FIRST-AND-10...

• The University of Maryland will try to get back on the winning track Saturday when it plays host to the University of Virginia in the Terrapins' annual Homecoming game. The Terps, 1-1 in the ACC play, are coming off a 42-32 loss at Wake Forest, while the Cavaliers downed Indiana, 47-7, last week. The Terps and Cavaliers will square off at 4 p.m. Saturday in Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium. The game will be telecast live on ESPNU and broadcast on the Terrapin Sports Radio Network. Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic will show a replay of the game at 7:30 p.m. Sunday.

• Offensively, Maryland has been led by quarterback **Chris Turner** and wide receiver **Torrey Smith**. Turner, who ranks among the top signal-callers in school history, is averaging 248.8 passing yards per game (fifth in the ACC) and completing 60.7 percent of his passes (fifth in the league). He had his fourth career 300-yard passing game (307) vs. Wake Forest (10/10) and matched his career-high with three TDs. Smith has emerged as one of the top all-around threats in the nation. He's averaging 86.5 receiving yards per game (t-32nd nationally) and 236.7 all-purpose ypg (first in the country). No. 1 running back **Da'Rel Scott** was injured (broken wrist) vs. Clemson (10/3) and is out of action until at least November. He was a first-team All-ACC pick last season and has a 5.63 career yards-per-carry average, which ranks second in school history. Starting LT **Bruce Campbell** (knee) was also on the shelf last week. With Campbell out, senior center **Phil Costa**, who has started 24 career games, will be leaned on even more heavily as the rest of the linemen have a total of 21 career starts. The Terps will be facing a top-ranked defense for the second time in three weeks. Virginia is surrendering 295.8 yards per game (25th nationally). Clemson was 26th in the country (289.8 ypg) two weeks ago.

• The Terps had put together two solid defensive performances, surrendering a season-best 249 yards of total offense to Rutgers (9/26) and 274 to Clemson (10/3) before Wake Forest erupted for 516 total yards last weekend. LBs **Alex Wujciak** and **Adrian Moten** have been the top playmakers on a defense which has just four starters back from last year. Wujciak, a second-team All-ACC selection last season, has a team-high 63 tackles, including a career-best 17 stops vs. Rutgers (9/26). Moten has 40 tackles (tied for second on the team), including a career-high 13 stops vs. James Madison (9/12). He is also the top sack producer (3.0). LB **Demetrius Hartsfield** has been impressive of late, posting a career-high 10 stops vs. Clemson and earning ACC Freshman of the Week honors for that performance. First-year coordinator **Don Brown** has a veteran secondary to lean on, though there have been injuries at that position. Senior **Nolan Carroll**, the team's No. 1 cornerback, was lost for the season vs. JMU with a broken tibia. Senior SS **Jamari McCollough** missed two games with a foot injury and played sparingly the following two weeks. Cornerbacks **Anthony Wiseman** and **Cameron Chism** each have 31 stops, tops among DBs. Seniors **Travis Ivey**, **Jared Harrell** and **Deege Galt** are veterans on the defensive line. Ivey gives the line size and athleticism on the interior, while Galt has 1.5 sacks (t-third on the team). The Terps have 13 sacks over the last four games and rank tied for second in the ACC in that category (2.5 per game).

• The special teams unit, under the direction of first-year coordinator **Charles Bankins**, features a pair of preseason All-Americans in Smith and junior punter **Travis Baltz**. Smith set the ACC single-season record for kickoff return yards (1,089) last season and has confirmed his preseason All-America selection. He returned his second career kickoff for a TD vs. James Madison and set the Maryland career kickoff return yards mark vs. Rutgers. Baltz was a 2008 first-team All-ACC choice after leading the league in punting average (41.1 ypp). He was a preseason consensus first team All-ACC pick and is one of just nine punters on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award. However, he suffered an ankle injury vs. Rutgers and is out of action. True freshman **Nick Ferrara** has been a bright spot. He's 8-for-10 on field-goal attempts, including a career long 50-yarder vs. Wake Forest. He also has handled the kickoff chores, and served as the punter the last two games. He was named the ACC co-Specialist of the Week for his performance vs. Clemson (10/3). **Tony Logan** was expected to be the No. 1 punt returner, taking over for three-year starter Danny Oquendo, but he missed the first two games with an injury. Logan has resumed his duties as No. 1 punt returner the last two weeks.

QUICK HITTERS...

- Despite being only a sophomore **Torrey Smith** is already rewriting both the Maryland and Atlantic Coast Conference record books. Smith owns the school and league's single-season kickoff return yardage record (1,089 in 2008), as well as the Terps' career kickoff return yards mark (1,926). He also posted a Maryland-record 21.3 yards per touch last season. Smith currently ranks eighth on the ACC kickoff return yardage chart (see pg. 4) and has a chance to reach first before the end of the season. He needs to average 127.2 yards over the next six games to set the record. Smith averaged 139.5 kick-off return yards over the first six games. In addition, he can eclipse his own ACC single-season kickoff mark with 253 more yards.

- Smith was voted the ACC Specialist of the Week for his performance vs. Wake Forest (10/10). He posted a career-high 194 kickoff return yards, including an 85-yarder.

- Smith posted a career-high 287 all-purpose yards (165 receiving/109 kickoff/13 rush) vs. Middle Tennessee State (9/19) and had 267 vs. Wake Forest (10/10), the second-highest total of his career. He ranks first in the nation in that category (236.7 ypg). The ACC record is 186.9 ypg by Frank Quayle (Virginia) in 1968. Smith needs to average 105.7 all-purpose yards over the final six regular-season games to eclipse Thomas Jones' (Virginia) league record of 2,054. Smith already has 1,420 all-purpose yards this season after posting 1,425 last year.

- Smith is the only player in the NCAA FBS to post at least 225 all-purpose yards in five games this season. In fact, only three other players - C.J. Spiller (Clemson), Brandon West (Western Michigan) and Damaris Johnson (Tulsa) - have done it three times.

- **Chris Turner**, in his third season as the starter, ranks among the top signal-callers in school history. The senior ranks fourth on Maryland's career completion percentage list (59.9), third in career passing yards chart (5,967), third in total offense (5,787), second in completions (492), third in career pass attempts (821) and fourth in TD passes (29). Turner needs 293 passing yards to move past Boomer Esiason (6,259/1981-83) and into second place (see chart on pg. 6). He would need to average 222.3 yards over the final six regular-season games to set the school record (7,301 by Scott Milanovich, 1992-95).

- Junior linebacker **Alex Wujciak** entered the season ranked fifth nationally among returning tacklers. He has kept up the same pace this season, averaging 10.5 stops per game (tied for 15th nationally). In fact, Wujciak ranks first nationally (10.3) on the active career tackles-per-game list. Travis Lewis of Oklahoma (10.0) is second.

- Smith has posted over 100 receiving yards in two of the last four games and has three in his career, all coming over the last eight games. He had a career-high 165 receiving yards vs. MTSU (9/19), which were the most by a Maryland player since Darrius

Heyward-Bey had 175 vs. Miami (11/11/06). He also became the first Terp to post back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Vernon Davis in 2005. Jermaine Lewis (four straight in 1994) is the only player in school history to have more than two straight 100-yard receiving games.

