#### A LONG TIME COMING

- Virginia is playing its first game in Winston-Salem since 2002.

- The Cavaliers won, 38-34, in their last trip to Wake Forest.
- UVa has won its last 10 trips to Wake Forest. The last loss came in 1983 (38-34) against the Al Groh-led Demon Deacons.

#### THE SERIES VS. WAKE FOREST

- The Cavaliers have won 20 of the last 21 meetings against Wake Forest and lead the series 34-12.

### THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Virginia has won 10 straight games on the road against Wake Forest, dating back to 1985.
- The Cavaliers' schedule is rated the toughest nationally this week by the NCAA. Their opponents' combined winning percentage is .689.
- UVa is 11-1 all-time when Cedric Peerman gets 15 or more rushing attempts. The lone loss was last week vs. Miami.
- Virginia has allowed the fewest sacks in the ACC (1.11/game). On the flip side, the defense has the second-most sacks in the ACC (2.78/game).
- With 1.11 sacks per game this year, Clint Sintim ranks fifth nationally and leads the ACC in sacks. He also is the national leader in sacks among linebackers.

The ACC has a new injury release policy this year. On each Monday during the season, the school announces any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

**CLOSE AFFAIRS THE NORM OF LATE**

- The last four games between Wake Forest and Virginia each have been decided by four points or fewer.
- UVA won the last three meetings by a combined eight points, including a one-point thriller last season.
- Wake Forest's last three wins over Virginia (1981, 1983, 2001) have been by a combined 11 points.
- Wake Forest's last win was a 34-30 victory in Charlottesville six years ago.

**MORE ON THE WAKE-VIRGINIA SERIES**

- UVA is 16-4 all-time in Winston-Salem, dating back to 1957.
- Virginia had a 17-game winning streak from 1984-2000, the second-longest winning streak in ACC history.
- Since the series was tied at seven wins apiece in 1970, Virginia has won 27 of the last 32 meetings.

**VIRGINIA GRADS FACE OFF**

- Each sideline boasts a UVA grad in charge – UVA head coach Al Groh ('67) and Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe ('75, '78).
- Groh returned to his alma mater in 2001 to take over the coaching reins following George Welsh's retirement.
- Groh's first college head coaching job was at Wake Forest, where he led the Demon Deacons to a 26-40 mark in six seasons (1981-86) and is tied as the fourth-winningest coach in WFU history.
- Grobe earned his undergraduate degree in education in 1975 from UVA and a master's degree in guidance and counseling in 1978. He was a two-year starter at middle guard and linebacker, lettering in 1973-74.
- Current UVA offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Mike Groh could often be seen at Wake Forest practices and served as a ballboy during his dad's days in Winston-Salem.
- The Virginia/Wake Forest game is one of nine in ACC history where the competing head coaches are alums of the same school and the first where both head coaches actually played their college ball in the ACC.
- Groh is 3-1 vs. Wake Forest, while Grobe is 1-3 against his alma mater.

**FIRST GAME ON TURF THIS YEAR**

- The Saturday contest will mark the first time UVA has played on an artificial surface this year – Wake Forest has a FieldTurf playing surface.
- It is the first time UVA will play on FieldTurf since Oct. 6, 2007 at Middle Tennessee (23-21 win).
- It has become a rarity for UVA to play on an artificial surface – UVA played on turf twice in 2005 (Syracuse, Boston College), but only once since.
- This is the only regular season game that Virginia will play on artificial turf.

**ANOTHER HOMECOMING**

- A week after hosting Homecoming festivities, UVA will be the guest for Wake Forest's Homecoming this weekend.
- It marks the third straight week UVA has been involved in a Homecoming – the Wahoos won, 24-17, Oct. 25 at Georgia Tech during the Jackets' Homecoming.

