech.

**KOCH COMES ALIVE**

- Senior WR Cary Koch had four receptions for 33 yards vs. Clemson and has been a solid option the last three games.
- In the last three games, Koch has 14 catches for 147 yards – he had 15 receptions for 140 yards in the first eight games.
- At Wake Forest, he finished with 73 yards receiving, his most at Virginia. His career high is 102, set against Tulsa while he was at Tulane in 2005.

- He also had a UVa career-best six catches at Wake. He had six receptions while at Tulane against Rice and Tulsa.

**MONROE, SINTIM ON KIPER'S BIG BOARD**

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 10 and LB Clint Sintim No. 24 on ESPN's Mel Kiper's 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects.
- Monroe was also named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim was on the Nagurski Award watch list.
- Monroe received honorable mention All-ACC recognition in '07 and joined Sintim on several preseason All-ACC squads this year.
- Sintim, a preseason Nagurski Award candidate, leads the ACC in sacks this season and had a stretch of 10 sacks in five games earlier this year.

**PHILLIPS PILES ON CATCHES**

- John Phillips had one catch vs. Clemson, marking the first time this season he failed to grab at least two receptions in a game.
- Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (4.27; 47 receipts, 384 yards) and is seventh in the ACC in receptions per game this year.
- Phillips also ranks ninth nationally among tight ends in receptions per game.

**PHILLIPS MOVES UP ACC LEDGER TOO**

**NOTING UVA ATHLETICS**

**UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP**

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

**2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS**

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVa coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

**SACK ATTACK**

- Despite not recording a sack vs. Clemson, the Cavaliers are third in the ACC and 24th in the FBS with 2.55 sacks per game (28 total). Florida State leads the ACC with 3.18 sacks per game (35 total).
- Oklahoma leads the FBS with 3.45 sacks per game.
- UVA has posted at least one sack in every game except USC and Clemson.

**HAVING A FIELD DAY**

- Senior DE Alex Field had his first multiple-sack day with two sacks vs. Miami.
- It gave him a career-high five sacks this year. He had three in his first three seasons combined.

**SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY**

- After racking up another sack at Wake Forest, Clint Sintim now has 29 career sacks and has been in on nine solo and four assisted sacks this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- The next closest linebacker is Texas'

Sergio Kindle, who ranks 24th nationally with .73 sacks per game.

- Sintim is tied for fourth nationally among all players in sacks (1.0/game). Only TCU's Jerry Hughes (1.17), Florida State's Everett Brown (1.14) and Arkansas State's Alex Carrington (1.05) average more sacks per game.
- His career sacks total (25 solo, four assist) is the most for any current linebacker in the country and is third among all players nationally, behind Northern Illinois' Larry English (35) and Houston's Phillip Hunt (34).

**SINTIM HOLDS UVA RECORD FOR SACKS BY LINEBACKER**

- Clint Sintim has been in on 29 career sacks and passed Darryl Blackstock (27) for the most sacks ever by a UVA LB.
- He is second in sacks for any UVA player (Chris Slade, 40).
- He needs one sack to tie Clemson's Michael Dean Perry (1984-87) and Gaines Adams (2003-06) for 10th in ACC history.
- Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this sea-

son (1.1/game).

- Sintim had his streak of five straight games with a sack snapped vs. Miami.
- The last UVA player to have sacks in five straight games was Chris Long (2007). It is the longest streak by a UVA LB since Darryl Blackstock's five-game run in 2002.

**OPPONENTS OFTEN GET FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING**

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 23 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including five this year.
- Virginia is 19-4 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke and Clemson this year.
- Virginia has held Richmond (19), Duke (84), Maryland (79), East Carolina (89) and Clemson (56) to fewer than 100 yards rushing this season.

**DEFENSE DOES ITS PART**

- UVa held Clemson to 192 yards of total offense – a season low for a Virginia opponent and the fewest yards allowed to a UVa opponent since Miami (189) Nov. 10, 2007.
- Tigers averaged just 2.8 yards per play and had 13 first downs – both season lows for a UVa opponent.
- UVa held C.J. Spiller, the ACC’s leader in all-purpose yards (148.0/game) to 57 all-purpose yards – his second-lowest mark of the year.

**APPLEBY BACK WITH A VENGEANCE**

- After missing one game and seeing limited action vs. Miami because of an injury, senior LB Antonio Appleby returned to his starting spot vs. Wake Forest and has 19 tackles in the last two games.
- Appleby racked up a career-best 13 tackles – 12 solo – vs. Wake. He was in on two tackles for loss.
- Last week he had six tackles vs. Clemson.
- He had started 34-consecutive games before missing the Miami game.

**HALL FORCES THE ISSUE**

- CB Vic Hall is tied for ninth nationally in forced fumbles with 0.36 per game. He also leads the ACC in that category.
- Hall has forced four fumbles this year.
- The UVa record is five, set by Stuart Anderson (1979), Tony Blount (1979) and Merrill Robertson (2002).

**CHILDS BECOMES NEXT MAN UP**

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start vs. Georgia Tech in place of the injured Antonio Appleby. He had five tackles.
- Against UNC, Childs had a career-high 10 tackles and recorded a tackle for loss.
- Coming into the UNC game, Childs had just three career tackles.

**TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER**

- ILB Jon Copper had seven tackles vs. Clemson and now has 292 career tackles. He needs two tackles to reach the top 15 in UVa history.
- Sean Scott (1984-87) and Jerton Evans (1999-2002) are tied for 15th.
- Copper had a career-high 16 tackles vs. UNC – the most by any UVa player since Angelo Crowell had 16 vs. Penn State in 2002.
- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 32 of his 36 games.
- Copper leads the team with 92 tackles this year, including six games of nine or more. He ranks seventh in the ACC in tackles and is averaging 8.4 per game.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-84.
- He made a career-high 109 tackles last season to rank seventh in the ACC with 8.4 stops per game.
- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

**SENIOR LINEBACKERS SHINING FOR CAVALIERS**

- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters, and the trio leads all UVa tacklers.
- The three pace UVa in tackles – Copper leads the team with 92 tackles, followed by Appleby (66) and Sintim (62).
- Each has amassed 25 or more career

starts (Sintim - 48, Appleby - 36, Copper - 36).

- Copper has 292 career tackles, while Sintim has 236 and Appleby 221.

**DOWLING A FORCE IN SECONDARY**

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling has three interceptions this season – more than any UVa player had last season and the most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Dowling had a career-best two INTs at Duke to double his career INT total.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.
- Despite missing time with injuries, Dowling ranks third in the ACC with 12 passes defensed.

**GLASPY CONTINUES TO LEAD SECONDARY**

- Safety Byron Glaspy’s 39 career starts are most in the secondary and second on the team behind Clint Sintim’s 48.
- He ranks fifth on the team with 52 tackles in 2008 and has four PBU.
- He is averging 5.0 tackles per game – tops on the team among DBs.

**DO-IT-ALL HALL**

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fourth on the team in tackles with 56, tops among the team's corners.
- Against Georgia Tech, Hall had a diving, game-clinching interception in the fourth quarter. It was his third career INT and his second this year.

- Today's temperature was 35 degrees at kickoff. It is the coldest temperature for a kickoff of a UVa game at Scott Stadium since records are available starting in 1966.