- The Terps' 10 returning starters (six on offense/four on defense) are the second-fewest in the Friedgen era. Heading into the 2004 season, Maryland had nine starters (five offense/four defense) back from the previous campaign.

- Maryland has played 21 freshmen (eight true/13 redshirts) this season which is the most during **Ralph Friedgen's** nine seasons. The Terps played 20 freshmen in both the 2001 and 2004 seasons.

- Friedgen is among the winningest coaches in Atlantic Coast Conference history. He ranks 10th all-time in winning percentage (see chart on page 7) with a record of 66-40 (.623). Maryland has made six postseason appearances in Friedgen's eight seasons, including a school-record four bowl wins. The Terps appeared in one bowl game in the previous 15 seasons.

- Maryland is 201-167-4 (.546) all-time in ACC contests, including a 38-28 (.576) mark under Friedgen.

- The Maryland Terrapins lost a close friend last week when Jack Heise (dubbed 'Mr. Maryland' for his support of the Terps) passed away suddenly. The Terps honored his memory against Wake Forest by donning an emblem with the initials JH on each player's helmet. That will remain on the helmets throughout the season.

INJURIES TAKING A TOLL...

The Terps have lost a number of key performers to injury so far this season. CB **Nolan Carroll** (leg) was

lost for the season in the second game. Starting left tackle **Bruce Campbell** has missed three games, punter **Travis Baltz** has missed the last two contests and tailback **Da'Rel Scott** is out at least another month with a broken wrist suffered vs. Clemson (10/3). So far this season, the Terps have lost 18 man-games to potential starters (**Jamari McCollough** - 2; **Carroll** - 4; **Scott** - 1; **Baltz** - 2; **Campbell** - 3; **Tyler Bowen** - 4; **Tony Logan** - 2). In additions, potential key reserves **Joe Vellano** and **Caleb Porzel** have been on the shelf. Vellano has yet to play and Porzel was on the field for the first time Saturday.

PUNT, KICK AND KICKOFF...

After All-ACC punter **Travis Baltz** left the Rutgers game (9/26) with a sprained ankle, freshman **Nick Ferrara** handled kickoff, place-kicking and punting duties. He hit two field goals (38, 34 yards) and averaged 33.7 yards on three punts, putting one inside the 20-yard line. Ferrara has been handling place-kicking and kickoff duties since the beginning of the season, but punted in high school and served as the backup during the first two games of the season. In the Rutgers game, he became the first Terp since Vedad Siljkovic (vs. West Virginia, 09/16/00) to punt and attempt a field goal in the same game. Ferrara handled all three jobs vs. Clemson (10/3) and distinguished himself quite well. He had a then career-long 43-yard field goal and punted eight times for a 43.2-yard average. His first punt went 61 yards which was the longest by a Terp since Baltz nailed a 65-yarder vs. Georgia Tech in 2007. Ferrara also landed three punts inside the 20-yard line. He added a career best 50-yard field goal vs. Wake Forest (10/10), the longest since Nick Novak hit a 54-yarder vs. Duke on 10-11-03.

ALL-PURPOSE PERFORMER...

After setting the ACC record for kickoff return yardage in a season (1,089) last year, **Torrey Smith** has emerged as one of the most explosive playmakers in the country. Smith is averaging 236.7 all-purpose yards per game, which ranks first in the nation (FBS).

- Smith's explosive ability as a kick returner helped make him a consensus preseason All-ACC selection. Smith has proved the voters right all season, returning a kick 81 yards for a TD in the first quarter against James Madison (9/12), the second kick return for a TD in his career (12/30/08 vs. Nevada), and totaled 127 yards on kick returns for the evening. With his first kick return against Rutgers (9/26), Smith set the all-time career kickoff return yards mark, and now has a total of 1,732. Against Wake Forest (10/10), Smith returned his first kick of the game 85 yards to the Wake 15 yard line, and totaled 194 kickoff return yards in the game. Smith now has 1,926 kickoff return yards in his career, which ranks eighth all-time in ACC history.

- Smith is the Terps' leading receiver with 31 receptions for 519 yards and four touchdowns on the season. Against MTSU (9/19), he had a career-high 165 yards receiving on five receptions, including a 64-yard TD catch. He has also rushed the ball six times for 54 yards. He made a career-high 10 receptions against Wake Forest, totaling 70 yards and catching one touchdown pass. Smith ranks second in the ACC and 32nd nationally in receiving yards per game (86.5) and third in the league and 56th nationally in receptions per game (5.17).

- Against MTSU, Smith set a career-high with 287 all-purpose yards (165 receiving, 109 KOR, 13 rushing).

He also totaled 267 all-purpose yards against Wake Forest (194 KOR, 70 receiving, 3 rushing), and is the only player in the NCAA (FBS) to total at least 225 all-purpose yards in five games this season.

TERPS GET AWARD RECOGNITION...

- The Terps secured their first ACC Player of the Week Awards of the 2009 season on Monday, Oct. 5. PK **Nick Ferrara** was voted as the league's co-specialist of the week, while **Demetrius Hartsfield** was tabbed the week's top freshman. Ferrara shared the award with Virginia place-kicker Robert Randolph. Ferrara had a 43-yard field goal and averaged 43.2 yards on eight punts vs Clemson (10/3). Hartsfield had a career-high 10 tackles and a key sack and forced fumble on Clemson's final offensive play.

- Hartsfield, a native of Raleigh, N.C., was also one of four players nominated for the AT&T All-America Player of the Week award. Hartsfield, UTEP RB Donald Buckram, Toledo QB Aaron Opelt and Notre Dame WR Golden Tate were selected by a panel of analysts from ESPN as the week's top candidates. Tate won the award. In addition, Hartsfield received a helmet sticker on ESPN's College Football Final.

VIRGINIA AT-A-GLANCE...

- Since taking over as the starting QB against Texas Christian, Jameel Sewell has led Virginia to a 2-2 record, with wins over North Carolina and Indiana.

- Sewell completed 20 of 30 passes for 308 yards, along with one passing touchdown and one rushing score in Virginia's 47-7 win over Indiana last week.

- Mikell Simpson is Virginia's most dangerous offensive threat. The RB had 83 rushing yards and four TD's, as well as four catches for 66 yards against Indiana. In the past two games, he has 183 rushing yards and five TDs, as well as eight catches for 111 yards. He had a career game against the Terps two years ago, rushing 16 times for 119 yards and catching 13 passes for 152 yards.

- Vic Hall, who served as a cornerback for his first three seasons, started the season as the Cavaliers starting QB before switching to wide receiver. He led Virginia with six receptions for 85 yards and one touchdown against Indiana.

- Cornerback Ras-I Dowling, a preseason All-ACC first team selection, led the Cavaliers with nine tackles against Indiana, also recording an interception and forcing a fumble. He ranks third on the team with 27 tackles.

- After surrendering 83 points in the first three games, Virginia's defense has allowed just 10 points in the last two games

- Linebacker Steve Greer has a team-high 37 stops, and his 7.5 tackles-per-game average ranks sixth in the ACC. He also has 5.0 tackles-for-loss on the year.

9...Number of 2008 postseason participants the Terps will face in the fall. Cal, James Madison, Rutgers, Clemson, Wake Forest, NC State, Virginia Tech, Florida State and BC all played in the postseason.

10.5...**Alex Wujciak** is averaging 10.5 tackles per game, which ranks first in the ACC and tied for 15th in the NCAA (FBS).