**CONTAINING WAKE'S RUSH ATTACK**

- The Virginia defense has done an outstanding job of bottling up the Wake Forest rushing attack en route to winning 20 of the last 21 games since 1984.
- During this span UVA has allowed Wake to rush for an average of 128.6 yards per contest and 3.5 yards per carry.
- Grobe's Demon Deacon squads have averaged 220.3 rushing yards per game and 4.2 yards per carry in four games vs. Virginia.

**SCORING EARLY, FIRST IMPORTANT**

- One of the keys to either team winning this game has been the ability to score early and score first.
- Since 1982, the winning team has scored first 17 times (Virginia 16 wins, Wake Forest one).
- UVA has scored on its first possession nine times since 1987 and won each time (The Cavaliers scored on their first drive on six consecutive occasions between 1987-92).
- The Demon Deacons scored on their first possession and ended UVA's 17-game series winning streak in 2001.
- Last year, the Deacs took the early lead on a Sam Swank 27-yard field goal.

**UVA PILES UP OFFENSE VS. DEACS**

- The Cavaliers have put on some impressive offensive performances against Wake Forest in the last 25 years since the early 1980s.
- The Cavaliers have scored 30 or more points in 13 of the last 18 meetings.
- Two of UVA's top-six total offense figures have come vs. the Demon Deacons.
- The most impressive output was a 643-yard performance (323 yards rushing, 320 yards passing) in 1982.
- The 643 yards of offense is the fourth-highest total in school history and marks the only game in school history where the Cavaliers gained 300 yards both rushing and passing.

**CAVALIER RUSHERS SHINE VS. WAKE**

- In 18 of the last 25 games against Wake Forest dating back to 1980, Virginia has had at least one player rush for 100 yards.
- There have been 26 Cavaliers since 1954 to have rushed for at least 100 yards against Wake Forest, the most by UVA against any ACC team.

**VIRGINIA SCHEDULE RATED AMONG NATION'S BEST**

- Regardless of which service you check, the UVA strength of schedule is one of the toughest in the country.
- Virginia's opponents this year boast a 62-28 record (.689), tops in the nation.
- Virginia currently has the third-toughest schedule in the FBS according to the latest Sagarin ratings.
- Six of UVA's FBS opponents already are bowl eligible, while Virginia Tech, Wake Forest and East Carolina are one win shy.

**2007: VIRGINIA 17, WAKE FOREST 16**

- Mikell Simpson ran one yard for a touchdown with 2:18 to play as No. 23 Virginia posted a 17-16 win over Wake Forest (No. 24 BCS, No. 21 AP), the Cavaliers' third one-point victory in four games.
- Wake drove to Virginia's 30 in the closing seconds, but Sam Swank, one of the best kickers in the ACC, missed a 47-yard field-goal attempt with two seconds left.
- Jameel Sewell was 20-for-43 for 225 and a 39-yard touchdown to Maurice Covington with 10 seconds left in the first half. Simpson caught eight passes for 77 yards and also rushed for 35 yards.

**UVA STRONG VS. RANKED TEAMS**

- Virginia earned wins over ranked teams in consecutive weeks Oct. 18 and 25 (No. 18 North Carolina, No. 21 Georgia Tech).
- It is the first time since 2002 Virginia defeated ranked teams in back-to-back weeks. UVA beat No. 20 NC State and No. 18 Maryland that season.
- The Georgia Tech win was UVA's first on the road over a ranked team since winning at then-No. 19 Clemson in 2001.
- UVA last won two games against ranked teams in the same season in 2005.
- Currently, four UVA opponents are ranked (USC, UMD, UNC, GT) and the Cavaliers have defeated all but USC.

**CHILDS BECOMES LATEST FIRST-TIME STARTER**

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start at Georgia Tech, becoming the 18th Cavalier to make the first start of his career this season.
- There have been plenty of new starters on each side of the ball, with nine first-timers on offense and nine on defense.

**FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN CRACK LINEUP**

- PK Robert Randolph became the fifth true freshman to play for UVA this season after seeing action in the fourth quarter vs. East Carolina.
- He is joined by P Jimmy Howell, OL Austin Pasztor, LB Cam Johnson and DB Rodney McLeod.
- Johnson made his debut vs. Connecticut, while Howell and Pasztor each saw action in the season opener vs. Southern California. McLeod played on the opening kickoff against vs. Duke and also played several plays from scrimmage.

**PASZTOR FIRST SINCE 2005 TO START ON O-LINE AS TRUE FRESHMAN**

- True freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start against Maryland.
- He became the first true freshman to start on the Cavaliers' offensive line since Branden Albert in 2005.

**MORE ON THE FIRST-TIMERS**

- 22 Cavaliers have seen their first career action in the six games this season after kickers Chris Hinkebein and Robert Randolph played vs. East Carolina.
- 14 made their first appearances vs. USC and eight have followed suit in the last five games.
- On Offense: T Landon Bradley, WR Kris Burd, TE Andrew Devlin, WR Jared Green, C Anthony Mihota, G Austin Pasztor, QB Marc Verica, FB Curt Orshoski.
- On Defense: DE Nick Conrath, DL John-Kevin Dolce, LB Terence Fells-Danzer, NT Nick Jenkins, LB Cam Johnson, CB Dom Joseph, DB Rodney McLeod, CB Chase Minnifield, S Corey Mosley, DE Zane Parr.
- On Special Teams: P Jimmy Howell, PK Yannick Reyerling, PK Chris Hinkebein, PK Robert Randolph.

**FOUR HOOS HAIL FROM NORTH CAROLINA**

- Virginia has four players who hail from North Carolina, including two Durham natives, S Brandon Woods and WR Maurice Covington, who each went to Southern Durham High School.
- Chris Hinkebein (Providence) and Rico Bell (Vance) each are from Charlotte.
- In contrast, Wake Forest has three players from the state of Virginia.

**AFCA HONORS UVA PROGRAM**

- The American Football Coaches Association has recognized the University of Virginia among its honorees for graduation of its football players. This is the 23rd time the UVA program has been cited since 1981.
- The Cavalier program received the Academic Achievement Award for the highest graduation rate in 1985 and 1986 and has garnered honorable mention recognition a record 21 times.

**CAVALIERS SECOND YOUNGEST IN ACC**

- Virginia has 72 freshmen or sophomores on its roster. The Cavaliers and

Virginia Tech rank second to Georgia Tech for the youngest team in the ACC.

- Georgia Tech has 75 players that are either freshmen or sophomores.
- North Carolina (68), Duke (66) and Boston College (64) rank fourth through sixth, respectively.

**MORE ON THE YOUTH MOVEMENT**

- Virginia has just 16 seniors on its roster.
- That total is among the fewest in the country – only 17 programs have fewer seniors on their rosters.
- Central Michigan and Toledo each have just 10 seniors on their rosters.

**UVA HAS PLAYED MOST GAMES OF ANY ACC SCHOOL**

- Virginia has played more football games than any other ACC school.
- The Cavaliers have played 1,189 games in this, the 119th season of UVA football.
- During that time, Virginia has compiled a 612-528-48 record, a winning percentage of .535.
- North Carolina ranks next among ACC schools with 1,171 games played in 118 seasons. UVA is ranked sixth among all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision teams in games played and 13th overall among all Division I teams.
- Penn (1,290) has played the most games overall.

**VIRGINIA AVERAGES FEWEST PENALTY YARDS PER GAME SINCE '01**

- Virginia has been the ACC's least-penalized team during Al Groh's eight years as head coach.
- UVA is averaging 44.5 penalty yards this year – third fewest in the ACC.