14...Number of seniors on this year's squad. Last season Maryland had 30 seniors, which was the most during the **Ralph Friedgen** era.

14...The Terps have placed a league-best 14 representatives on the Academic All-ACC team over the last two years. Clemson ranks second with 10, while Boston College, Duke and Georgia Tech have eight apiece.

26...The Terps' offensive line entered the season with a combined 26 career starts (**Phil Costa** - 18; **Bruce Campbell** - 8).

28...The Terps currently have 28 former players on NFL rosters, including eight from last season's team (see chart on pg. 18).

58...Fifty-eight of Maryland's 85 scholarship players have at least three years of eligibility remaining.

86.5...**Torrey Smith** is averaging 86.5 receiving yards per game, which ranks second in the ACC.

110...Four of Maryland's offensive linemen who departed (**Edwin Williams**, **Jaimie Thomas**, **Scott Burley** and **Dane Randolph**) combined to start 110 games in their careers.

117...The Terps have not had a punt blocked since Nov. 13, 1999 (Florida State), a stretch of 117 games, which is the longest active streak in the nation.

1,926...**Torrey Smith** has 1,926 kickoff return yards in his career, which ranks eighth all-time in ACC history.

MARYLAND-VIRGINIA SERIES HISTORY...

• Saturday's game will mark the 74th meeting between the Terrapins and Cavaliers, the most between Maryland and any other school in the Terps' 116-year football history. The schools have met every season since 1957.

• Maryland leads the all-time series, which began in 1919, by a 41-30-2 margin.

• Maryland is 20-11-2 all-time against Virginia in College Park, including three of the last four meetings.

• Virginia has won the last two meetings, defeating the Terps 31-0 last season and edging them 18-17 on a last-minute touchdown in 2007.

• Three years ago Maryland won 28-26 in Charlottesville, outscoring the Wahoos 21-7 in the final quarter to complete its comeback win. Keon Lattimore rushed 15 times for 114 yards and gave Maryland its go-ahead score with a 56-yard run in the fourth quarter. Erin Henderson intercepted a pass three plays later and ran 45 yards down the field for what would be the winning touchdown.

• From 1969 through 2000, play between the two schools had been basically feast or famine for one team. From 1969-87, the Terrapins held an 18-1 advantage in the series and at one point ran off 16 wins in a row, the longest streak in the series. Then from 1988 to 2000, the series swung almost exclusively to the Cavs as they were 11-2 in that span. Maryland has won four of the last seven.

• Maryland's win in 2001, **Ralph Friedgen's** first season, broke a string of nine-straight losses to Virginia. In their 41-21 win – a victory that moved the team to 5-0 on the season in what was then its best start in 23 years – the Terps allowed a 24-7 lead to be cut to three in the third quarter before scoring 17 unanswered points in the fourth to win going away.

HARTSFIELD'S HEROICS...

Demetrius Hartsfield provided the most important play of the game in Maryland's 24-21 win over Clemson (10/3). With the Tigers inside Maryland's 30-yard line and under 1:00 to play, the redshirt freshman sacked QB Kyle Parker, forcing a fumble that Hartsfield recovered to preserve the victory. Hartsfield tallied a career-high 10 tackles on the day, including eight solo stops and 2.5 tackles-for-loss.

• The redshirt freshman recorded key stops on each of Clemson's last three possessions, each time when the Tigers were within field-goal range. On third-and-12 from Maryland's 31, Hartsfield stopped C.J. Spiller for a 1-yard gain, and kicker Richard Jackson missed a potential game-tying 47-yard field goal on the next play. On the Tigers' next drive, Hartsfield again stopped Spiller for a 1-yard gain, this time on first down, and after two incomplete passes by Parker, Jackson missed a 48-yard field goal try.

• Hartsfield ranks tied for second on the team and tied for 10th in the ACC in tackles per game (6.7), and is second on the team in tackles-for-loss with 4.5.

TRUE FRESHMEN SEEING TIME...

Eight true freshmen have already seen time for the Terps with a number of others on the cusp of hitting the field. LB **Darin Drakeford**, PK **Nick Ferrara**, OL **Bennett Fulper** and DL **Zachariah Kerr** all played vs. California (9/5). There were also 10 redshirt freshmen getting on the field for the first time in that game with WR **Kerry Boykins**, RB **Gary Douglas**, WR **Kevin Dorsey**, DL **Masengo Kabongo**, LB **Demetrius Hartsfield**, OL **Justin Gilbert**, OL **R.J. Dill**, OL **Justin Lewis**, DL **A.J. Francis** and DL **Carl Russell** seeing snaps vs. Cal. True freshman DL **Isaiah Ross** made his first appearance vs. James Madison (9/12) and true freshman linebacker **Avery Murray** saw time on special teams vs. Middle Tennessee State (9/19). LB **Ryan Donohue** had the redshirt pulled off vs. Clemson (10/3) and has played on the kickoff coverage team. RB **Caleb Porzel** saw his first career action vs. Wake Forest (10/10). In addition, true freshmen RB **D.J. Adams**, DB **Eric Franklin**, DL **Justin Anderson** and OL **Nick Klemm** have worked their way up the depth chart. Maryland has not played as many as eight true freshmen since the 2004 season. Eight true freshmen played in both 2002 and 2004, the most under **Ralph Friedgen**.

COOL UNDER CENTER...

Senior **Chris Turner** has been the Terps starter the last two seasons, though he made his first season-opening start vs. Cal (9/5). Turner has made the most of his opportunities the last two years, leading the Terps to a pair of bowl appearances and six wins in eight appearances (5-2 as starter) vs. ranked teams (AP poll). He also directed three fourth-quarter game-winning drives last season and one in overtime during a 38-35 win over James Madison (9/12). Turner seems to have even taken a step further this year as head coach **Ralph Friedgen** praised him throughout preseason camp for not only his improved play, but also his leadership. His teammates agreed as he is one of four elected team captains.

• Turner has started under center for wins over No. 20 Clemson, No. 23 Cal, No. 21 Wake Forest and No. 17 North Carolina in 2008, and No. 8 Boston College in 2007. He also played an integral role in another such game (win over No. 10 Rutgers in 2007) during Maryland's winning streak against ranked foes which was snapped at six with last season's loss to Boston College.

• Turner has been on target vs. ranked foes. In eight games vs. the Top 25, Turner has completed 160 of 255 passes (62.7 percent) for 1,803 yards with nine TDs and two interceptions.

PLENTY OF SKILL ON OFFENSE...

Despite losing a first-round NFL draft choice in Darrius Heyward-Bey and returning just six starters on offense, Maryland has plenty of skilled players back:

- Junior RB **Da'Rel Scott** was a 2008 first-team All-ACC performer and MVP of the Humanitarian Bowl. He capped his sophomore campaign by rushing for a Maryland bowl-record 174 yards (all in the second half) on 14 carries (12.4 ypc) vs. Nevada. With that performance, Scott became the seventh player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season and the first since Chris Downs in 2002. Scott finished the season with 1,133 rushing yards - the seventh-highest single-season total all-time at Maryland - and a team-best eight TDs. Scott has a team-high 297 rushing yards, but broke his wrist against Clemson (10/3) and is out of action until late in the season. He is seventh in the ACC in rushing (59.4 ypg).