**MORE WHITE-KNUCKLERS IN STORE?**

- UVa won its first close game this year vs. UNC after having a season full of them in 2007.
- Virginia won five games by two points or fewer last year, becoming the first team in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history to win five games by one or two points in a season.
- The 1971 Columbia team held the previous record with four wins by one or two points.
- Six of the Cavaliers' nine wins last year were by six points or fewer.
- UVa's six wins by six points or fewer were most in the nation (Memphis, New Mexico – four).
- It was only the third time in ACC history a team has won six games by six points or fewer during the regular season (North Carolina, 1976; Maryland, 2006).

**LOTS OF NEW FACES**

- UVa features just 10 returning starters – five on each side of the ball.
- It marks the fewest returning starters since 1986 (nine).
- Only seven schools have fewer returning starters (Air Force, Army, Hawaii have fewest with eight).
- Cavaliers also is breaking in a new placekicker and punter this year, but returning long snapper Danny Aiken and holder Vic Hall.

**WHO'S BACK – BY THE NUMBERS**

- Thirty lettermen return, the program's fewest since 1986 (29).
- UVa lost 42 percent (10 of 24) of its offensive lettermen.
- Cavaliers also lost 43 percent (11 of 26) of their defensive lettermen.

**CAPTAINS HAVE VIRGINIA FLAVOR**

- All four UVa captains hail from Virginia.
- TE John Phillips (Warm Springs), TB Cedric Peerman (Gladys), OLB Clint Sintim (Woodbridge) and CB Vic Hall (Gretna) will serve as 2008 captains.

- Phillips started eight games last season (17 rec., 193 yards, 2 TD).
- Peerman missed the second half of the season because of foot injury; was the ACC's leading rusher at the time.
- Sintim was the team's third-leading tackler and had nine sacks to lead linebackers nationally.
- Hall, a junior, started all 13 games in 2007 and made 58 tackles.

**THREE COMPETE AS GRAD STUDENTS**

- Three Cavaliers have already received their undergraduate degrees and are participating as graduate students this year.
- The list of grad students and their undergraduate degrees includes: QB Scott Deke (economics), S Byron Glaspy (economics) and TB Cedric Peerman (sociology).
- UVa has had 107 players play as grad students in the past 19 seasons.

**YEARS SINCE CONSECUTIVE LOSING SEASONS (SUB-.500 SEASONS)**

- Virginia has gone 25 years since suffering consecutive losing seasons (1980-82).
- The Cavaliers' streak is the 16th longest in the nation.

**SLOW STARTERS**

- Virginia's offense has taken some time to get rolling throughout the year. UVa has scored on its opening drive just twice this year – both via field goals (Richmond, Georgia Tech).
- UVa has been outscored 62-40 in the opening quarter this year, but has rebounded to outscore opponents 49-30 in the second quarter.
- Slow starts have plagued the UVa defense as well, with the Cavaliers giving up points on the opening drive in six of nine games, including each of the last four.
- The Cavaliers have trailed in seven of their nine games this year. The exceptions are their two shutouts (Richmond, Maryland).

**O-LINE PREVENTING SACKS**

- Virginia's offensive line has done its job in pass protection, allowing just 10 sacks in nine games (1.11 per game).
- The Cavaliers lead the ACC in fewest sacks allowed and rank 15th nationally.
- UVa has given up more than one sack on just one occasion – vs. Southern California (two) in the season opener.

**RED-ZONE SUCCESS**

- One of the keys to UVa's winning streak has been its ability to successfully finish off drives.
- Virginia is 16 for its last 17 in the red zone, with the lone hiccup coming on a missed field goal in the Maryland game.
- Over the last four games, UVa has scored on 14 straight drives in the red zone, including 10 touchdowns.

- Only Clemson, at 216.0, averages more passing yards per game.
- Over the last five games, Virginia has averaged 236.2 passing yards per game.
- Virginia ranked 10th in the ACC in passing offense in 2007 (194.8).

**VERICA RUNS 200 STREAK TO FIVE**

- Quarterback Marc Verica threw for 240 yards vs. Miami, the fifth game in a row he passed for at least 200 yards.
- He is only the third QB in UVa history with at least five 200-yard games in a row.
- Matt Schaub had six in a row in 2003, while Scott Secules had a five-game streak in 1987.

**MIRROR IMAGES?**

- Marc Verica has put up extremely consistent numbers over the last five games.
- Overall, Verica ranks first in the ACC and 14th nationally in completion percentage (66.8 percent).

**FEED PEERMAN THE BALL**

- Virginia is 11-1 all-time (4-1 in 2008) when Cedric Peerman gets 15 or more carries in a game.
- The loss to Miami marked the first time UVa has failed to win when Peerman gets 15 or more rushing attempts in a game.

**PEERMAN BURSTS BACK ONTO SCENE**

- After being limited in the first four games by an injury, Cedric Peerman has exploded in the last five games.
- Peerman has rushed for 100-plus yards in three of the last five games with 110 vs. Maryland, 173 against East Carolina and 118 at Georgia Tech (first to rush for 100+ vs. GT this year).
- He is averaging 5.6 yards per carry this season and ranks third in the ACC with 77.4 rushing yards per game.

**PEERMAN CATCHES THE ROCK TOO**

- Cedric Peerman ranks eighth in the ACC this season with 4.12 receptions per game and leads ACC running backs in receptions.
- Peerman ranks third nationally in receptions per game among running backs – only Texas A&M’s Mike Goodson (4.43) and West Virginia’s Jock Sanders (4.38) have more receptions per game.
- Peerman set career highs for receptions twice this year with seven vs. Maryland and eight against East Carolina.
- He had a career-best 55 receiving yards vs. Georgia Tech.

**ANOTHER 100-YARD RUSHING GAME FOR PEERMAN**

- Cedric Peerman now has six career 100-yard games – three this year and three in 2007.
- He is the 10th player at Virginia to have two seasons with three or more 100-yard rushing games and the first since Wali Lundy in 2002, 2003 and 2004.
- Peerman is tied for 14th in career 100-yard rushing performances at UVa.

- With his catch of 23 yards in the third quarter vs. North Carolina, Kevin Ogletree moved past the 1,000-yard mark in career receiving yards.
- With 71 yards last week vs. Miami, he now has 1,154 career receiving yards.
- He ranks 19th in receiving yards in school history.
- He also has four receiving touchdowns this year, tying his career high (2006).

**OGLETREE CRACKS CENTURY MARK AGAIN ...**

- Kevin Ogletree earned his third career 100-yard receiving day vs. Maryland with exactly 100 yards.
- He also had 103 yards receiving Sept. 6 vs. Richmond.
- Ironically, Ogletree's first 100-yard performance came two years ago in UVa's home game vs. Maryland (133 yards).

**OGLETREE CONTINUES STREAK OF MULTIPLE RECEPTIONS**

- Kevin Ogletree had five receptions vs. Miami and now has at least two receptions in 21 straight games, dating to the start of 2006.
- It is the second-longest such streak behind Billy McMullen's 25-game run from 2000-02.
- He also has the ninth-longest streak of games with at least one reception (21). Patrick Jeffers (1993-95) holds the record of 31.
- Ogletree leads the team with 44 receptions for 545 yards (60.6 yards per game).
- He ranks fourth in the ACC in receptions per game (4.89) and sixth in receiving yards per game (60.6).

**NOTING UVA ATHLETICS**

**UVA ATHLETICS FINISHES 17TH IN DIRECTORS' CUP**

- Virginia finished 17th in the final 2007-08 U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition for Division I schools.
- It was the 15th-consecutive year (since program's inception) that UVa has recorded a top-30 finish.
- UVa is one of 15 schools to rank in the top 30 of the final Directors' Cup standings in all 15 years of the program's existence.
- Teams or individuals in 21 of Virginia's 25 athletics programs advanced to post-season competition in 2007-08, including 19 in NCAA championship events.