- Sophomore **Torrey Smith** emerged as a receiving threat midway through last season and has a chance to be one of the best in the league by season's end. Over the last 10 games of his career, Smith has posted 47 receptions for 734 yards (15.6 ypc) with four touchdowns. In his first eight games, he registered just eight catches for 101 yards. He ranks second in the ACC in receiving yards (86.5 ypg).

- Junior **Adrian Cannon** is also a receiving threat. He demonstrated his explosiveness in last year's bowl game, scoring on a 59-yard strike from **Chris Turner** on the third play of the game. Cannon ranks second on the team in receptions (23), including a 27-yard TD reception which helped send the JMU game to overtime. He had the first multiple-TD game of his career against Wake Forest (10/10), catching scoring passes of 4 and 15 yards.

- Sophomore **Ronnie Tyler** made a number of acrobatic catches last season and had a solid bowl game posting five receptions, including a TD. Tyler has made plays early in the season, catching 17 passes for 221 yards, including a number of clutch receptions. His 4-yard TD reception vs. Clemson (10/3) gave the Terps a 17-13 lead. He showed off his long-play ability against Wake Forest, making a 49-yard reception. Redshirt freshman **Kerry Boykins**, junior **LaQuan Williams** and sophomore **Quintin McCree** have also seen time at wideout. Williams had his first career TD reception vs. Rutgers (9/26).

FIRST-TIME STARTERS...

- Eight Terps made their first career starts in the season opener against California (9/5). **Lamar Young**, **Andrew Gonnella**, and **Paul Pinegar** all got their first starts on the offensive line, while **Tommy Galt** and **Matt Furstenburg** started as dual tight ends. **A.J. Francis** and **Deege Galt** started on the D-line, while **Demetrius Hartsfield** started at linebacker.

- True freshman **Bennett Fulper** made his first career start against James Madison. Fulper, who started at left guard, is one of just two freshmen to start on

the offensive line in the last four seasons. **Bruce Campbell** started one game in 2007 (vs. Clemson, 10/27). Prior to that, the last true freshman to start on the o-line was Jared Gaither in 2005 (vs. NC State, 11/26).

- Redshirt freshman **R.J. Dill** had his first career start at right tackle vs. James Madison (9/12).

- Sophomore cornerback **Cameron Chism** made his first career start vs. Middle Tennessee State (9/19) and **Maurice Hampton** started for the first time (left guard) vs. Rutgers (9/26).

YOUTH ON THE O-LINE...

After losing five of his top seven performers from a year ago, offensive line coach **Tom Brattan** had a busy off-season. Gone are three-year starting center **Edwin Williams**, two-year starting left guard **Jaimie Thomas** and two-year starting tackle **Scott Burley**. **Jack Griffin** and **Dane Randolph** also completed their eligibility. In all, those five players combined to start 115 games. LT **Bruce Campbell** and C **Phil Costa** return as starters. Campbell started the last six games at left tackle last season, while Costa has played at left and right guard in his career. Costa has taken over as the starting center this year and is the leader of this group. The other three spots were up for grabs entering the preseason. **Lamar Young** and **Andrew Gonnella** assumed the No. 1 spots at left and right guard, respectively, for the season opener, with junior **Paul Pinegar** sliding into the right tackle role. However, a number of other linemen played vs. Cal (9/5). **R.J. Dill** saw time at right tackle, while true freshman **Bennett Fulper**, redshirt freshman **Justin Lewis** and sophomore **Maurice Hampton** played at the two guard spots. The Terps started two freshmen vs. James Madison (9/12) with Fulper starting at left guard and Dill at right tackle, and Pinegar shifting to left tackle due to an injury to Campbell. In all, eight offensive linemen saw action vs. JMU. Sophomore **Tyler Bowen** saw his first-career action, getting on the field for 13 plays vs. JMU.

MIGHTY MEGGETT...

RB **Davin Meggett** was a pleasant surprise last season and has seen extended time at tailback this season. The product of Clinton, Md., rushed for 457 yards in 2008, the most by a Maryland true freshman since Lamont Jordan posted 689 in 1997. In addition, his four rushing touchdowns were the most by a true freshman since Josh Allen scored eight in 2002. Last year, Meggett secured the No. 2 tailback role in the preseason when **Morgan Green** was hampered with an injury. He and **Da'Rel Scott** provide a good 1-2 punch, and against MTSU (9/19) rushed a team-high 18 times for 51 yards and one TD. Meggett also showed the ability to catch the ball out of the backfield, making a career and game-high six receptions for 63 yards. Meggett is likely to see more snaps with Scott out of action.

MISC. OFFENSIVE NOTES...

• The Terps have been one of the better teams in the ACC in the red zone. They were a perfect 4-for-4 (all TDs) vs. Wake Forest and rank third in the ACC in that category (92.9 percent).

• The Terps matched a season-best with five offensive plays of 20 or more yards vs. Wake Forest (10/10). Four Terps also made the longest receptions of their careers: **Gary Douglas** (50), **Ronnie Tyler** (49), **Kerry Boykins** (24) and **Tommy Galt** (21).

• WR **LaQuan Williams** recorded his first career touchdown when he caught a 24-yard TD pass from **Chris Turner** in the second quarter against Rutgers (9/26).

• A season-high 10 Terps caught passes vs. Rutgers, led by **Adrian Cannon's** career-high tying five catches. TE **Matt Furstenburg** and **Douglas** also made their first career receptions.

• RB **Davin Meggett** ranks fifth on the team with 10 receptions, one more than he had last season.

• Prior to the game against MTSU (9/19), the Terps longest passing play of the season was a 29-yarder from **Chris Turner** to **Torrey Smith** in the season opener at California (9/5). Against the Blue Raiders, Turner found Smith on plays of 64, 42 and 37 yards, marking the three longest passing plays of the season to that point. Turner and Smith also hooked up for 45 yards vs. Rutgers (9/26). Smith has accounted for nine of the team's 22 plays of 20 yards or more.

• Of the 20 receptions WR **Ronnie Tyler** posted last season, 11 came on third down. Against James Madison, Tyler had three catches, one of which was on third down. His most crucial reception, however, came on fourth-and-4 with under 6:00 left in the game and the Terps down by seven. Turner found Tyler for a 20-yard gain and the first down, and Maryland scored on the next play to tie the game and send it to overtime. He also tied a career-high with five receptions, including a 4-yard TD catch, vs. Clemson (10/3). Tyler ranks third on the team with 17 receptions.

• Sophomore WR **Quentin McCree** posted his first career reception in the second quarter of the James Madison game (9/12). He went to haul in four Turner passes for 18 yards.

• TE **Tommy Galt** (three for 29 yards) and Cannon (five for 30 yards) each posted a career high in receptions vs. Cal (9/5). Cannon matched that with five catches vs. James Madison (9/12) and Galt had three catches vs. Clemson (10/3).

• **Cory Jackson** has appeared in 44 career games, most on the team.

REVAMPED SECONDARY...

The Maryland secondary looked to be the strength of the defense entering the season, though recent injuries have taken a toll. The Terps lost starters Kevin Barnes and Jeff Allen from the 2008 squad, but they

returned six players, including four seniors, who saw plenty of action last season. CB **Anthony Wiseman** and FS **Terrell Skinner** were returning starters, but **Nolan Carroll**, **Kenny Tate**, **Jamari McCollough** and **Antwine Perez** each played a number of snaps in 2008. Carroll, Skinner and Wiseman combined to play in 96 career games entering 2009, while McCollough, Perez and Tate played in all 13 games last season. However, Carroll was lost for the season (broken tibia) in the James Madison game (9/12) and McCollough missed the JMU and MTSU (9/19) games, and was on the field only briefly against Rutgers (9/26). McCollough returned as a starter against Clemson (10/3) and made his first pick of the season. Tate was one of the standouts of preseason camp. With a healthy McCollough back for the Clemson game, Tate was able to blitz several times, and recorded his first solo sack of the season, taking down QB Kyle Parker for a loss of 13 yards. **Cameron Chism** made his first career start against Middle Tennessee State (9/19) and came up big, making two interceptions and finishing the game with a team-high 12 tackles. **Trenton Hughes** and **Richard Taylor** are the top backups at cornerback. Hughes played sparingly last season, but was in on a career-high 31 plays vs. MTSU. Taylor is a sixth-year senior who has 29 games of playing experience. He gained a year of eligibility after suffering through two injury-plagued seasons and has played on special teams this season.

YOUTH SERVED AT LINEBACKER...

With the loss of Dave Phillistin, Moise Fokou, Chase Bullock and Rick Costa, the Terps will have to replace a ton of experience at linebacker. That group combined to play in 144 games, including 54 starts. During spring practice, the Terps had just one linebacker - **Adrian Moten** - who has played in a game at that position. With **Alex Wujciak** and **Ben Pooler** missing the spring, the LB two-deep featured three freshmen (**Demetrius Hartsfield**, **Darin Drakeford** and **Avery Murray**), junior **Drew Gloster**, who moved from tight end, and special teams performer **Hakeem Sule**. Moten has played in 26 career games, most among the linebacking corps. Despite the youth, the linebackers may prove to be a strength of the defense. Drakeford and Murray are true freshmen who arrived in January and have found their way into the two-deep. Gloster looks like a capable backup for Wujciak, and Pooler has seen action behind Hartsfield, who was one of most impressive defenders in the preseason. Wujciak, Moten and Hartsfield ranked 1-2-3 on the team in tackles.

CHISM STEPS IN FOR CARROLL...

Cameron Chism made the most of his first career start. Chism, who opened the game at cornerback vs. Middle Tennessee St. (9/19), in place of the injured **Nolan Carroll**, made his presence felt. The sophomore posted a career-high 12 tackles, and made his first career interception in the first half. The pick was also Maryland's first of the season. Then, with 4:52 remaining in the game and Maryland clinging to a 31-29 lead, Chism stepped in front of another Dasher pass for his second pick of the game. He was the first cornerback to register double-digit stops since Kevin Barnes (10 vs. Georgia Tech, Oct. 6, 2007) and it was the most tackles recorded by a CB since Josh Wilson also tallied 12 vs. Virginia on Oct. 1, 2005. Chism has posted 10 tackles over the last two games and ranks fourth on the team (26) in stops.

MISC DEFENSIVE NOTES...

- **Alex Wujciak** and **Adrian Moten** have been the leading producers of the defense. Wujciak is averaging 10.5 tackles per game, which ranks first in the ACC and tied for 15th in the nation, while Moten's 5.5 tackles-for-loss leads the team. Wujciak has posted double-digit stops in 11 of his last 15 games, including a career-high 17 against Rutgers (9/26).
- **Richard Taylor** got in on the first TFL of his career against Wake Forest (10/10), combining with Moten to stop Brandon Pendergrass six yards behind the line. Taylor had a career-high 23 snaps at cornerback in the game.
- Sophomore LB **Ben Pooler** posted the first sack of his career against Wake Forest (10/10), dropping QB Riley Skinner for a 4-yard loss in the second quarter.

• The defense also came up with its first takeaways of the year against MTSU, as **Travis Ivey** recovered a fumble and **Cameron Chism** intercepted two passes. The Terps also forced three turnovers vs. Clemson (10/3) and were plus 1 on the day in that category after entering the game -10 in turnover margin on the season.

• Against Rutgers, Maryland allowed just 249 yards of total offense, the lowest since the Terps shutout Wake Forest 26-0 on 10/18/08 and allowed 219 yards. The Terps also kept Clemson in check, holding the Tigers 274 yards of total offense. Those were the best back-to-back defensive efforts since surrendering 187 yards to Villanova (09/01/07) and 161 to Florida International (09/08/07).

• Against MTSU (9/19), the defense totaled 10.0 tackles-for-loss (51 yards) and 4.0 sacks (45 yards), both season highs. After posting just two sacks in the first two games, the Terps have come up with 13 in the last four contests and rank tied for second in the ACC in that category (2.5 pg).

• Sophomore **Kenny Tate** earned his first career start vs. James Madison (9/12), opening the game at strong safety for an injured **Jamari McCollough**. Tate logged career highs in tackles (7) and solo stops (4) in the game.

• FS **Antwine Perez** registered a career-high eight tackles, including a career-best seven solo stops, vs. Cal (9/5). CB **Anthony Wiseman** had a career-best three pass breakups vs. the Golden Bears.

KICKING GAME...

With the departure of two-year starter Obi Egekeze, the place-kicking job was fairly wide open entering the preseason. True freshman **Nick Ferrara** edged out redshirt freshman **Mike Barbour** to win the starting place-kicking duties days before the season opener against California. Ferrara, who also handles kickoff duties, went 2-for-2 in his debut, hitting from 26 and 42 yards. Against James Madison, Ferrara stood tall in a pressure-packed moment, hitting the game-winning field goal in OT. Ferrara was put in simulated pressure situations throughout fall camp, and that experience was likely a factor in his calmness when stepping on the field to attempt his first game-winning kick. The two kickers went back and forth during the preseason, with Barbour nearly locking up the job early in the second scrimmage before missing his final three attempts in a 4-for-7 day. Ferrara followed that up by hitting all three attempts (45, 48, 48) in the final scrimmage of the preseason. However, Barbour came back and nailed both of his attempts. In fact, they were his two longest field goals of the preseason, both coming from 46 yards out. Barbour was good on 13 of his 20 attempts in the preseason, while Ferrara went 6-for-6. Barbour and Ferrara both hail from St. Anthony's High School in New York.

BOOMING BALTZ...

As a sophomore last season, **Travis Baltz** averaged 41.1 yards per punt, which ranked first in the ACC and 43rd nationally (FBS). His hang time helped the Terps rank sixth in the country in punt return yardage defense (4.5. ypr). Baltz was one of just nine players named to the watch list for the 2009 Ray Guy Award, which honors the nation's top punter. He was a consensus preseason all-conference choice and a second-team preseason All-America choice.

- Baltz earned first-team All-ACC honors for the 2008 season, marking the seventh time in the last eight seasons a Maryland punter has garnered all-conference honors.
- Baltz averaged just 35.5 yards on six punts in the season opener, but his hang time did not allow Syd'Quan Thompson, one of the top returners in country last season, to return a punt.
- Facing another dangerous returner in James Madison's preseason All-American (FCS) Scotty McGee, Baltz punted seven times for an average of 42.1 yards per punt. More importantly, he allowed McGee only two returns for a total of 18 yards. Of his seven kicks, two were fair caught, two were downed, and one went into the end zone for a touchback. Additionally, two of his punts were inside the 20-yard line.
- Baltz suffered a sprained ankle against Rutgers (9/26), causing him to miss the Clemson (10/3) and Wake Forest (10/10) games.