**2007-08 UVA ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS**

- The men's tennis and men's lacrosse teams both reached the semifinals of the NCAA Championships.
- The women's rowing team placed fifth overall at the NAAs.
- Cavalier men's tennis player Somdev Devvarman repeated as NCAA individual champion, becoming the 13th player in the 124-year history of the event to win consecutive titles.
- Seven UVA coaches earned eight ACC Coach of the Year awards in their respective sports: Kim Lewellen (women's golf); Jason Dunn (men's cross country); Al Groh (football); Mark Bernardino (men's swimming & diving and women's swimming & diving); Kevin Sauer (rowing); Julie Myers (women's lacrosse) and Brian Boland (men's tennis).
- Women's basketball head coach Debbie Ryan was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in June, and men's lacrosse coach Dom Starsia will be inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in November.
- Virginia had six student-athletes that were selected for the ACC award recognizing exemplary levels of academic and athletic achievement. That group included senior tight end Tom Santi, who won the Tatum Award as the top football student-athlete.
- There are nine people with direct connections to UVa that were participants or coaches in the Beijing Olympics. Women's eight rower Lindsay Shoop and women's soccer player Angela Hucles won gold medals.

**CAVALIER WIDE RECEIVERS EMERGE**

- Virginia wide receivers have combined for 1,249 yards receiving this year and already easily eclipsed the wide receiver total from all of 2007.
- UVa wide receivers had 833 receiving yards in 13 games last season.
- UVa WRs have 109 receptions this year after catching 72 balls in 2007.

**COVINGTON PROVIDES ANOTHER TARGET**

- Senior WR Maurice Covington has at least three catches in each of the last five games, including four vs. Miami.
- Against Georgia Tech, Covington set a career high for receptions (five) and tied his career high for receiving yards (76).
- He also had his first TD reception of the season in the third quarter vs. Tech.

**NOTING VERICA'S HOT STRETCH**

- Against Georgia Tech, Marc Verica set career highs with 29 completions and 270 passing yards and tied his high of 2 TD.
- Versus North Carolina, he led the

Cavaliers on a game-tying drive in the final two minutes of regulation, then the winning drive in overtime.

- Against ECU, Verica had 14 straight completions to tie a school record for most consecutive completions in a game.
- Against Maryland, he scrambled for his first rushing TD (five yards).
- Verica became the first UVa QB in nearly three years to complete 25 passes in a game (Marques Hagans vs. Minnesota, 2005 Music City Bowl), vs. Maryland and topped it vs. Georgia Tech.
- Verica also connected on his longest career pass, 51 yards, to Kevin Ogletree for a TD against Maryland.

**MONROE, SINTIM ON KIPER'S BIG BOARD**

- Senior T Eugene Monroe currently is No. 4 and LB Clint Sintim No. 13 on ESPN's Mel Kiper's 2009 Big Board for NFL Draft prospects.
- Monroe also has been named to the Outland and Lombardi trophy watch lists, while Sintim is on the Nagurski Award

watch list.

- Monroe received honorable mention All-ACC recognition in '07 and joined Sintim on several preseason All-ACC squads this year.
- Sintim, a preseason Nagurski Award candidate, leads the ACC in sacks this season and just came off a stretch of 10 sacks in the last five games.

**PHILLIPS PILES ON CATCHES**

- John Phillips had a career-best seven catches vs. Miami to continue the best season of his college career.
- Phillips ranks first among ACC TEs this season in receptions per game (4.67; 42 receipts, 336 yards) and is fifth in the ACC in receptions per game this year.
- Phillips also ranks seventh nationally among tight ends in receptions per game.
- With 42 receptions this year, Phillips has the 12th-most receptions by a tight end in a single season in ACC history and is tied for second most by a UVa tight end (Heath Miller, 70 - 2004).