MISC. SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES...

- **Tony Logan** had a career-long 43-yard punt return vs. Clemson (10/3) which set up a 1-yard TD run by **Davin Meggett**, extending Maryland's lead to 24-13 in the third quarter. It was the longest punt return by a Terp since Danny Oquendo had a 45-yarder vs. Florida State (10/28/06). Maryland nearly had its first return for a score in six years (76 by Steve Suter vs. West Virginia, 01-01-04).
- In the season opener vs. Cal (9/5), **Nick Ferrara** became the first Maryland freshman since Nick Novak (20-yarder vs. Florida, 1/2/02) to hit a field goal. Ferrara was also the first true freshman since Brian Kopka (39-yard FG at Georgia Tech, 11/22/97) to nail a field-goal attempt. Ferrara's career-long 50-yard field goal against Wake Forest (10/10) was the longest by a Terp since Nick Novak hit a 54-yarder against Duke on 10-11-03.
- Maryland has blocked a kick twice this season. DL **Deege Galt** blocked a field goal against James Madison (9/12) and **A.J. Francis** blocked a PAT vs. Middle Tennessee State (9/19).
- **Kevin Dorsey** has a team-best seven special teams tackles.

FIRST-TIME PERFORMERS...

The Terps entered the season with 26 members (12 offense/10 defense/4 special teams) of the depth chart having yet to see game action. There were also eight other players (OL **Lamar Young**, **Danny Edwards**, **Andrew Gonnella**, QB **Jamarr Robinson**, TE **Matt Furstenburg**, LB **Ben Pooler**, DB **Trenton Hughes**, WR/PR **Tony Logan**), who had played just a handful of snaps entering 2009. In addition, **Drew Gloster** is playing linebacker for the first time in his career after moving over from tight end where he had limited snaps. AYE AYE CAPTAIN...

The Terps voted four captains just prior to the 2009 season. QB **Chris Turner** and OL **Phil Costa** represent the offense, while CB **Nolan Carroll** and LB **Adrian Moten** are the defensive captains. Friedgen mentioned the possibility of naming captains over the summer to the team's leadership council, which includes those four players plus **Cory Jackson**, **Alex Wujciak**, **Da'Rel Scott**, **Torrey Smith**, **Davin Meggett** and **Kevin Dorsey**. "I felt like we had a lot of quality kids to pick from," Friedgen said. "I think they made a good choice." This is the first time the ninth-year head coach had the team elect season-long captains. "I just felt with this team we had some real strong leaders.

EARLY ENROLLEES...

- The Terps welcomed five scholarship newcomers to the roster this spring. Joining the team were DL **De'Onte Arnett**, DL **Zachariah Kerr**, DL **Cody Blue**, LB **Darin Drakeford** and LB **Avery Murray**. Arnett, Drakeford and Murray were members of the 2009 recruiting class who enrolled in January. Blue and Kerr signed last season, but attended prep school last fall. Drakeford and Murray received extended time in the spring due to injuries and impressed the defensive staff.

- Kerr and Drakeford played in the season opener vs. Cal (9/5), while Murray has played on special teams since the second game of the season. Kerr has played his way into a backup role at nose tackle, where he is behind **A.J. Francis**. Drakeford backs up junior **Adrian Moten** at the "Sam" linebacker position, while Murray is the third option at a talented "Mike" linebacker position behind **Alex Wujciak** and **Drew Gloster**.

FRANKLIN TO SUCCEED FRIEDGEN...

Assistant head coach/offensive coordinator **James Franklin** was named the eventual successor to head coach **Ralph Friedgen** in February. Franklin, 37, has spent the better part of this decade on the Maryland staff. He served as the wide receivers coach from 2000 to 2004, which spanned Friedgen's first four seasons. During that time, Franklin established himself as one of the nation's top recruiters. Rivals.com ranked Franklin as one of the nation's top 25 recruiters for two of those first four years and tapped him again this past season.

TOUGH SLATE IN '09...

Maryland's schedule is once again among the toughest in the nation, ranking 14th in the country. The Terrapins' 12 opponents posted a combined record of 92-64 (.590) last season. The Terps will face eight teams (California, Rutgers, Clemson, Wake Forest, NC State, Virginia Tech, Florida State and Boston

College) in 2009 which played in bowl games last season and another (James Madison) which reached the semifinals of the FCS playoffs. Seven of those teams were either ranked or received votes in the preseason Associated Press poll.

BROWN, BANKINS NEWEST MEMBERS OF TERPS STAFF...

The Terps have two new coaches on staff this season. Joining the team after the 2008 season were defensive coordinator **Don Brown** and special teams/tight ends coach **Charles Bankins**. Brown, who replaced **Chris Cosh** and oversees the cornerbacks, spent the last five seasons as head coach at the University of Massachusetts Amherst, leading the Minutemen to the 2006 NCAA FCS championship game. During his tenure, UMass maintained one of the top defensive units in the nation. The Minutemen finished among the top 20 in total defense in three of his five seasons (third in 2005; 20th in 2006; 14th in 2007). They were also first nationally in scoring defense in 2005 and fifth in 2006. Bankins, who joined the staff in February, has experience coaching offense and special teams at the collegiate and professional levels, most recently serving as an assistant at the University of Richmond, which captured the 2008 Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) title. During Bankins' two-year stint as Richmond's running backs coach, the Spiders had one of the most prolific rushing attacks in the country. Last season, the Spiders had the 24th-ranked offense in the nation. In 2007, the Richmond rushing attack ranked No. 12 nationally (234.6 yards per game). Bankins also oversaw Richmond's special teams in 2008 when the Spiders ranked 27th nationally in punt returns (12.0 yards per return) and 22nd in kickoff coverage (18.0 ypr).

SUITES DEBUT IN HOME OPENER...

The newly-expanded Tyser Tower officially opened on Saturday, Sept. 5 when the Terrapins played host to James Madison. The upgraded facility, which cost \$50.8 million, includes 64 suites, mezzanine seating for over 400, new areas for working media and new booths for radio and television. Construction began in phases following the end of the 2007 season with the goal of opening prior to the 2009 season. The facility, which has tripled in size, also includes a new work area for coaches and game-day staff, a new merchandise outlet, enhanced seating for disabled customers and a new \$1.2 million state-of-the-art video scoreboard, which was installed in time for the 2008 season.

TERRAPIN SPORTS RADIO NETWORK

All of Maryland's games are broadcast live on the Terrapin Sports Radio Network, which boasts one of the strongest coverage areas in college sports. Terrapin Sports Marketing, a division of CBS Collegiate Sports Properties, manages the Terrapin Sports Radio Network. In its seventh year as the multi-media marketing rights partner for University of Maryland Athletics, Terrapin Sports Marketing has built a stronger network that provides coverage in Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, and Washington D.C.

WJZ 105.7 FM and WJZ 1300 AM in Baltimore serve as network's flagship stations, with 11 more affiliates in the region picking up the games.

TERPS OWN NATION'S LONGEST STREAK...

- During the last nine seasons, Maryland has had three full-time punters (**Brooks Barnard**, **Adam Podlesh**, and **Travis Baltz**), three long snappers (**Jon Condo**, **Andrew Schmitt** and **Tim Downs**) and zero blocked punts. In fact, since the Wake Forest game in 1999 (Oct. 9), only four players (**Barnard**, **Podlesh**, **Baltz**, **Nick Ferrara**) have started at punter. **Downs** made his debut against Cal (9/5), replacing **Schmitt**, a four-year starter at the position. However, with **Baltz** shelved with an injury, **Ferrara** has taken over punting duties. **Ted Townsley** also had one punt in the game against Rutgers (9/26).

- The Terrapins' streak without a blocked punt goes back 117 games, the longest streak in college football. The team hopes to keep that streak intact under new special teams coordinator **Charles Bankins**.

- The Terps have not had a punt blocked since Nov. 13, 1999 (Florida State). That amount of time became the longest in NCAA football when Georgia had a punt blocked by Ole Miss in 2006, snapping a streak which began earlier in the 1999 season.

PROTECTING THE HOUSE...

- The Terrapins are 41-14 at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium under **Ralph Friedgen**, including 6-1 last season.
- The Terps finished the 2003 season with a perfect 6-0 record at home, marking the second time in three years that the team had finished its home slate unblemished.
- In 116-plus seasons of football, Maryland has finished undefeated at home 19 times. Just eight of those occasions, however, have occurred since 1950 (when Byrd Stadium opened), including just three (1976, 2001 and '03) since 1975.
- The Terrapins' 6-0 mark in 2003 tied for the second-best record at home in school history. The 1976 team was also 6-0, only to be trumped by the 2001 team which won all seven home games.

MORE ON CAPITAL ONE FIELD AT BYRD STADIUM...

- Now in its 60th year of operation, Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium (which had its name changed for the 2009 season) continues to serve as the home of the Terps. Opened on Sept. 30, 1950, and constructed for a sum of \$1 million, Byrd was named after Dr. H.C. "Curley" Byrd, a multi-sport star at Maryland who later became the school's head football coach and, ultimately, its president.
- The Terrapins are 197-113-1 within the friendly confines of Byrd. With the Tyser Tower expansion and temporary bleachers, Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium can hold up to 54,000 (up from 51,500).
- Three of the top eight crowds in Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium history occurred in 2007. Maryland welcomed 52,782 fans to Byrd for the 2007 Homecoming game vs. Virginia (Oct. 20). The crowd was the eighth-largest ever at Byrd Stadium. The announced crowd of 52,827 for the game against BC (Nov. 10) marked the seventh-highest in stadium history. The Terps also had a crowd of 51,620 for last season's Florida State game (Nov. 22) and have a sellout for this season's Virginia Tech contest.
- Maryland's six-game 2007 home attendance totaled 307,580. Maryland averaged 51,263 fans per game that season, the third-highest amount in school history. The Terps have now averaged over 50,000 fans at home in four of the past six seasons.

TERPS AND THE NFL DRAFT...

- Maryland had five players selected in the 2009 NFL Draft (WR Darrius Heyward-Bey, CB Kevin Barnes, LB Moise Fokou, OL Jaimie Thomas, and TE Dan Gronkowski), which was the most since 2004 when the Terps also had five players chosen. The five selections were also the most for an ACC school in 2009.
- The Terps have had 18 players drafted in the last

six seasons and at least two picks in the top three rounds in six of the last nine drafts.

- The Terrapins have had 15 players chosen in the first round of the NFL Draft, including two Top-10 picks in the last four years. Darrius Heyward-Bey was taken seventh overall in 2009 (Oakland Raiders) and Vernon Davis was selected sixth in 2006 (San Francisco 49ers).
- The Terps have had 22 players drafted during **Ralph Friedgen's** tenure as head coach. There have also been 51 players either drafted or signed as free agents over the last six seasons.

TERP ALLEY...

- In an effort to restore some tradition on gameday in College Park, head coach **Ralph Friedgen** created Terp Alley in 2001, a tradition that has become a part of the game-day experience outside Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium.
- For every football home game, the entire football team makes its first appearance of the day at "Terp Alley." The team is dropped off at the circle at the top of Field House Drive (between the football press box and Ludwig Field) approximately two hours before kickoff and is led past fans gathered along the street to the football complex by the Maryland band and cheerleaders.

FRIEDGEN AND THE TERPS ON THE AIR...

Maryland's football broadcasting lineup for 2009-10 includes the Ralph Friedgen Radio Show and the Ralph Friedgen Television Show. The Ralph Friedgen Radio Show airs from 8-9 p.m. each Wednesday during the season on the Terrapin Sports Radio Network (see adjoining chart for affiliates) which has 13 affiliates this season. The Ralph Friedgen Television Show, which is presented by Outback Steakhouse, airs weekly at 11:30 a.m. Saturday on Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic with the first show airing this weekend. The fast-paced, 30-minute show goes behind the scenes with Friedgen and the Maryland football team. Replays of the show are scheduled for 7 p.m. Sunday on Comcast SportsNet, just prior to the rebroadcast of the Terps most recent football game. Comcast SportsNet will carry the official rebroadcasts of all 12 University of Maryland football matchups. Friedgen also appears each Wednesday during the season on Comcast's SportsNite wrap-up show. Comcast goes live "Inside the Coach's Office" with Friedgen at 6:45 p.m. each Wednesday.

TERRAPINS RISING AIRED FOR THIRD YEAR...

The third season of 'Terrapins Rising' aired this summer and concluded Tuesday, Sept 1. The eight-episode reality series, which chronicled the Maryland football program, debuted on Tuesday, July 14 on Comcast SportsNet Mid-Atlantic. The series aired at 9:30 p.m. each Tuesday. Comcast SportsNet led into each episode with a replay of the previous week's show. The 30-minute show gave a behind-the-scenes look at the inner workings of a major college football program. This season's series follows head coach **Ralph Friedgen** and his staff as they prepare the Terps for the 2009 campaign after losing 30 seniors from last year's squad. Each episode of the show features in-depth player and coach profiles, as well as footage of heated position battles from spring practice and off-season workouts. A film crew, led by former University of Maryland and Washington Redskins place-kicker Jess Atkinson, followed the team both on and off the field. The crew also sat in on team and positional meetings. 'Terrapins Rising' is the result of a partnership between Maryland Athletics, Comcast SportsNet, Under Armour and Atkinson & Co. The shows are archived under Terps TV on umterps.com.