**SACK ATTACK**

- The Cavaliers are second in the ACC and 16th in the FBS with 2.78 sacks per game (25 total). Georgia Tech leads the ACC with 2.89 sacks per game (26 total).
- TCU leads the FBS with 3.8 sacks per game, while Texas and Tulsa (3.44) are tied for second.

**HAVING A FIELD DAY**

- Senior DE Alex Field had his first multiple-sack day with two sacks vs. Miami.
- It gave him a career-high five sacks this year. He had three in his first three seasons combined.
- Field is tied for sixth in the ACC and 75th nationally in sacks (0.5/game).

**SINTIM LEADS LINEBACKERS IN SACKS NATIONALLY**

- After being in on three sacks (one solo, two assist) at Georgia Tech, Clint Sintim now has 28 career sacks and has been in on eight solo and four assisted sacks this season to lead linebackers nationally.
- His 28 career sacks are the most for any current linebacker in the country (no LB has more than 15.5) and are third nationally among all players nationally.

**SINTIM NOW HOLDS UVA RECORD FOR SACKS BY LINEBACKER**

- After being in on three sacks at Georgia Tech, Clint Sintim has been in on 28 career sacks and passed Darryl Blackstock (27) for the most sacks ever by a UVA LB.
- He is second in sacks for any UVA player (Chris Slade, 40).
- Sintim leads the ACC in sacks this season (1.11/game).
- Sintim had his streak of five straight games with a sack snapped vs. Miami.
- The last UVA player to have sacks in five straight games was Chris Long (2007). It is

the longest streak by a UVA LB since Darryl Blackstock's five-game run in 2002.

**OPPONENTS OFTEN GET FEWER THAN 100 YARDS RUSHING**

- Since 2004, Virginia has held 22 opponents to 100 rushing yards or fewer, including three straight this year.
- Virginia is 19-3 in those games. The lone losses were to NC State and Texas Tech last season and Duke this year.
- Virginia has held half of its eight opponents – Richmond (19), Duke (84), Maryland (79) and East Carolina (89) – to fewer than 100 yards rushing this season

**CHILDS BECOMES NEXT MAN UP**

- Junior LB Darren Childs made his first career start vs. Georgia Tech in place of the injured Antonio Appleby. He had five tackles.
- Against UNC, Childs had a career-high 10 tackles and recorded a tackle for loss.
- Coming into the UNC game, Childs had just three career tackles.

**SENIOR LINEBACKERS SHINING FOR CAVALIERS**

- Seniors Antonio Appleby, Jon Copper and Clint Sintim all are returning starters, and the trio leads all UVA tacklers.
- The three pace UVA in tackles – Copper leads the team with 75 tackles, followed by Sintim (53) and Appleby (47).
- Each has amassed 25 or more career starts (Sintim - 46, Appleby - 34, Copper - 34).
- Copper has 275 career tackles, while Sintim has 227 and Appleby 202.

**TACKLES ADDING UP FOR COPPER**

- ILB Jon Copper had a career-best 16 tackles vs. North Carolina. It topped his previous high of 12.
- Copper's 16 tackles were the most by any UVA player since Angelo Crowell had 16 vs. Penn State in 2002.

- Since the start of 2006, Copper has recorded six or more tackles in 30 of his 34 games.
- Copper leads the team with 67 tackles, including five games of nine or more. He ranks seventh in the ACC in tackles.
- He is attempting to become the first player to lead the team in tackling three straight years since Charles McDaniel from 1982-84.

- He also shared the team lead with two interceptions a year ago, the first LB to lead the team since Scott Lageman in 1985.

**DOWLING A FORCE IN SECONDARY**

- Sophomore CB Ras-I Dowling has three interceptions this season – more than any UVA player had last season and most since Marcus Hamilton in 2006.
- Dowling had a career-best two INTs at Duke to double his career INT total.
- Dowling is the first Cavalier to intercept two passes in a game since Marcus Hamilton picked off two passes at Duke in 2006.
- Despite missing significant time with injuries, Dowling still ranks third in the ACC with 10 passes defensed.