TERP HIGHLIGHTS UNDER FRIEDGEN

- Friedgen, now in his ninth season, has a 66-39 (.628) record, including the first back-to-back-to-back 10-win seasons in school history (10-2 in 2001, 11-3 in 2002 and 10-3 in 2003).
- The 66 wins in eight-plus seasons are more than the Terps had (60) in the 15 years prior to his arrival. The win total ranks fourth in school history and his winning percentage (.623) is 10th all-time in ACC annals among coaches with at least three years on the job.
- The Terps posted a school-record three-straight bowl wins (2003, 04, 06), culminating with a 24-7 triumph over Purdue in the 2006 Champs Sports Bowl. The Terps have out-scored their last five bowl foes by a 151-83 margin. He has a 4-2 bowl mark as a head coach.
- Four of the school's 13 nine-win seasons have come in Friedgen's eight years as head coach.
- Maryland posted a school record-tying 11-victory season in 2002, when the Terps won 10 of their last 11 games. Only the 1976 team won as many games.
- Maryland was among the best in the nation last season playing ranked opponents. The Terps went 4-1 vs. ranked foes (AP poll) with wins vs. No. 23 Cal, No. 20 Clemson, No. 21 Wake Forest and No. 17 UNC. The Terps were one of only five teams in the nation (also Florida, Oklahoma, USC and Texas) to beat at least four Top 25 teams. The other four all finished in the top five of the final polls.
- During 2007, the Terps defeated two top 10 teams (No. 10 Rutgers, No. 8 Boston College). The Terps had never beaten two Top 10 teams in the same season. They were also one of only four teams in the nation (LSU, Kentucky and Illinois) to accomplish that feat in 2007.
- Maryland was joined by only four other Division I-A schools - Miami (Fla.), Oklahoma, Texas and Washington State - to have won as many as 10 games in the 2001, 2002 and 2003 seasons.
- A Top 20 final ranking in both major national polls for three straight years (2001-03). Maryland ended 2003 ranked 17th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' poll and 20th by the Associated Press. In 2002, the Terps were ranked 13th in both polls, and in 2001 the team finished 10th in the ESPN/USA Today poll and 11th in the AP. It was the program's best three-year final rankings since 1974-76 (when the Terps finished 13th, 13th and eighth).
- Friedgen is the third-most successful seventh-year coach in ACC history, with his 56-31 mark eclipsing those of league mentors Dick Sheridan, Tommy Bowden, Bill Dooley and Mack Brown.
- He is the second-most successful sixth-year coach in ACC history, with his 50-24 mark (through the end of 2006) eclipsing those of such former league mentors as Bobby Ross and Lou Holtz. Friedgen is currently 19th among all active coaches for Football Bowl Division (formerly Division I-A) victories.
- In his first four years, Friedgen set the ACC record for wins (36) by a fourth-year head coach. He tied for second in the ACC in wins by a fifth-year coach.
- Bowl appearances in six of his first eight seasons, including dominating wins in the 2004 Toyota Gator Bowl (41-7 over West Virginia) and a 2002 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl victory over perennial national power Tennessee (a team ranked fifth in the two major pre-season polls). The Terrapins also earned a BCS Orange Bowl berth during the 2001 campaign.
- Friedgen has a 37-28 (.576) Atlantic Coast Conference record, including a 7-1 mark in 2001 when the Terps became the first team other than Florida State to win an outright ACC title since the Seminoles joined the league, and a 6-2 mark and runner-up finish in 2002.
- By winning the 2001 ACC title, Friedgen became the first mentor in conference history to win the championship in his first year as a head coach. He also tied the mark of 10-2 set by Ken Hatfield (Clemson) in 1990, the best record ever by an ACC coach in his first season.
- 41 wins in 55 games at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium, where the Terps averaged a school-record 52,426 fans in 2005 and 51,263 in 2007.
- Three of the last eight ACC Defensive Players of the Year.
- 49 national television appearances, including a school-record eight showings in 2002. The Terrapins played on national television or ABC regional six times in 2005, 2006 and 2007, eight times in 2008, and once already in 2009.
- The program's first major national award winner since 1974 in linebacker E.J. Henderson, a two-time consensus first team All-American who was named the winner of the Dick Butkus Award (nation's outstanding linebacker) and the Chuck Bednarik Trophy (nation's outstanding defensive player) in 2002.
- Back-to-back school records in number of first team All-ACC performers in 2001 (7) and 2002 (8) and an ACC-best 13 overall all-conference honors (2001).
- A league-best 14 representatives on the last two Academic All-ACC teams (eight in 2008; six in 2007).
- 33 weeks in at least one of the country's two major Top 25 polls, including a streak of seven consecutive weeks at the start of the 2004 season.
- The only consensus national coach of the year award (2001) in Maryland football history. He was one of 20 coaches around the nation on the watch list for the 2008 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award.
- 21 of the top 28 all-time highest crowds at Capital One Field at Byrd Stadium have come during the last eight seasons.
- Back-to-back school scoring records (2001 and 2002) and a two-year team scoring average of more than 33 points per game in those seasons.

BERKELEY, Calif. - Da'Rel Scott ran for 90 yards, including a 39-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, while Chris Turner threw for 167 yards as No. 12 California beat Maryland in the season-opener for both teams.

Scott went 39 yards for the Terrapins' touchdown with 14:21 remaining in the game.

Turner went 17-for-30 passing in making his 13th consecutive start at quarterback for Maryland.

Adrian Cannon led the Terrapins with five catches for 30 yards.

California's offense was led by Heisman Trophy candidate Jahvid Best, who had 137 yards rushing on 10 carries and a pair of touchdowns. His first, a 73-yard scamper, came with 9:54 left in the first quarter.

Following a fumble on the ensuing kickoff, Best added a 2-yard score to put the Bears up 14-0.

Nick Ferrara, a true freshman who won the kicking job for Maryland, hit a pair of field goals to bring the Terps within 14-6 with 12:28 left in the first half.

The Bears scored 17 unanswered points, including a pair of touchdown passes from Kevin Riley, to take 31-6 halftime lead.

Riley hit on his third TD pass of the night with 9:53 left in the third quarter to build the Cal lead to 45-6 before Scott's touchdown for the Terrapins.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - Nick Ferrara kicked a 26-yard field goal in overtime, giving Maryland a win over James Madison.

Starting first in overtime, James Madison moved one yard in three plays before Dixon Wright was wide right on a 41-yard field goal try.

Maryland (1-1) then used two runs by Da'Rel Scott to move to the 13. Following two carries by quarterback Chris Turner, the second of which got the ball to the middle of the field, Ferrara connected.

Up 21-6 in the second quarter, the Terrapins yielded 22 straight points and trailed 28-21 with 13 minutes left. The comeback was fueled by Maryland turnovers: A fumbled punt and an interception that was returned 62 yards for a touchdown by Jon Williams.

The Terrapins pulled even on an 8-yard run by wide receiver Torrey Smith with 12:18 remaining. But JMU quarterback Drew Dudzik faked a handoff into the line, rolled left and broke free for a 70-yard run to give James Madison a 35-28 lead with 11:23 to go.

On the ensuing drive, the Terps faced a fourth-and-4 from the James Madison 47. Turner completed a 20-yard pass to Ronnie Tyler, then hit Adrian Cannon for a 27-yard touchdown with 5:09 remaining.

The Dukes outgained Maryland in the first half 217-151, but the Terrapins built a 21-14 lead behind Turner, who went 11-for-14 for 97 yards in the half, and Smith, who had four catches for 51 yards in addition to an 81-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.

Smith finished with 229 all-purpose yards, including 127 yards in kickoff returns, 80 yards receiving on eight catches and 22 yards on a pair of rushes.

Turner finished the game with 236 yards on a 25-for-38 passing day with one touchdown. Scott was the Terps' leading rusher with 68 yards on 17 carries.

It was 10-3 before Maryland moved 68 yards in three plays - a 40-yard completion to Smith, a 4-yard run and a 24-yard touchdown pass from Turner to LaQuan Williams.

The Terps allowed just 249 yards of total offense to Rutgers, their best effort since Wake Forest had 219 last season.