**CONRATH NAMED TO MIDSEASON FROSH ALL-AMERICA TEAM**

- Redshirt freshman DE Matt Conrath was named to the Rivals.com Midseason Freshman All-America Team.
- Conrath has 21 tackles (13 solo), including six for loss (three sacks), this season.
- He also has three passes broken up and a blocked kick.
- Conrath also was named to College Football News' 2008 Redshirt Freshman All-America Team prior to the season.

**SINTIM A CANDIDATE FOR NAGURSKI TROPHY**

- Senior OLB Clint Sintim has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List.
- Nagurski Trophy is presented to the nation's best defensive player.
- He has started all 46 games in his career – currently tied for the 11th most consecutive starts in the FBS.

**DO-IT-ALL HALL**

- Vic Hall has filled many roles throughout his career—starting cornerback, cover man on kickoffs and punts, return-man and holder.
- He ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 43, tops among the team's corners.
- Against Georgia Tech, Hall had a diving, game-clinching interception in the fourth quarter. It was his third career INT and his second this year.
- Hall had an INT earlier this year vs. Richmond and took it back 60 yards for his first career touchdown.
- He also ranks fifth in the ACC in punt returns this season (7.1 average). He had had 230 punt return yards in 2007 – most by a Cavalier since 2004.

**DEFENSE RECORDS ANOTHER SHUTOUT**

- UVa's shutout vs. Maryland was the program's ninth since 2003 and second this season.

**REYERING MAKES FOOTBALL DEBUT**

- Yannick Reyering became the first UVa soccer player since Jeff Gaffney (1986) to score as a member of the football team.
- He is 6-for-11 in field goals and has kicked 16 PATs this season.
- The USC contest marked the first time Reyering ever played in a football game.
- Reyering was a first-team All-ACC pick in 2007 (13 goals, four game-winning goals).
- He is a three-time All-ACC honoree; he led UVa in scoring all three years.
- He netted 39 goals and 10 assists during his decorated career before suffering season-ending knee injury prior to 2007 ACC Tournament.
- He led UVa to College Cup (final four of men's soccer) in 2006.

**Game Notes**

- Virginia leads the all-time series 25-2-2 and has now shut-out the Spiders in 20 of 29 meetings all-time. Richmond has scored only four touchdowns vs. UVA since 1946, a span of eight games.
- Virginia wore throwback jerseys for today's game as part of "Retro Day" honoring the Cavalier teams that played from 1984 to 1993. During that period the Cavaliers won 72 games.
- Redshirt freshman defensive end Matt Conrath recorded his first career sack today as did sophomore lineman John-Kevin Dolce. Both players finished with 1.5 sacks.

- Vic Hall's 60-yard interception return for a touchdown is Virginia's longest interception return since Antwan Harris raced 95 yards for a TD vs. North Carolina in 1996.
- Chase Minnifield's interception in the fourth quarter was the first of his career.
- Richmond rushed for 19 yards in the game, the fewest against UVA since Duke rushed for -21 yards in 2006, a span of 22 games.

- The victory is the most lopsided in the series since UVa defeated Maryland 48-13 at Scott Stadium in 2002.
- The game marked the first time Maryland has been shut-out since a 16-0 loss at Virginia in 2004. It is just the third shutout during Ralph Friedgen's tenure as Maryland's head coach in 93 games (since 2001).

  - Verica's longest career pass
  - Equaled Ogletree's long career reception. He had a 51-yard reception (non-scoring) vs. Maryland in 2006
  - It was UVa's longest reception in a game since Ogletree's catch in 2006 (24 games)
- Freshman Austin Pasztor made his first career start. He is the first true freshman to start on the offensive line for the Cavaliers since OG Branden Albert did in 2005.
